Short Hair Has Done Away With Clumsy Knot in the Wrong Place.

EARS SHOW AGAIN?

Should Study Shape of Head To Decide the Proper Cut.

An argument to my mind in favor of the bob is that it obviates hair arrangement. Except for the cutting, of which I will speak later, one's hair needs only to be brushed and smoothed into place, with an occasional marcel if one has it marcelled. Few women are clever at arranging their own hair. The bob, having done away with the clumsily wrought knot in exactly the wrong place, the many strange and unmeaning puffs dotted around the head and the untidy strands of hair straggling down the neck, has to my mind improved the appearance of the head of the average woman.

To return to the question of the actual hair cut, there are three things to be considered—first and foremost the shape of your head; second, the texture or quality of your hair; third, whether you are going to wear it straight or marcelled. How you shall wear your hair is decided by the shape of your forehead, the type of your face and the general style you affect.

Consider Shape of Head.

The shape of your head affects only the way your hair is cut in back and on top, and not the front arrangement. For instance, if your head has a tendency to be flat in the back the hair should be cut very short at the base of the skull and left a little longer at the curve of the head, in that way helping to give a rounded effect. In addition it should probably be waved to prevent its lying too close to the head. I haven't the space or the imagination to take up all the problems offered by different heads,

well-shaped head he will cold-bloodedly thin it out until it seems as if he was removing all the hair. Naturally he only does this with a well-shaped head and in cases where it is necessary. Also it is dangerous unless done by the hand of an expert.

Showing Their Ears.

I am told that many women in Paris are beginning again to show their ears. Some years ago there were all sorts of rumors about a famous beauty, Clio de Merode; that she had been born without ears, that they were deformed, etc.—all because she was the first woman of that period to cover her ears. Now we speak of showing them as an extraordinary and revolutionary fashion. Ears that are little and well shaped and pink of course a little rouge can accomplish the latter requirement, are charming, but in general I cannot see that they are much of a help to a woman's looks.

However, it may be entirely a question of eye training and we may all grow to admire them hugely if the custom of showing them really returns. For some reasons I rather doubt it, for in my opinion showing the ears demands that one should have an extremely good profile and an unusually good hair line, and even then it is not always becoming. Short hair is unquestionably comfortable, and while it is not becoming to all, neither were the different ways of arranging the hair. I think it has improved the appearance of the average head, and I believe the bob has come to stay.

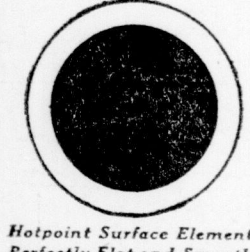

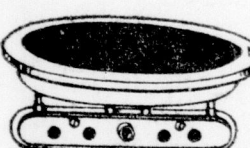
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
