MISSIONARY FROM PERSIA
Interesting Addresses in the Adelaide Street Baptist Church on Sunday.

Rev. Yonah H. Shahbaz, a Baptist missionary in Persia, gave a very vivid picture of conditions in that country at the Adelaide Street Baptist Church Sunday. Large congregations were present at both services.

The history of the Persian Empire was dealt with. In the days of Cyrus, the Great Xerxes, and Artaxerxes, this country was one of the forces in the world. In Biblical times, it was rich in Biblical memories. Mohammedanism, however, had over-run the land, and at the present time practically all the people were of this faith. In a nation of 15,000,000 people there were but 3,000 Christians.

The Christian religion is despised by the Mohammedan Church, Mr. Shahbaz explained. There was the greatest animosity shown on all possible occasions to the missionaries' work exceedingly difficult.

"Persia can only be converted by Persians," he stated. "Any country in Europe or Asia or Africa must be brought to a knowledge of Christ through the efforts of its own people. There is a great need of education along Christian lines in my country."

The desperate condition of the women in Persia was graphically described. They were treated with little more consideration than beasts of the field. The Baptist Church was making an effort to save the women, and had now fifteen teachers for the girls and women of that country.

Another Big Deal
The London Loan and Savings Company have taken over the Ontario assets of a Toronto loan company amounting to nearly \$400,000, and have advanced them thereon, a quarter of a million dollars. This is the second large transaction of this nature that this enterprising company has put through within the last thirty days.

A good name well earned is something to be proud of. This morning a farmer near Westminster who knows horses and how to take care of them brought a load of produce to the market. There were many blacksmith shops in the neighborhood, but leaving his horse in the square, in charge of his wife, he walked his team to the corner of Brick Street and Wellington road, where W. Smith, the practical horseshoer, does business, and had him shod. This is certainly a warm tribute to Mr. Smith's ability as a horseshoer.

HYATT AVE. CHURCH FOR CHURCH UNION
Quarterly Board Voted 25 to 2 in Favor of the Movement.

KNOX CHURCH VOTES
One Hundred and Eight Members for Union and Sixty Against It—Church Notes.

Returns of the voting on church union are being received almost daily at the present time, and the indications are that in all three denominations, the Presbyterian, the Methodist and Congregational, an overwhelming majority in favor of union will be given.

This was certainly the case in the vote given on Sunday night in Hyatt Avenue Methodist Church. Rev. J. W. Baird stated that of the members of the quarterly board who had voted 25 were in favor of union and but 2 opposed. The votes of the members and adherents will be taken on March 17.

Knox Church in Favor.
Knox Church, South London, also voted favorably for union. Rev. J. G. Stuart announced that on the general question of union, 108 members had voted for it and 60 were against it. Nineteen adherents voted in favor of it, while 6 opposed.

On the basis of union proposed, 31 members voted in favor of it, while 18 opposed; 18 adherents were favorable, with 6 against it.

"The vote was rather small," said Mr. Stuart. "About half the membership voted."

Announced on Tuesday.
The congregation of the New St. James' Church voted Sunday night, the last ballots being received at the evening service. Rev. T. H. Mitchell has not finished counting them, but will make an announcement of the result on Tuesday, he expects.

King Street Presbyterian Church also voted, but the conditions are the same as in the case of New St. James.

Asklin Street Methodist Church.
Rev. W. H. Harvey, pastor of the Asklin Street Methodist Church, delivered the second of a series of sermons on church union Sunday evening, taking as his subject, "What the World Owes to the Methodist Church." He spoke of the foundation of the denomination and of its wonderful growth since that time, until today it was one of the strongest Protestant denominations, with a membership of 40,000,000.

On Sunday next, the vote of the congregation on church union will be taken.

Evangelistic Services.
The evangelistic services being conducted by Rev. Dr. Yeuell, of Chicago, in the First Congregational Church were largely attended on Saturday night and Sunday.

