

## NEW TESTAMENT FULFILLS THE OLD

**Dr. Torrey Calls Bible Book of  
Fulfilled Promises—Prophe-  
cies Cannot Be Denied.**

Toronto, Jan. 10.—St. James' school-house was again crowded at noon to-day to hear Mr. Alexander and Dr. Torrey in their noon-day meeting for businessmen.

"When you are discouraged in your office this afternoon think of this, and ask Jesus to help you," said Mr. Alexander, after the meeting had sung the hymn, "Ask the Savior to Help You." "You may think because you are six feet two you can do it yourself, but you can't. There is no one who does not want sympathy and help some time."

"Tell Mother I'll Be There." "Where is My Wandering Boy?" were two other hymns which were sung with great vigor and sympathy.

After a solo by Mr. Butler, Dr. Torrey continued his subject of yesterday and gave further reasons why he believed that the Bible was a revelation of the will of God which we must accept absolutely.

**Promises Fulfilled.**

He believed, because of its fulfilled promises. The average skeptic, and for that matter, the average Christian and the average Jew, knew nothing of fulfilled promises.

There were two kinds of promises in the Bible—the explicit, verbal promises, and promises through types and symbols. The principal class of the former promises was the promises referring to the coming Messiah. The first chapter of Isaiah was an instance. Of course, a determined effort was being made to prove that this chapter did not refer to the Messiah. This was natural, because if it were accepted as a Messianic prophecy it proved Jesus the Messiah and the inspiration of the Old Testament.

It was proved that the chapter had been accepted as a Messianic prophecy by the Jews until Jesus had fulfilled the prophecy. If the Messiah were not referred to who was? Some had said that it referred to the sufferings of Israel, but the suffering was said to be vicarious and on behalf of Israel. How, then, could the chapter apply to Israel?

Dr. Torrey then referred to four passages: Daniel ix., 24 to 27; Micah v., 2; Jeremiah xlii., 5 and 6; and Psalm xlv., 8 to 11.

These foretold the coming of a king, giving minutely the time and place of his birth, his family and its condition, his reception, his death and burial, his resurrection, and his triumph. These were not given in a general way, but minutely, and were all different than might have been expected at the time the prophecies were given. Yet they were all fulfilled to the very letter in Jesus of Nazareth centuries after the prophecy had been uttered.

"These are facts you must account for," declared Dr. Torrey. "If you were more theologians you might be satisfied with your theories, but as businessmen you must look at facts and account for them."

The book that could look centuries ahead and foretell in detailed accuracy events which were to happen centuries after was not an ordinary book. If they were honest the only conclusion to which they could come was that the author of the book was the only person in the universe who knew the beginning from the end, that is, God.

**Both Fulfilled in One.**

There were two lines of Messianic prophecy in the Old Testament which seemed to contradict each other. One told of a Messiah who would be rejected, and the other of a Messiah who would come as a conquering king. The Jews had thought that there would be two Messiahs, but both prophecies had been fulfilled in Jesus Christ. When the first came, he was despised, but when he came again, he would come as a conquering king.

The types, symbols, and personages of the Old Testament were all prophetic of the Messiah and had foreshadowed the teaching of the New Testament.

Testament. Was this a mere coincidence? "If you have a scientific mind," declared Dr. Torrey, "you will see that the theory of coincidence is untenable."

Higher critics had failed because they had failed to comprehend the meaning of the Old Testament types. Then the unity of the Bible was a great proof of its divine inspiration. In all its great linguistic and literary diversity, its authorship, covering over 1,500 years, one might expect divergence, discrepancy, contradiction, and incongruity, but one found a marvelous unity. Every part of it fitted into every other part of it. One ever-increasing thought ran through it from beginning to end. The true conclusion was that behind the individual writers was the one author, God.

## HE RAN OFF WITH THREE TON KO KO

**Scare in Barnum & Bailey's  
Winter Quarters When Ele-  
phant Is Missing.**

Bridgeport, Conn., Jan. 10.—A light fingered thief jimmied his way into the elephant house of the Barnum & Bailey circus winter quarters this morning, and extracted an elephant.

Twenty-eight elephants squealed, trumpeted, roared, rattled their chains, and thrashed about in rage. It was they who witnessed the madonistic larceny. The combined din of the mahouts and the elephants aroused George Conklin, chief animal man, and he rushed to the elephant house in his pajamas.

"Someone has swiped Ko Ko," yelled a mahout in perfect English.

It was true. Ko Ko—"baby" in Somali—was gone. Ko Ko weighed a ton over three tons. He is a bad elephant, in spite of the fact that he is a baby, and who else he nearly killed several people a year ago. Mr. Bailey ordered that he be executed.

So the kidnapping of Ko Ko was amazing, and Conklin, expecting to get word any moment that a mad elephant was loose in the streets of the city, sent the alarm to the quarters, and in five minutes a cavalcade of horsemen was started out after the thief with an elephant on his hands.

