THE WHEEL. IN WINTER.

It is now about time to put away bicycles for the winter, and some directions for their care before they take a rest of a few months will be of value. First, says a writer on the subject in the Buffalo Express, clean the wheel thoroughly. Wipe off every speck of dust, and if there is any rust on the nickel parts, rub it off with some good metal polish. Pay especial attention to the spokes, the pedals, and the rear hub in the neighborhood of the sprocket. Take the chain off by removing the bolt that holds the two ends together, and put it to soak in a dish of kerosene while the rest of the machine is being doctored. Then, if you want to have an easyrunning wheel in the spring, fill a small oil-can with kerosene and run it through all the bearings until it ceases to turn black and dirty, but comes out as clear as water. This cleaned through the regular oil holes, but the sprocket bearing is easily reached by removing the saddle post and pouring a pint or so of kerosene down the hollow cross brace of the

After the bearings and chain are thoroughly cleaned with the kerosene, wipe off all superfluous oil and then proceed to bedaub the machine liberally with vaseline. Spread the vasefreely and thickly, taking care that the nickel parts are thoroughly covered. The chain should be thickly coated, and it will not harm wood rims. Tires, saddles and cork handles however, are not improved by vase-

If the wheel is going to stand on the floor all winter the tires should be left inflated to prevent the from cutting them. A much better scheme is to suspend the wheel from a rafter with a couple of ropes and

London, Nov. 9.-Throughout the week the political outlook has been more mirky and threatening than any time in years past. Continuous fogs and rains have added to the feeling of depression. If this was not enough to give everybody the blues, the speeches of several of the Cabinet Ministers have not enlivened the drooping spirits of the average Britisher. The Minisin the extreme.

A COMING SPEECH. • The gravity of the political situation is recognized on all sides, and therefore the speech which the Marquis of Salisbury is to deliver at the Lord apprehension is not decreased by the fact that it is known that the naval estimates which will be presented to the House of Commons will be of unprecedented magnitude. The Times yesterday said: "England can brook no rivalry in naval armanents."

AN INDISCREET SPEECH. The apparently indiscreet speech Secretary of the Foreign Office, delivered at Derby, in which he alluded' to the evident break-up of Turkey, has created much of a sensation abroad, especially in Berlin. That something will soon have to be done by Turkey or for Turkey, in order to restore order in Armenia, where anarchy prevails, nobody for a moment doubts. The Turk is indolent and cruel, but he is capable of doing some hard fighting against the best troops of Europe if the religious fanaticism of the Mohammedans is aroused.

GONE UP IN SMOKE.

Dutton Has a \$15,000 Blaze and Gun; powder Explosion.

Dutton, Nov. 9 .- Thursday night at 8:30 a big fire started in Urlin Bros.' general store here, and resulted in the complete gutting of the store on Main street. There was a quantity of gunpowder stored in the rear of the building, and a little after the fire started great reports, that were heard six and eight miles in the surrounding country, followed each other in quick succession. Fortunately no one was hurt, although there were several thrilling escapes. The whole village turned out, attracted by the big blaze, and efforts were directed toward preventing the fire spreading to adjacent buildings. The cause of the fire is unknown. EGGS BY THE GALLON. Eggs are now imported into Great Britain from Russia shelled, beaten up and preserved in hermetically sealed

tins, from which they are drawn off through a tap. Eggs in this condition are principally used by pastry cooks, and the advantages claimed for the system are freedom from damage in transport and long-keeping qualities. The tin or drum is packed with straw in a wooden case, and holds the contents of 1,000 to 1,500 eggs, the white and yolk being mixed together, poured into the drum, and the aperture closed with a bung and sealed.