On Saturday evening, Dr. Yeuell gave his great lecture on the life of Christ. It was illustrated with many beautiful illustrations, and altogether was one of the most inspiring addresses yet delivered by this talented speaker.

The "Holy City" was sung by Miss Elsie Roth, and was greatly enjoyed. On Sunday morning, Dr. Yeuell preached on the subject of "Prayer," and in the evening on "General Conception." Both subjects were dealt with in a most impressive manner, and many were brought to a knowledge of Christ.

Addressed Men's League.
Rev. Mr. Inkster was the speaker at the Men's League service at St. John's Church on Sunday morning. He declared that the church was not taking its place in the social and economic activities of the day. In selecting representative men for the Toronto Board of Trade, he stated, "not a minister of the Gospel had been chosen. This should not be. The ministry should be active in all that helps mankind. They should be an influence in business, in politics and all other activities better. There was a decided lack of dynamic power in the church today."

The meeting was largely attended, and much interest manifested in the thoughtful address of Mr. Inkster.

Church Was Dedicated.
Right Rev. Bishop Fallon went to Painscourt, Kent County, Sunday and dedicated the handsome new Church of the Holy Trinity. He preached in two languages, the majority of the parish being French-Canadians.

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Y. M. C. A. APPEAL TO THE CITIZENS
Good Work Is Being Done and Hearty Support Is All That Is Required.

THE SUNDAY MEETINGS
Afternoon Gatherings Are a Great Success—The Visits to the Shops.

In a recent special number of "Association Men," the organ of the Young Men's Christian Association, the key word of the whole world-wide movement was given as "Opportunity." In the broad scope of association work there is opportunity of betterment for men and boys, rich and poor, learned and ignorant, native and foreign born; there is opportunity for physical, mental and spiritual culture, the making of a full-orbed man. Now these are doubtless all commonplace things that you have heard before, and first because you have heard them so often you may have lost in some measure the sense of their importance. The sole purpose of this article is to remind you of the only organization in London that stands for this all-round development and provides all the facilities for its realization. Familiarity is apt to breed in any man indifference and carelessness, if not the proverbial contempt, and the best way to shake him out of his apathy is to present the cold facts from which he can form his own conclusions.

Thirty-Third Annual Report.
Now, the Y. M. C. A. presented last week to the citizens its thirty-third annual report. This little pamphlet is a record of achievement, often under difficulties, of which the directors and staff may well be proud. It shows a membership of 244, divided as follows: Senior participants, 450; junior, 209, and sustaining, 255. These include many nationalities and many types of religious beliefs. The association knows no distinctions of creed or nationality. Its single aim is to uplift and help all men and boys who come within the range of its influence, and it does this in a great variety of ways. The junior department is organized to furnish for the boys a wholesome environment for the cultivation of all many qualities. It is easy for growing boys to drift into bad habits of life. Here they are surrounded with uplifting influences. The Boy Scout movement has been encouraged and aided by the Y. M. C. A. as most promising and helpful.

The work of the physical department is familiar to nearly everybody. Under a well-trained and thoroughly competent director the men are divided into classes and given such attention as will produce the best results. The London association has always given a good account of itself in all branches of athletic sport. Much better work could be done in the physical department if the directors were in a position financially to bring the gymnasium equipment and bathing facilities up to date.

Important Features.
The social and educational features of Association work are important. In the evening April 30, at 7:15, high-class periodicals were kept on file in the reading room, 16 educational entertainments were given with an attendance of 4,800, five lectures of a high order were delivered to large audiences, a flourishing club of 100 members, and assisted for those of musical tastes and assisted the entertainment of the members, 85 social gatherings were held attended by 1,275. Not the least interesting of the educational features was the class carried on in McClary's dining-room for the instruction of Russians in the English language, with an enrolment of 60 students. Work among immigrants is becoming an important phase of association work on this continent, and we are endeavoring to do our share. It is a work of patriotism and Christian citizenship and nation-building which all men must assist.

