Mrs. Jane Fleming, widow of Thomas Fleming, formerly of Stratford, succumbed to injuries sustained at the residence of her son-in-law, Mr. Daniel J. Kenney, of 223 Hyman street, Tuesday night. Mrs. Fleming, who was 78 years of age, slipped while descending the stairs several days ago, and no hope for her recovery had since been entertained. The funeral is to be held Friday morning to St. Peter's Cathedral and then to the Grand Trunk depot. The remains will be forwarded to Stratford for interment there on the arrival of the morning train.

INGERSOLL NIMRODS TAKING DOWN GUNS

Squirrels in the Oxford Woods Are Numerous This Fall.

Ingersoll, Nov. 13.—Local nimrods are taking down their guns again and studying geographical conditions in anticipation of a heavy slaughter of squirrel when the season opens Friday. According to reports from various sections where timber exists squirrels are said to be plentiful. Many of the hunters have been making inquiries and have their hunting territory all "staked" out, so there will likely be much craning of necks and "velvet" treading through forest aisles when the season opens. During recent seasons, and particularly since the time was extended, till the 15th of November, comparatively few squirrels have been killed. The weather has been adverse and the squirrels have had an opportunity of increasing.

Word has been received here of the death at Los Angeles, Cal., of a former highly respected and widely-known resident of West Oxford, in the person of Dr. Bradford S. Galloway. According to information received by his sister, Mrs. J. F. Williams, of this place, Dr. Galloway died very suddenly and unexpectedly of heart trouble while waiting for his dinner in a restaurant. He had been in somewhat declining health for over a year, but had not been confined to his bed. He is a son of Mr. George Galloway, formerly of West Oxford, now residing in Dakota. Besides Mrs. Williams, deceased is survived by another sister, Mrs. J. G. Currie, of West Oxford.

KATE WAS CAPRICIOUS BUT A REAL FIREHORSE

Old-Time Animal of Fire Department Died After Fourteen Years' Service.

Kate, one of the old-time fire horses of the local department, died this week at No. 5 hall, from blood-poisoning. She was 19 years of age and had been in the department for 14 years.

This removes one of the picturesque animals from the department. Kate was purchased when 5 years of age, and was placed in the central station. Firemen declared that she was one of the best horses that ever looked through a bridle.

However, she was as temperamental as a prima donna, and many fire ladders will remember Kate's attentions to them for years to come. She had an almost fiendish desire to kick everything and everybody in sight, and the careless fireman who got too close to Kate's heels paid for his temerity by spending a few days in the hospital. Fortunately, no person was ever killed by her.

At the Perrin fire, a bystander, not knowing Kate's habits, got too close to her, and as a result carried his leg in a sling for some days. Her bad habits were the cause of her death. A few weeks ago she took a notion to kick the fire hall down and back out her legs. Blood-poisoning set in, killing her this week.

It was the intention of Fire Chief Aitken to dispose of her. About two months ago she fell on the corner of Dundas and Waterloo streets, while galloping at a furious rate to a fire, and the heavy rig ran up on her. The mare was crippled after that, and lost her usefulness. Before she could be disposed of she died.

FEEBLE-MINDED STAND IN NEED OF HELP

WYOMING BECOMING BIG FRUIT PRODUCER

Almost All Kinds Are Thriving and a Large Market Being Found.

Wyoming, Nov. 13.—Wyoming and surrounding country is awakening to the possibility of a bright future before it as a fruit-growing country. The soil being so suitable to the raising of almost any kind of fruit. A portion of the village seems ideal for the berry crop, and for years the gardening of such has been carried on for considerable extent by the holders of small lots within the town limits, who disposed of their produce by carting to Petrolia and even as far as Sarnia. However, of late, owing in a large measure to the opinions of such experienced men as Johnson brothers, Mr. S. Todd and others, who are in a position to know whereof they speak, fruit growing is receiving a new impetus among the busy farmers.

On almost every farm is found an apple orchard even above the average in variety of fruit, many being planted largely to the King, Northern Spy and Baldwin, all favorites, that should find for themselves ready markets, and even in an uncultivated state present a healthy appearance.

Mr. S. L. Borrowman, one of our leading fruit growers, some few years ago bought 15 acres a mile and a half from town, which, being of a sandy nature, the owner was of his dual purpose. This he planted to apples of all marketable varieties, which peaches as fillers, which has presented a perfect picture of a well-cared-for plot, and this is the result of his dual purpose.

That our locality is gaining in reputation is evident, as only last week a farm of 100 acres of this same class of soil, a short distance further west, was bought by a Leamington man for almost \$7,000. This buyer, who is versed in fruit culture, considers he has secured first-class soil for his purpose, and wishes to secure 50 or 100 acres more near by.

Even at distant parts of Ontario are the possibilities of our locality becoming known, several having been engaged in fruit growing elsewhere in looking carefully over our soil. pronounce it, the lighter soil, a least, equal to that of the Niagara belt or adaptability to peach growing.

A GAS PIPE SET FIRE TO THE ROOF

Fire Department Had a Run to a Home on King Street.

The fire department had a run to 351 King street last evening shortly before 8 o'clock, to the residence of Mr. D. McArthur. It seems that a pipe, to carry away the fumes from a gas-burner, was run into the attic, but was not carried through the roof. A space of about six inches intervened between the pipe and the ceiling. The heat from the burner ignited the ceiling. The blaze was noticed by the family, who summoned the brigade. The fire was extinguished, the damage being about five dollars.

SOCIETY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE McNAMARAS

Dynamiting Case Referred To at Convention of American Federation of Labor.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 13.—The second day's session of the thirty-second convention of the American Federation of Labor was occupied almost entirely with the reading of the report of the executive council. In it Wm. J. Burns was arraigned as an example of his own characterization of private detectives, and the investigation of the federation since the McNamara trial was declared to show a concerted attempt by employers' associations and subsidized newspapers to destroy the federation and bring its officers into disrepute.

The report reviewed the attempts by leaders of the scout movement to eliminate the features that were objectionable to labor, and recommended that the convention this year refrain from denouncing the movement. Of the McNamara offense was a social crime. Thinking people who were made to realize the poisonous, mischievous influence of the atmosphere of industrial life were well-nigh overwhelmed by the weight of collective responsibility devolving upon them as a result of the existence of such conditions. The McNamaras were either criminally insane or insanely criminal—either condition due to imperfect education, incomplete education, or defective mentality. In any case, society is responsible for not remedying the conditions. What concerns labor and society generally is preventive measures and human betterment, so that life and working conditions may be pure, wholesome and clean. Those infected by deadly social poisons, due to social neglect, are the heritage of our own aims and those of our fathers.

Of Burns' connection with the McNamara case, the report said, in part: "Burns has not and could not substantiate his oft-repeated misstatement, 'Gompers knew.'"

PARKHILL MAN WAS INSTANTLY KILLED

John Macdonald, G. T. R. Sectionman, Hit By Train at Burlington Junction.

John Macdonald, a G. T. R. sectionman, whose home is at Parkhill, Ont., was killed at Burlington Junction on Monday through being hit by a train. It is supposed he did not hear the approach of the train. He was about 35 years of age.
