LONDON FIGHT WILL BE THREE-CORNERED

Labor Party Places Candidate in Field to Contest Local Riding.

JOHN D. JACOBS NAMED

Member of Molders' Union Secures Unanimous Support of Labor Convention.

London will have a three-cornered fight in the provincial elections, June 29, for a Labor candidate will be placed in the running.

Saturday night at a convention of delegates from local unions held in the Trades and Labor Council's Hall, John D. Jacobs, molder, was unanimously tendered the nomination of the Labor party.

James Hussey, president of the Labor Council, and E. Ingles were the only other nominees. Both withdrew.

The convention then placed itself on record as unanimously nominating Mr. Jacobs as its candidate.

Representatives of the Socialist-Democrat party were present at the convention to offer their support in backing a Labor man in the electoral fight.

In announcing their desire to co-operate with the Labor Council, Delegate Sails, of the Socialists' delegation, stated that his delegation, although representing what was, after all, a political party, had the power to pledge assistance to the Labor man, should the candidate nominated meet with their approval.

Fighting Spirit of Convention.

When the convention had finally pushed its way through the preliminaries, in which both Liberal and Conservative candidates and parties came in for criticism, its movements were characterized by a fighting spirit.

From the first, although there was opposition in the camp, there was paramount that desire to make a strong bid for recognition for the Labor forces in London.

All opposition was floored, and the program of nominating the candidate put through.

"Don't let's beat about the bush," urged Delegate Higgins, when the proceedings lagged somewhat. "We've little enough time to get out and make a telling fight. Let's use the time we have to advantage. Either we are going to nominate a candidate or we are not."

The question was raised at the outset by Delegate Jackson whether the council was in a position to finance the campaign.

After a discussion in which the majority of the council thought that there would be little difficulty in that direction, it was felt that funds would be forthcoming to handle the fight.

The running of the campaign was left with a committee.

From the sentiment expressed by the delegates from the different locals, the support tendered to the candidate will be enthusiastic and thorough.

Car workers, through their delegates, expressed their intention of supporting their candidate to the last ditch.

Boilermakers declared their readiness to get behind a Labor man. The metal polishers were unanimous in their desire to support Labor interests.

Broom-makers asserted their intention to lend their assistance to the cause.

Other locals similarly placed the question of making a bid for honors in the provincial election by backing a union man.

Brewery Workers Opposed.

The support of the tailors is not certain. Through their representative, Joseph Dean, the convention was informed that after consideration, they had turned the proposition down flat in sympathy with the tailors.

The brewers workers. They, too, did not favor the placing of a Labor candidate in the field.

Considerable discussion was evoked over the platform of the Trades and Labor Council. Representatives from the Socialist-Democrat party stated that if a platform existed they wanted it read very loudly.

In instant regard they would be certain of their ground. The result of the council had no platform that would be adaptable to the occasion.

A proposal that the platform drawn up by the tailors be adopted met with the approval of the convention after it was read.

Following is the committee which will have charge of the executive end of the campaign: Delegates, L. Higgins, Francisco, Ingles, Sails, Templeton, Moran, Powell, Burleigh, Lane, Jackson and Stinson.