Sunday Meetings.
The distinctly religious phase of our work is properly in the forefront of the association's activities. Nothing need be said of the Sunday afternoon meeting for men, which holds the record in Canada for large attendance. Everyone knows of this meeting, which is maintained in its character so long just because the directors spare neither trouble nor expense to procure for this service the best speakers available. Last year 25 such meetings were held, with an attendance of 11,275. In addition to these meetings, 11 services in churches were conducted by association members and attended by 2,212. Eleven Bible classes organized to meet the needs of all ages and all conditions of men and boys, had an enrolment of 226. Perhaps the most interesting form of religious work was the shop meetings held at the noon hour in five factories—McClary's (two shops), Leonard's, Shepherd-Manning's and the G. T. Leckie. Good speakers and religious songs are provided and greatly appreciated by the men. In some cases in which the feeling was at first rather hostile, it changed to one of extreme cordiality, and the workers were earnestly invited to continue the meetings a second year. In addition to all these organized efforts, there are the close friendships formed under the most favorable conditions.

Of the results of this work can be tabulated, but the subtle influences that stimulate and inspire men and build up strong Christian character can never be expressed in figures.

Appeal to the Citizens.
The local association is going to appeal to the citizens this week for financial assistance. The work cannot be carried on successfully without the large-hearted sympathy and support of a wide constituency of contributors. We bespeak for the directors in their canvass that hearty reception and encouragement which their work deserves.

PRISONERS OFF FOR KINGSTON
Reynolds and O'Brien Begin Their Sentences at Once In Penitentiary.

THEY MADE NO TROUBLE
Effort Is To Be Made Shortly to Secure a Parole for the Man Who Killed Colver.

Ushered from the cells a few minutes after being informed that they were about to start their trip, Daniel Reynolds, sentenced to life for the killing of Fred Colver, and Pat Doyle, alias O'Brien and Maloney, who is to serve twenty years for highway robbery and attempted jail-breaking, were transferred from the county jail here Sunday night and taken to Kingston Penitentiary.

The prisoners were in charge of Deputy Sheriff Waterworth, who was assisted by Constable Kolt. Northgraves, of the sheriff's office, and County Constable Len. Paisley, of Dorchester.

Neither of the men knew that they were to be moved from London Sunday night, and Reynolds' wife was not made aware of the fact that her husband had gone until this afternoon.

Both men were securely handcuffed to each other, and to the officers, and caused no trouble. None was expected of Reynolds and Doyle, who would no doubt have taken advantage of any favorable opportunity for escape, apparently concluded that he was "up against it." Reynolds sat downcast in the smoking car at the Grand Trunk depot while awaiting the departure of the train, while Doyle, who has had numerous trips of the same kind, smoked and showed no evidences of worry.

According to those familiar with criminal law and its administration, Reynolds, although given a life term will have his freedom by the parole system if he behaves himself, before Doyle again walks un molested.

A Bad Record.
The latter's record is decidedly against him, and it is said to be a certainty that he will finish his time. He, however, has offered the opinion that he will never serve the full term, and as he does not appear to think that opportunities for escape from Kingston are numerous, it appears that he has made up his mind that a man now 42, who has spent such a life, will probably take passage on Charon's craft before he reaches 60.

Mrs. Reynolds visited the jail, accompanied by a photographer, to see her husband, and posed with her husband for a family group. This was permitted by the sheriff, in view of the fact that Reynolds desired a portrait, by which to remember her husband, which to remember her husband.

Will Seek a Parole.
Many letters telling of good traits of character have been received by Reynolds' sister, and when the time is ripe a strong effort will be put forth to secure his parole. The man had never been in very serious trouble before, and while Chief Justice Falconer, in imposing sentence, pointed out that intemperance does not justify the killing of another, the fact that the tragedy was the result of a drunken brawl may have a mitigating influence after a few years are served.

A Good Word for Reynolds.
Several Sarnia businessmen, who were acquainted with Reynolds when he made his home in the Tunnel Town, state that he was always a very honest, hardworking and kind-hearted man.

Since coming to London, however, he fell in with a worthless class, and has spent a great portion of the last two years in consuming the visible supply of liquor.

