made known to them. "There has been no change in the personnel of the various department heads," he told The Advertiser. "In fact we cannot wish for better executives-it is all a matter of rearranging things until a perfect working machine has been produced.

Those who head the departments are: Miss E. Ross, superintendent of nurses: Dr. Roy Kingswood, resident physician; A. J. McGuffin, purchasing agent and superintendent of works: N. D. Mills, accounting de-partment; C. J. Martin, drug department; Miss M. Struthers, diet kitchen; Mrs. N. Trebilcock, kitchen stewardess, and L. Martin, pharma-cist.
