The Jap-a-lac Graining Tool is really three tools in one-The "Plain" Oak face which is used in imitating the grain of ordinary oak.

The "Comb" which is used for blending the grain.

The "Quartered" Oak face, used for producing the quarter sawed effect.

For ordinary graining the Plain Oak face is used. Proceed as follows—have the surface prepared for graining as directed above, and while the color is still wet, draw the face of the tool through the graining color, slightly rocking it at the same time.

Be careful to rock the tool grad-ually, and to bear down with an even firm pressure. After each board has been grained, hold the tool vertically and "comb" the work—that is, draw the rubber teeth of the comb through the grained surface. After each opera-tion, the Graining Color which ad-heres to the face of the tool should be wiped off with a damp cloth.

In order to grain close to a base-board, unscrew the handlde from the tool. Then grain in the usual manner, but with the face of the tool towards you, holding the graining face at each end, between the thumb and forefinger.
