

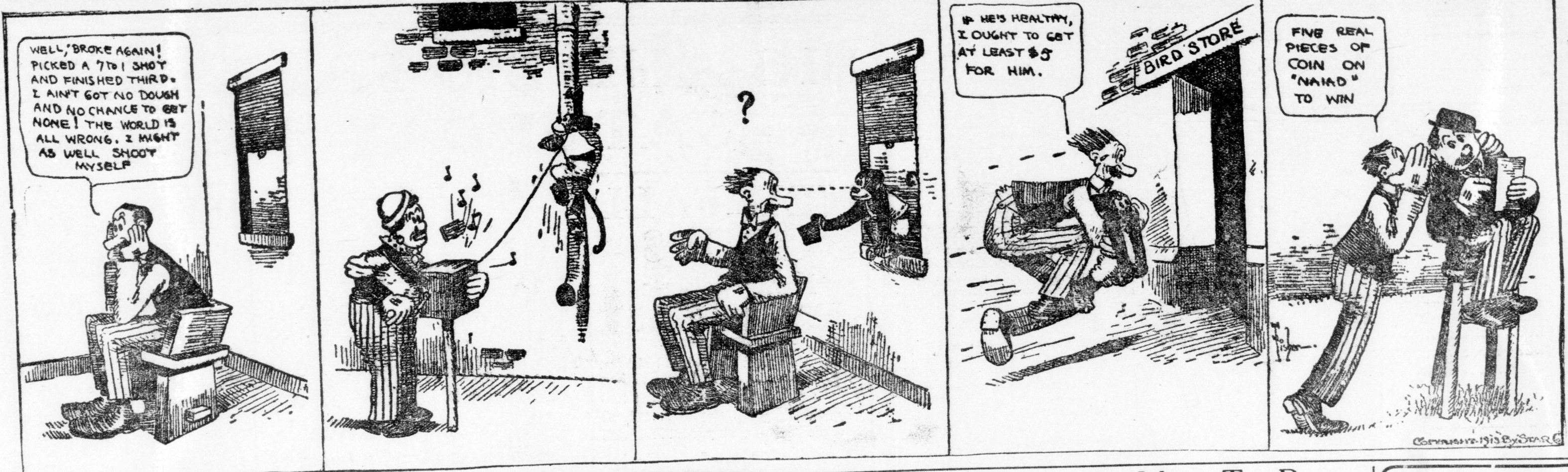

ALL CANADIAN LEAGUE
GAMES WERE POSTPONEDLocal Fans Were Much Disappointed Over Postponement of the
Ottawa-London Game in This City—Big Crowd Will Be
Out Today—Interest in Present Series at Fever Heat.

Rain put a damper on the Canadian League race yesterday, and for the third time this season every game scheduled was postponed owing to wet grounds. In this city the disappointment was great owing to the fact that London and Ottawa were due to meet in the first game of the series that is going to decide the residence of the 1913 pennant. Both teams are considerably strung-up over the coming battles, and yesterday's delay only served to make the suspense that much longer. After the first game is played the tension will relax some.

Ladies' Day Today.
Today is ladies' day, and all Friday attendance records will be broken. The gates at Tecumseh Park will be open early, and it is expected that all the stands will be filled long before the time play is called. The weather could not be improved upon for baseball, and this alone will serve to bring out a large crowd. It is likely that ground rules will be in force both today and tomorrow. The first game of tomorrow's double-header will start sharp at 2:15.

Delay Changes Plans of Managers.
Yesterday's postponement will likely cause a change in the plans of both managers. It was Manager Danahy's intention to use Heck in the box yes-

terday, and he would likely have been sent back at the Senators Saturday. He will likely pitch today's game, while Shaughnessy's choice is uncertain. The Senators have five pitchers, who are all in great shape at present, but some of them are due to get beaten badly, and this London club is the one that can do it.

Numerous Inquiries.
Had yesterday's game been played a large crowd would have been present. Phone calls were received at The Advertiser from early in the morning until half an hour before the game was to start, asking if it had been postponed. When the rain stopped about noon, and the clouds showed signs of breaking up, the outlook was hopeful, but at 1 o'clock rain came down heavily, and it did not stop until just before 3 o'clock. The game had been called off just shortly before that time.