"I always considered Dan Reynolds a very kind-hearted man, and a very good fellow," said one of the men who was first to offer his help. "His recommendation given by one prominent merchant of Sarnia."

FACTORY PATRONS RECEIVE \$24,443
Interesting Reports Received at Annual Meeting at Mossley.

Mossley, March 4.—The annual meeting of the Mossley cheese factory was held on Friday, March 1, when the eighth annual report was presented by W. W. Scott, secretary, to a rally of patrons. Mr. D. P. Campbell presided. Pasturizing whey precipitated an animated discussion, which culminated favorably to the device for five months or more commencing the 1st of July. The directors comprise Mr. J. V. S. B. Ross, W. Strathdee, W. Malpass and C. Morrison. Messrs. McLean, of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Belmont, and Patterson, of the Bank of Toronto, Dorchester, addressed the meeting, humorously making obeisance to the sturdy representatives of toll in quest of patronage, whereupon to meet the exigencies of the occasion, it was resolved to vote by ballot. The bankers were designated as honorary referees. The vote resulted in favor of the Bank of Toronto.

G. M. McKenzie, dairy instructor of Ingersoll, delineated forcefully, supplemented by chart, gains from evading milk. A resolution embodying the suggestions of the speaker to cool the night's milk to a maximum of 65 degrees before assimilating with morning's milk, was passed.

Mr. John L. Walker, proprietor, decreed to make the cheese at the stipulated price, \$1 per hundredweight, coupled with subsidy of \$50 for selling the cheese. Secretary W. W. Scott claimed a subsidy of \$50 in lieu of boxes, 2,251; average yield, 11.30; average price, 12.50; weights, \$20, \$20.40; paid patrons, \$24,443.94; net price, per 100 pounds milk, 101.53; gross price per 100 pounds milk, 121.40; manufacturing, \$2,322.65; drawing cheese, \$38.18; pasteurizing whey, \$68.45.

MAGIC BAKING POWDER

GRUESOME ORGIES AT FANATICS' MEETING
Russian Secret Society Meeting Described by Correspondent Who Managed to Attend.

[Canadian Press.]
St. Petersburg, March 2.—A contributor to the Vecherneyavt describes one of the meetings of the "Friends of Death," a suicide league, which is said to have a large membership in this city.

The meeting, which was held in a house in the heart of the city, began early in the evening in order not to excite the attention of the police, and for the same reason the members entered singly, many by the back entrance. The attendance included men and women, young and old. Several of the men were in uniform.

The last meeting room was thickly carpeted and heavy curtains masked the windows. Over the door was the inscription, "All Hope Abandon, Ye Who Enter Here." On the door itself two crossed scythes were hung on a flaming red background. The members of the league, Hartmann and other apostles of pessimism were hung on the walls; also a large picture portraying the legendary dispute between life and death. A few candles gave the members an eerie and sinister light, by which the proceedings were conducted.

The president and other committeemen sat at a long table, covered with a black cloth, on which was an urn in which the suicidal liquids are cast.

Three dull knocks from a hammer, enveloped in black cloth, intimated that the meeting was open. The president began by expressing his sympathy with the members. He said that a dinner had been recently attempted at the house, but yet without fatal result. He added the fervent hope that she would meet the death she deserved. By way of increasing his words all present rose in silence. Another member said that he had recently received by the woman was dangerous and there was no hope of her recovery.

The greater part of the subsequent discussion turned on the question of devising original methods of suicide. It came out that nine of the members on whom the lot had fallen had previously sworn not to take their lives in commonplace conditions. Various suggestions were made, but the one most favorably received was that a considerable number of the members should commit suicide en masse, it being calculated that the sensation thereby produced would attract any number of recruits to the league.

It was proposed that a dinner be arranged at a fashionable restaurant and that the diners swallow cyanide of potassium out of champagne glasses. Their funerals would be organized with great pomp in order to affect the impressionable people.

The evening closed with the playing of a funeral march and a requiem, composed by a member of the league who recently took his life.
