ONT.**Continued from Page 15**was easily judged to be correct, as
there was very little asphalt or
other pavement there. The citizens
seemingly did not care for it, and
consequently there was little of it
laid.Seventy-five per cent of the streets
were paved with brick. All the busi-
ness streets are so paved and quite a
large number of the residential
streets. Some of the boulevards were
made of tar macadam, which seemed
to make an excellent road. The dust
nuisance was easily handled on that
variety of street, and there was little
inconvenience.**A Good Pavement.**The brick pavement is a good one
when properly constructed. That was
certainly shown by the immense traf-
fic on some of the down-town streets.
Where the heaviest traffic is to be
found Medina block is used. It is a
block of close texture, and is very hard.
Mr. Springhorn said the average
life of such a pavement was from 30
to 40 years. If the base is properly
laid, the pavement will quite easily
reach the higher limit. The cost is
somewhat higher than that of brick
pavements, but from the standpoint of
efficiency and duration, is much the
cheaper pavement.Practically all the city is paved.
There is a great deal of public works
under construction.**Business Depression.**"Times have been very bad over
here," said Mr. Springhorn, "and we
have endeavored to do all the public
works that we could. At present we
have a great deal of sewer work un-
der construction, and are laying a
large amount of pavement, but even
then we cannot do much for the men
out of work. When the presidential
elections are over we hope to see bet-
ter times."**Own Repair Plant.**The city has its own repair plant for
its asphalt streets, and it pays. As
stated above, there is not a very great
deal of work to be done, but the op-
inion there was that it paid the city to
do its own work along this line."The streets are well paved, and are
very durable," said Mr. Kirkpatrick
after a close investigation. "Of course,
they are welded to the brick, and it
seems to give great satisfaction, espe-
cially the Medina block. Any pave-
ment that will last 30 or 40 years is a
one. There can be no mistake
about that. Our pavement is laid
on the ten and fifteen year guarantee
principally."**Mayor Johnson.**Mayor Tom Johnson is notorious
over America for his long fight against
the street railway of Cleveland. For
some years he has been waging a very
spectacular and quite effective cam-
paign, so successful that he, a Demo-
crat, has been several times elected
mayor of a city that is Republican,
and a home of President Garfield.
Mark Hanna, past and present, of national
reputation.The mayor's cry was for a municipally
owned street railway system. It was
an effective and after some years
battling the people demanded of the
transfer, and it was made not long ago.
The laws of Ohio would not allow the
city to own the system, so a different
scheme was attempted. The plan was
rented from the owners. It was valued
at \$22,000,000, a somewhat small esti-
mate in the opinion of the majority of
the citizens, as it is generally conceded
that the plan is worth at least
\$50,000,000. The company was to re-
ceive interest at 6 per cent, but as
the stock was selling at 55, the rate
of interest was about 3 per cent. In
order to do this the city had to ob-
tain stock, an eleven people, includ-
ing the mayor and several of the
aldermen, purchased \$100 worth of
stock each, and were elected a board
of directors to manage the road for
the benefit of the whole people.The transfer was made, and the
guarantee of the interest to the own-
ers of the road was made. The bar-
gain was for fifteen years, and has a
long time to run yet.**Cheap Car Fare.**Behind this desire for a municipally
owned street railway was the demand for a
3-cent rate on the cars. Mayor John-
son promised this, in fact, he promised
that if the road could pay its way on a
2-cent fare basis, the people should
have it.The experiment was made with the
3-cent fares. The council appointed a
commission to conduct the affairs of
the company, and with much joy the
project was entered into.Statistics as to the success of the
road were not obtainable, save for the
months of May and June this year.
May showed a deficit of practically
\$55,000, while June was somewhat bet-
ter, with a deficit of \$23,000. The
earnings of the company compared
with the same months of the previous
year, showed a falling off of from 20
to 30 per cent. The company, of
course, had a five-cent fare, or six
tickets for a quarter.Now the city is in a quandary as to
what is the best policy to pursue with
the road.If the fares are increased, the peo-
ple will object strenuously, and will
demand the lower fare. Even now
there are rumors of "graft," some be-
ing outspoken in their assertions that
somebody is getting money out of the
situation. Some say that the street
railway will not pay at the 3-cent fare
basis, and that the fares must be
raised. The people, however, say no,
and claim that all will come out right
in a short time.**A Former Londoner.**A former Londoner, Mr. Charles
Currie, who was connected with the
London Street Railway, was largely
responsible for the splendid time given
the visitors. He is at present man-
ager of the Akron Street Railway,
controlling several radials and man-
aging over 250 miles of track, and has
done exceedingly well.

Howard Beldier and his wife.**THREAT TO KILL****WHOLE FAMILY****Blackmailer Tells Millionaire****How His Children Would****All Be Slain.**Munich, Aug. 28.—In a crowded court
the trial began of Bernhard Imhof, an
ex-postal servant, aged 32, for at-
tempted blackmailing of the million-
aire Bavarian manufacturer, Herr Wil-
helm Ludovici.Although of good family and super-
ior education, Imhof has already served
a sentence of five years for embezzle-
ment, and confessed that he wrote to
Herr Ludovici, who is worth \$10,000,
demanding sums ranging from
\$25,000 to \$500,000 under threat of kill-
ing off his children one by one until
his terms were agreed to, and of finally
robbing the millionaire of his own
eyesight.Imhof's letters, signed by a fictitious
name, told how the death of each
child would be followed by a demand
for an additional \$250,000 until all five
children were killed. The millionaire
was assured that no sort of protec-
tive measures could ward off his awful
fate. Imhof declared during the ex-
amination that he wrote the letters
only to annoy and frighten the mil-
lionaire, because, "despite my greater
intelligence, I was compelled to work
like a horse on his premises," and also
because it was a matter of gossip
among Ludovici's employees that, de-
spite his vast fortune, he was stingy.**INTERMENT TOOK****PLACE IN WOODLAND**Funeral of Dr. Geo. Hodge Held Today