Great Interest at Ottawa.
While local interest in the series is at fever-heat, there is even more interest in the series in Ottawa. Running stories of the game play by play will be wired direct from Tecumseh Park to all three newspapers of the capital, and sporting extras will be issued as soon as the final score comes in.

London Curling Club Will
Have to Find Another RinkDestruction of Transportation Building in Last Night's
Fire at Queen's Park Leaves This Club With-
out Place to Curl in for Next Winter.

As a result of the fire at the fair grounds last evening and the destruction of the Transportation Building, the members of the London Curling Club are put to the necessity of locating another building if they wish to indulge in the grand old winter game when the snow flies next December. Nothing remains of the Transportation Building this morning, but a level pile of ashes and cinders, and there is little prospect of another building suitable for a curling being erected on the spot in time for the curlers to play next winter.

Will Locate Another Building.
One of the members of the club stated this morning that an effort would be made to locate another rink, maybe one of the remaining buildings in Queen's Park. It is likely a meeting of the club will be called shortly to

discuss the question and take action in the matter. The club has no intention of going out of business, and although the loss of the Transportation Building is a setback, it will only serve to put new enthusiasm into the members. So far no suggestions have been offered, but it is believed there will be plenty by the time a meeting is called.

Loss Totals About \$250.
The London Club had spent quite a bit of money on fixing up the building for a rink, and its loss by fire was estimated at about \$250 this morning by one of the members. The building had been in use as a curling rink during the winter for the past three seasons, and last winter the club built a waiting-room and put in new wiring and new lights. This was all destroyed in the fire. No curling stones were in the building at the time.

WALTER JOHNSON'S
STREAK BROKENRed Sox Beat Washington's
Great Pitcher in Sensational
Manner.

COLLINS WAS AIRTIGHT

Yankees Were Handed a Bad Beating
by Athletics, Score Being
9 to 3.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 28. — Walter Johnson's winning streak of fifteen straight victories was broken in a sensational manner by the Red Sox by a 1 to 0 score in eleven innings. Except for Yerkes' single in the second inning, not a Boston player saw first base until the eleventh. Then, with one down Yerkes singled, and took third when Milan let the ball through him. Yerkes was run down on Wagner's infield tap, and Wagner reached second. With two strikes on Carrigan, he drove the ball safely to centre, and Wagner scored the only run of the game. Ray Collins pitched a grand game.

Up to today the league's leading pitcher had twirled Washington to fourteen victories without defeat. Today's game was a remarkable exhibition of Johnson's pitching skill. In the eleven innings only 35 men faced him, and but four of these reached a base. Only one man got to first base in the first nine innings. Ten Boston batters struck out and Johnson did not allow a base on balls. Score:

World's Greatest One-Day
Pitching Performance.Two Virginia League Pitchers, Bought by Washington, Stage
Sensational Games—Hedgepeth Gives One Hit and Three
Passes in Double-Header, and Ayers Fans 13 Men and Walks
None, Losing His First Game in 14 Starts.

"There isn't a really good pitcher in the minors," said a shrewd major league club owner, whose scout had just returned from fine-combing the bush leagues.

And the words were scarcely cold, before, from Petersburg, Va., came the story of the world's pitching record—18 innings, a double-header, only one hit and nary a run; by Southpaw Harry Hedgepeth, star of the Petersburg, Virginia, League Club.

And the story also informed the palpitating baseball public, that Yancey Wyatt Ayers, of the Richmond team, who opposed Hedgepeth, yielded but six hits, struck out 13 Petersburg batters, and was beaten 1 to 0, after having won 13 straight games.

The heart jumps, in major league chests, were calmed, however, when toward the end of the story, it was made plain that both pitchers had been purchased by Clarke Griffith, for Washington, and would report Sept. 18. Hedgepeth's performance was marvellous. Richmond is a hard-hitting club, but he held the sluggers in the hollow of his hand. In the first game, 23 men faced him, and in the second 39 went to the plate. He walked one man in the first game and two in the second, and did not hit a batter. The lone home hit was made in the eighth inning of the first game, but nothing else resembling a base hit was made.
