THE PRETENDER GAINING GROUND

All the Kabyle Tribes Have Joined Him.

CONSULS WILL SOON LEAVE FEZ

The Situation at the Morocco Capital Has Now Become a Decidedly Critical One.

Madrid, Jan. 12. — A dispatch from Melilla, Morocco, today, announces that all the Kabyle tribes of the Taza region have joined the pretender. The Sultan's troops, it is added, are absolutely undisciplined, and are selling their arms and ammunition to the pretender, who pays high prices for them. A dispatch to El Liberal from Tangier, Morocco, says: "Official reports from Fez declare the Sultan has rearrested his brother Mulai Mohammed."

EUROPEANS LEAVING. London, Jan. 13. — A dispatch to the Daily Express from Tangier, Morocco, says all the Europeans of Fez have now left that place and that the foreign consuls there will follow immediately.

MISSIONARIES QUIT. Tangier, Morocco, Jan. 13. — The departure of the five women missionaries, four of whom are English and one American, from Fez, Jan. 8, for Tangier, had long been meditated, and was not an outcome of new developments. Many sensational reports are current here of affairs in Fez, but there is little reason to believe that it is considered a satisfactory feature, however, that the tribes to the south of Fez are remaining quiet. Seven Jews have been murdered in the Taza region. The Sultan is reported to be suspicious of the movements of his brother, Mulai Mohammed. His majesty keeps the local horsemen from the south around his person instead of sending them against the rebels.

SITUATION SERIOUS. London, Jan. 13. — The Times publishes a dispatch from Tangier, Morocco, that the news received there from Fez is less satisfactory than former reports. Mrs. Watkins is a married woman living with her who is 70 years of age. The centenarian seemed to be smart and jovial as anyone present, although she was not able to walk. Death of Trooper William Evans.

Ottawa, Jan. 13. — Official confirmation has been received of the death of Trooper William Evans, of Billingsbridge, in South Africa. Evans died in the hospital at Bloemfontein after a short siege of enteric fever. The officer speaks of the young soldier as an "honest, loyal and dutiful young man."

MacKay's Majority 272.

Owen Sound, Ont., Jan. 13. — The official returns for the North Grey by-election give G. Mackay, Liberal, a majority of 272. Six thousands and seventy votes were polled—the largest on record for this riding.

Toronto, Jan. 13. — The clerk of the Legislature has received the official returns from Fort William and Lake of the Woods for the recent by-election. There were 806 votes cast for the act and 78 against, leaving a majority of 22.

More Stringent Rules.

Toronto, Jan. 13. — Mr. Irwin, clerk of the peace of York County, has received notification from Ottawa that in future the Government would adopt more stringent rules governing the registration of immigrants and their naturalization. The clerk is ordered to report the number of naturalization papers taken out, and also copies of all the papers. The latter provision is made to guard against duplication, and parties unnaturally assuming the privilege of the naturalized. The clerk of the peace is ordered to issue 1,500 naturalization certificates since the year 1850.

Veterans' Land Grants.

Toronto, Jan. 13. — A number of applications for veterans' land grants have been made to the crown lands department since Jan. 1; although, according to the act, no application made after Dec. 31 last is valid. During the year, between Christmas and New Year's there was an immense rush of applications for forms, numbering nearly a thousand. It has been decided that all forms applied for before the first of the year, even though not filed until after the legal time had expired, will be taken into consideration. It will be made of the claims of those at present applying has not yet been decided. Before entertaining them it will be necessary to submit an affidavit to the act at the coming session of the Legislature. The claims are being reserved, and possibly some such step will be taken.

AT THE DEADLY LEVEL CROSSING

Sleigh-Load of People Struck by N. Y. Central Train.

ONE PERSON KILLED, TWO DYING

Others of the Party Hurt—woman Burned to Death at Windsor, Ontario.

Batavia, N. Y., Jan. 13. — A freight train on the Canandaigua branch of the N. Y. C. crashed into a sleigh containing five persons, at a grade crossing east of Stafford, yesterday. Of the occupants of the sleigh, one received injuries that caused death a few hours later, two were fatally injured, and two seriously hurt. They are all members of the family of J. Mott. A second sleigh, which was following close behind Mott's, was overturned by being brought to a sudden stop to escape running into the train. Four persons in the second vehicle were injured.

The dead—John Mott, 19 years of age, skull fractured, died at 7 p.m. Fatally injured—Lemuel Mott, 11 years of age, skull fractured in several places; Mrs. Lena Mott, spine broken. The others hurt are Kate Mott, daughter of Mrs. Mott, J. J. Mott, Miss Mary Butmore, occupant of second sleigh; Mrs. Katherine Bossert, Mrs. Priscilla Butmore and Mrs. Anna Butmore. The two sleighs were part of a funeral procession. A severe storm was raging at the time and apparently no one in the Mott sleigh, which was a covered affair, heard the approaching train. Part of the funeral procession passed safely over the tracks before the Mott sleigh was struck. The crash and the cries of the injured warned the next sleigh.

FATALLY BURNED.

Windsor, Jan. 13. — While Chief Engineer William J. Belson, of the big car ferry Lansdowne, was battling with a giant ice floe in the Detroit river on Saturday, his wife was killed at death at their home in this city, and not until several hours later did the husband learn of the terrible tragedy. About 10 o'clock Mrs. Belson, carrying a lighted lamp, started for the basement to attend to the furnace. When half way down the stairs she slipped and fell, the lamp being knocked over and throwing burning oil over her clothing. There was no one near by to hear her agonizing screams, and she was fatally injured before help arrived. Mrs. Belson was 53 years of age, and for over 30 years had resided in Windsor. She had been long prominently identified with the Windsor Avenue Methodist Church and its different organizations.

WHOLE FAMILY POISONED.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 13. — The family of C. Perrault, St. Hubert street, was poisoned on Sunday by eating canned tomatoes. Five members of the family became very ill after eating the fruit, but all will recover. The city food inspector has a portion of the can and will have it analyzed. Poor soldering is believed to have been the cause.
