

DEFINITE REORGANIZATION AT HOSPITAL STARTED

Reorganization Plans At Victoria Hospital Are Under Way Today

Temporary Heads of Departments Appointed and Work Assigned.

MAKE NO CHANGES

R. F. Armstrong States Present Executives at Institution Are Satisfactory.

Definite plans for a thorough reorganization of the Victoria Hospital administration went into effect this morning. R. F. Armstrong, of the Citizens' Research Institute of Canada, who for the past month has been acting as temporary superintendent and investigating conditions, announced today that the temporary heads of departments had been appointed and their responsibilities made known to them.

"There has been no change in the personnel of the various departments," he told The Advertiser. "In fact we cannot wish for better executives—it is all a matter of rearranging things until a perfect working machine has been produced."

Those who head the departments are: Miss E. Ross, superintendent of nurses; Dr. Roy Kingswood, chief resident physician; A. J. Martin, purchasing agent and superintendent of works; N. D. Mills, accounting department; C. J. Martin, drug department; Miss M. Struthers, diet kitchen; Mrs. N. Trebilcock, kitchen stewardess; and L. Martin, pharmacist.

Detail Work Planned.

"The details for which these heads will be responsible have been blocked out," Mr. Armstrong stated, "and an organization chart is now being worked out so that all details will be tied in. There will be no overlapping, no loose ends and responsibility at all times can be placed. Strong co-operation is being given by the heads of the departments, and within a few days everything should be operating in an efficient and satisfactory manner. There will be daily conferences between the hospital superintendent and the department heads, and a weekly meeting of all department heads, when general executive problems can be considered."

Asked regarding the appointment of a permanent superintendent of Victoria Hospital, Mr. Armstrong said that notices have been drawn up for publication, asking for applications for that position.

The reorganization plans drawn up by Mr. Armstrong also state that the executive officials will be placed before the general superintendent for his approval of their proposed department reorganization, the methods to be adopted, the personnel required, etc.

Service to Citizens. "We are all striving to perfect an efficient administration, one that will be a real service to the citizens of London, and to obtain harmony in each and every department, and in the institution as a whole."

The purchasing agent and superintendent of works will be made responsible for all hospital purchasing, fire protection, all outside work in connection with the hospital, including heating, laundry, repairs, gardening, plumbing, and other general outside work. The superintendent of nurses will be made responsible for what shall be known in future as "nursing details," while the chief resident physician will be responsible for "medical details."

Included in the plans drawn up by Mr. Armstrong are the following: Purchasing and stores, general stock and account system is being installed which will show in the account.

DECIDES TO DELAY FIRE DEPARTMENT SUGGESTED PROBE

Citizens' Research Institute Thinks Separate Survey Too Expensive.

INQUIRY IS HELPFUL

Committee To Await Further Action To Be Taken by Council.

The survey of the fire department by the Citizens' Research Institute, which was agreed to by the council last night, has been temporarily held up pending a further meeting between the council and the Research Institute committee. The committee had intended to carry out a survey of one department by itself, not only too expensive, but also that it looks invidious. Why, they say, should any one department be singled out for a survey, when it is admitted that there are other departments just as much in need of the help of the committee.

Tells Underlying Motive.

Col. W. J. Brown, chairman of the local committee of the Research Institute, stated to The Advertiser this morning the underlying motives of the committee. "First of all," he said, "we never refer to these surveys as investigations. There is no desire to turn a spotlight on any department, neither is there any wish to incriminate any one person. The whole thing is a matter of the Research Institute is to help by expert experience in relieving the departmental troubles of municipalities."

Had Proven Satisfactory.

Colonel Brown explained that the survey at the hospital had proved satisfactory to the people of London, and thought that a similar process would be of the other departments would be just as helpful.

The Citizens' Research committee has canvassed many Londoners, and has been able to raise half the price of the survey, which the council will only be asked to provide the other half. When the committee asked the council whether they wished the survey to be made, they expected that the council would want surveys of all the city departments. The council so far have only agreed to a survey of the fire department, and the committee have as yet taken no action in the matter, on account of the increased over-charge of the survey, which would follow the bringing of outsiders into Toronto merely to make one survey.

