Toronto, Jan. 13.—Mr. Irwin, clerk of the peace of York County, has re-ceived notification from Ottawa that in future the Government would adopt more stringent rules governing the registration of immigrants and their naturalization. The clerk is ordered to report the number of naturalization papers taken out, and also copies of all these papers. The latter provision is made to guard against duplication, and parties unnaturalized assuming sued 1,500 naturalization certificates since the year 1850.

### Veterans' Land Grants.

# AT THE DEADLY

Sleigh-Load of People Struck by N. Y. Central Train.

### ONE PERSON KILLED, TWO DYING

Burnea to Death at Windsor,

Batavia, N. f., Jan. 13.-A freight train on the Canandaigua branch of the N. Y. C. crashed into a sleigh containing five persons, at a grade crossing east of Stafford, yesterday. Of the occupants of the sleigh, one received injuries that caused death a few hours later, two were fatally injured, and two seriously hurt. They are all members of the family of J. Mott. A second sleigh, which was following close behind Mott's, was overturned by being brought to a sudden stop to escape running into the train. Four persons in the second vehicle were injured.

The dead-John Mott, 19 years of age, skull fractured, died at 7 p.m. Fatally injured-Lemuel Mott, 11 years of age, skull fractured in several places; Mrs. Lena Mott, spine broken. The others hurt are Kate Mott, daughter of Mrs. Mott, J. J. Mott, Miss Mary Butmore, occupant of second sleigh; Mrs. Katherine Bossert, Mrs. Priscilla Butmore and Mrs. Anna Butmoret.

The two sleighs were part of a funeral procession. A severe storm was raging at the time and apparently no one in the Mott sleigh, which was a covered affair, heard the approaching train. Part of the funeral procession passed safely over the tracks before the Mott sleigh was struck. The crash and the cries of the injured warned the next sleigh.

FATALLY BURNED. Windsor, Jan. 13. — While Chief Engineer William J. Belsom, of the big car ferry Lansdowne, was battling with a giant ice floe in the Detroit River on Saturday, his wife was burned to death at their home, in this city, and not until several hours later did the husband learn of the terrible tragedy. About 10 o'clock Mrs. Belsom, carrying a lighted lamp, started for the basement to attend to the furnace. When half way down the stairs she slipped and fell, the lamp being smashed, and throwing burning oil over her clothing.