The police sent out a general alarm to arrest for grand larceny a man with an elephant. Conklin ran to a telephone and began calling up persons on the outside of the town.

"Sure, we saw a man with an elephant go by here," said one voice. Conklin and his men started on the trail. Half way to Stratford they saw something like a load of hay ahead of them. That was Ko Ko.

"Come Ko Ko, come Ko Ko," Conklin pleaded. Ko Ko knew Conklin's voice and stopped. A man at the elephant's head predated with a pitchfork, but Ko Ko wouldn't budge. He knew that sugar and peanuts came with the voice. The cavalcade surrounded the man and elephant. The man was recognized as Joseph Harvey, elephant keeper, who Conklin had discharged several days ago. Ko Ko knew him and that was the only reason he was alive. Conklin might have taken Harvey back to town, but let him go.

"Most amazing theft I ever heard of," said Conklin. "It is evidently meant to sell Ko Ko to another show. He thinks we owe him money and that he would take it out in Ko Ko."

**WORLD'S FAIR FOR IRELAND**  
Plot of Ground Already Purchased in  
Dublin for Exposition.

Dublin, Jan. 10.—Ireland is to hold a world's fair in 1907. It will embody the results of the industrial revival which has swept over that island during the last decade. A large plot of ground in Dublin has been purchased, work will be begun on the buildings in a few weeks, and in the summer of the next year the Emerald Isle will invite the world to come and visit it.

Plans for this undertaking have been maturing for some years. There have been many obstacles to overcome, but the movement has been led by such indomitable men as James Shank, former lord mayor of Dublin, and they are terminated at the start that they would not fail. They have at last raised the necessary guarantee fund, and the enterprise is on a most promising basis.

The main feature of the exposition will be the exhibition of home manufactures. Everything will be done, by the erection of suitable buildings and facilities for display, to make the Irish show worth going to and distance to see. All trades and every handicraft will be amply represented. Cottage industries will be given a prominent place and the native arts and crafts will have a great display.

**Linotype Machine Fight.**

Montreal, Jan. 10.—For over a year past a bitter fight has been waging in the courts at Montreal between the Mergenthaler Linotype Company of New York and the Toronto Type Foundry Company, owners of the Canadian Linotype Company.

A new move was made today, when Messrs. Smith, Markey, Montgomery, and Skinner, acting on behalf of the Toronto Type Foundry Company, issued a suit in the exchequer court of Canada, asking for an injunction against the Vancouver Printing and Publishing Company—owners of the Vancouver Daily Province, to restrain them from operating a machine imported from the United States, and which, it is claimed, infringes patents owned by the Canadian Linotype Company.

**Drops Dead.**

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 10.—John D. Forsyth, a Canadian, dropped dead in the office of the Victoria Hotel on Main street this afternoon. He was attacked by heart disease. Medical Examiner Danzer said, after an examination.

The dead man is said to have lived somewhere in the immediate vicinity of Toronto.

## NOT UP TO MARK, IN ALL RESPECTS

**Milk-and-Water Comedy in Piff,  
Paff, Pouff—Musically  
Good in Spits.**

"Piff, Paff, Pouff," the much-heralded musical farce, was presented at the Grand last night before one of the largest audiences of the season. Musically, in spots, it delivered the goods.

From a comedy standpoint it was the shallowest, milk-and-water thing that ever hit London. It depended for its humor on oaths in minors and insipid local references. Such magnificently humorous remarks, as, "I just blew in from Dorchester," elicited uproarious applause.

Fred W. Mace, as Peter Poulter, howled his humor at the people. He appeared to be holding an auction sale, and when he sat on a sandpile and threw sand in the air with a shingle his uncouth humor paralyzed the house.

A man who was really funny was R. E. Graham, as August Melon. He didn't rant, he could sing some, and he provoked laughter by genuine methods. He had an able assistant in Miss Catherine Osterman, who has been in musical comedy for some time. She has a fine stage appearance, a mellow, fetching laugh, but unfortunately without a voice. However, she was very pleasing, and the audience had a cosy corner in their hearts for her.

Some of the choruses were very fine, several pony ballets being introduced which could give cards and spades to the finest seen here in many years. The girls were pretty and lively, while the voices were splendid. "Gordelia Malone" made a tremendous hit, as did also "Lullie" and "Under the Goo-Goo Tree."

The costuming and stage mounting were of the usual richness, demonstrating that the voice cannot be dispensed with fearlessly if the eye is caught by garish settings.

A Hamilton dispatch says: Stella Foster, a member of the "Piff Paff Pouff" Opera company, which concluded a two nights' engagement at the Grand last evening, is ill at St. Joseph's Hospital, she along with several members of the company, was quarantined at Stroud's hotel.