Tomorrow night they hope to get the sanction of the council to conduct the surveys of the remaining departments.

Finders of Skeleton Continue Their Hunt

London Dentist Finds Teeth in Good State of Preservation.

Cecil and Tom Champness, who Sunday discovered a skeleton buried a few feet beneath the surface of the ground in Maitland and pit, unearthed today a few more bones. It is the belief that the spot at which the skeleton was found was once the burial ground of the Attawandrian tribe of Indians, who inhabited that district some 250 years ago. A local dentist who inspected the jawbone and teeth of the skeleton, said that it was a remarkable thing that the teeth should remain intact for such a length of time. The teeth are in excellent condition, and this fact alone proves that the skeleton is that of an Indian, because their teeth were not open to decay to the same extent that ours are today, owing to the difference in food.

The two boys who discovered the skeleton are diligently working in the hopes that they will unearth another one.

LONDON CLERICS VOICE APPROVAL OF VOTE ON UNION

Expect To See Effect of the Decision Carried Out in Few Years.

BEATTIE PLEASED

Rev. J. Garbutt Believes Step Will Prove of Untold Benefit.

Presbyterian approval of church union finds ready endorsement in the ranks of local Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists. Union is a degree of becoming a reality as a result of the action of the general assembly at Port Arthur, and London clergy view the over-whelming vote in its favor as the most forward movement in recent Canadian church history.

The outcome of the assembly's action, according to prevailing local opinion, will be actual union made within a period of two to three years. Rev. Dr. Beattie, minister of First Presbyterian Church, stated today that the committee appointed would now be obliged to seek the necessary government legislation for some months or years yet, but there was now no possibility of any extended delay.

"The Presbyterian vote," said Dr. Beattie, "was not actually on church union. It was rather a vote as to whether union should become our immediate goal or whether it should be delayed. The anti-unionists and moderates combined and made up the minority vote. But it is safe to say that now the vote has been taken the denominations will fall in line. Only the recalcitrants are expected to offer a battle."

Rev. Garbutt Pleased. Rev. J. Garbutt of the Dundas Street Methodist Church was pleased with the result of the vote. He thought the Presbyterian situation was an extremely delicate one, but believed unanimity would finally be achieved. There were great difficulties ahead yet, he said, but the necessary steps that would bring about actual union within a few years' period had been taken.

"The decision must go to the courts and will be passed by each provincial legislature within a reasonable time of long period of time. I am delighted with the Presbyterian action, however, and believe it will prove to be of untold benefit to the church as a whole."

Rev. Matthew Kelly, representing the Congregationalists, expressed keen pleasure over the vote and said that at Port Arthur he had expected such a large majority and believed the outcome would solidify denominational ranks to the advantage of the Dominion and the church.

Rev. H. B. Storey saw in the favorable outcome of the vote the final elimination of denominationalism in Canada. Canada, he declared, was a pioneer in church union, and other countries would doubtless follow her action within the ensuing decade.

Rivalry Experienced. "There has been a certain amount of denominational rivalry experienced by all three churches, and this will be entirely cut off as soon as union comes into operation. The three denominations in connection with the United Church of Canada and with mutual co-operation will have of their attention more for the benefit of the people than they have in the past."

"We only hope that the necessary legislation which the Dominion government will be pushed through as rapidly as possible. The quicker we unite the better for Christianity, and the simpler the preaching of the gospel."

Other clergymen were equally enthusiastic. According to general opinion of laymen as well as ministers, the long struggle for organic union is now practically at an end and the church can look forward to a bigger field of work and a more fertile sphere for the service of mankind.

Swiss Immigrants Arrive in Dominion

Montreal, June 12.—Happy at reaching the land of their adoption, a party of 10 Swiss immigrants arrived at the Bonaventure station last night in a special Canadian National train from Halifax, where they disembarked on Sunday afternoon from the White Star-Dominion liner Pittsburg.

