Timber Boom Gives Way Before Seeming Tidal Wave.-Flerce Storm.

[Special to The Advertiser.] SARNIA, Sept. 12. — Like a tidal wave, the top of Lake Huron rushed into and raised Sarnia Bay so rapidly, Mearly Half of Those Neces- Medina, Ont.; George Sherman, single, that a great log boom of the Cleveland-Sarnia Sawmill Company gave way this afternoon, setting adrift thirty to fifty thousand logs, which almost covered the river's surface down as far as Courta distance of twelve miles.

The bay had previously been lowered to the extent of about three feet, the wind having driven the water back. It is estimated that a million and a half feet of pine was set adrift. The tugs Sarnia City, Capt. Walter Reid, and the Michigan, of the Great Lakes Company, set out to round up the drifting jam.

Two steamers, one bound up and one down plowed through the mass.

The break occurred in the boom above the tramway. The company's men, foreseeing trouble, managed to cut off and prevent about seven million feet of logs joining the drift.
