### AN OPENING FOR CANADIAN GOODS.

A very pronounced interest in Canaffairs has been throughout the West Indies, particularly among the mercantile classes, largely as a result of the action taken at the recent agricultural conference at Barbadoes, looking to the establishment of reciprocal trade relations between the Dominion and those island colonies. The latter offer opportunities for Canadian frade expansion, but if Canadian manufacturers would take full advantage of the opening they must study the needs and peculiarities of the people.

The new Canadian trade commiscioner to the West Indies, Mr. E. H. Flood, in a recent report to the department of trade and commerce, refers to this newly-awakened interest in Canada among the people of the islands, and says that Canadian commercial travelers would now be likely to receive a better hearing and have a better chance of getting orders than at any time in the immediate past, and that for that reason they should be sent down with their samples as early change their account and purchase in and skill-in dealing with men. The reciprocity with Canada, and the hope that in the end closer trade relations will be of real value to the West Indies, cannot but be influential in inducing them to place orders for Canadian goods that would otherwise go to United States houses. # GYPSIES TO JAIL