The party traveled from Zurich by special train to Cherbourg, where they embarked on the steamer.

Of healthy stock, the new arrivals were for the most part young men already experienced in agricultural development. They are en route to the western provinces in charge of a conductor.

The inspector accordingly tendered his formal resignation yesterday.

They hasten to explain, however, that they feel that he should be severely reprimanded for his breach of their regulations, but they do not desire more drastic action.

One alderman proposes that they should consider a proposal to reappoint the inspector of his car, and even that he would ever, mm mm mm Mayor Wenige declared yesterday that he would favor the removal of city cars from all city officials or employees.

Other proposals will be submitted tonight, and some of the aldermen maintain that as Mr. Piper has been a valuable official to the city during the past ten years, a hard worker at all times, he should be retained for a suitable reprimand. They point out, also, that he has never received the remuneration that he was justly entitled to, and they are prepared to battle for his retention at all costs.

Special Cable to The Advertiser. Paris, June 12.—Two Germans and a French soldier were killed in the Ruhr today and another German died of wounds.

Four explosions occurred on railway lines, and sabotage and unrest appeared to be growing.

A French sentinel was shot and killed as he walked his post at Becklinghausen. Later a German civilian is reported to have been slain by French troops at that city. Another was killed at Dortmund, where one died of wounds received when the French shot 35 persons who were out after curfew.

Members of Tariff Committee of Canadian Manufacturers' Association Present Report.

NATIONAL SCANDAL

Great Organization With Heavy Financial Backing Charged at Work.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, June 12.—Smuggling of manufactured goods into Canada has reached alarming proportions and a great smuggling organization with heavy financial backing is in existence and engaged in operations that are creating a national scandal, according to the report of the tariff committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

The report says that silk fabric and silk garments are especially involved in these smuggling operations. It is remarked that, despite the efforts of government authorities, only a few of the offenders have been convicted and these, generally speaking, have received very light punishment.

Co-operation of all law-abiding people in an effort to end this smuggling activity is urged. In the discussion of the tariff committee's report today particular attention was given to the matters of sales tax, customs and trade treaties.

General indignation was given by various speakers to the sentiments expressed by President Shaw yesterday that higher tariffs were necessary to protect Canadian industries.

Hear Addresses. This morning the association heard addresses by Sir George Foster, president of the Dominion Fire Prevention Association, and St. Bastedo, superintendent of the government anti-smuggling branch.

At the luncheon George Henderson of Montreal addressed the gathering on "National Advertising." This afternoon the delegates attended a reception at Government House.

The development of export trade that is being fostered by the part of the commercial intelligence committee. The need for cultivating amicable trade relations with Europe, Asia, and Australia was strongly stressed. The report stated that foreign trade was gradually assuming greater importance as a factor in Canada's commerce, and the future of the country rested largely on the extent to which this is developed.

Regret Fire Losses. The insurance committee regretted that fire losses to industry during 1922 were the worst on record and advocated better precautionary measures employed by business executives. They also urged members of the association to make fuller use of the insurance department in engineering and seeking information relating to insurance affecting manufacturers.

Principle Vindicated. The tariff committee report declared that the policy of extending the principle of trade preference by the empire has been vindicated by the results so far obtained. But it emphatically protested against further extension of any preference at the expense of Canadian industry. It was questionable whether there had not been some injury already done through the tariff reductions made during the past two years.

The introduction of the sales tax in 1920 was the subject of the committee's observations. The committee suggested that the operation of the tax be clarified as much as possible. The trade treaties between foreign countries and Canada, recently made by Mr. Fielding, were heartily endorsed. Smuggling and the alarming proportions it has reached in Canada was freely commented upon and it was recommended that the penalty for smuggling be increased.

The membership committee informed the association it had maintained the membership above that registered last year in spite of numerous resignations, and the total strength was now 4,558.
