"The first and greatest objection which I have to a fixed money con-tribution is that it bears the aspect of hiring somebody else to do what we ourselves ought to do; as though man, the father of a family, lusty health and strength, should pay his neighbor something per nonth for looking after the welfare and safety of his home, instead of doing that duty himself. That seems to me, when you work it out, to be a basic objection to that form of aid. It goes further than that. Suppose you contribute this year your sum and next year your equal sum, and thereafter year by year. After ten or twelve or twenty or thirty years you will have paid out an immense amount of money. You will have been protected in the meantime; but in Canada itself there will be no roots struck, there will be no residue left, there will be no preparation of the soil or beginning of the growth


