

MOTHER DENIES KILLING CHILDREN

Father Arrested—Sensational Evidence Unearthed in Sudbury Crime.

Canadian Press Despatch. Sudbury, July 15.—New evidence of a sensational kind has been gathered by the police in connection with the murder of the two young Kossack children at Argilla, on the Canadian National Railway, 250 miles from here.

As a result of investigations during the past two days, a new theory has been advanced, and the father, who was arrested at Horns Point, is now held in connection with the crime. The mother is also held in the Sudbury district jail on two charges. Until today she was in a state of hysteria, moaning and weeping continuously, but was calm enough to talk to Inspector Storey this afternoon. "I will finish the children because I do not want them any more."

PARLEY FINDS NO CURE FOR PACIFIC TROUBLE

Institute of Relations Ends Honolulu Sessions Without Publishing Results.

Honolulu, July 15.—The Institute of Pacific Relations, which has been holding sessions here since July 1, has disbanded without publishing a panacea for Pacific troubles and without pronouncing good or evil various national policies. It has not even recommended any specific action by the governments at Washington, Tokyo and Peking.

It went further and even refrained from officially summarizing its findings from the fortnight's inquiry into what is going on in the Pacific, yet it accomplished its purpose of bringing together for unofficial and undampened expression of opinion and exchange of ideas leading spirits of the various countries.

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MINISTER DENIES \$75,000 SALARY

Graham States He Has Not Spoken To Sir Henry On Matter.

Ottawa, July 15.—"There is nothing in the report that the government's contract with Sir Henry Thornton has been renewed for a term of five years from October next at an annual salary of \$75,000 and a yearly expense account of \$25,000," stated Right Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways and canals, today.

"Sir Henry has not spoken to me, nor have I spoken to him, in reference to this matter," continued Mr. Graham.

The government's contract with Sir Henry, as president of the Canadian National Railways, which covers a period of three years at an annual salary of \$50,000, expires in October next.

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RESIDENTS CHARGE BUMPING OF CARS IS SHAKING HOUSES

Report On Track Conditions Will Be Sought by Committee.

4 MEMBERS ATTEND

Sale of Springs Property Not Handled With Definite Recommendation.

Complete reports on track conditions of the London Street Railway lines will be sought by No. 1 committee of the city council, following recommendation by Ald. L. H. Douglass at last night's session. Complaint was entered by residents of Askin street that tracks there are in bad shape.

"They say that the rattle of the cars is shaking the roofs of the houses," remarked Ald. Douglass when a petition from Askin street residents was read.

A sparse quorum was present at last night's committee session. Chairman McKay, Ald. Douglass and Ald. Cliff held forth for an hour until reinforcement came just before adjournment. Ald. Doig made the fourth member. Most of the business of the evening had to be disposed of without definite recommendation to the council.

Ald. Cliff moved to permit fire apparatus to participate in the annual Labor Day parade.

Sale of the Thames street sulphur springs property could not be handled with a definite recommendation, though Chairman McKay stated that as far as he was concerned there would be no fixed assessment offered intending purchasers.

Purchase of a LaFrance fire pump was brought up and the claims of the firm to a superior and more economical product, made in Canada, were submitted by a representative of the Toronto company. There was no opposition to the purchase proposal, and the matter was sent on to the council.

According to reports given at last night's meeting 75 per cent of the fire pump apparatus now in Canada is rotary gear type. Centrifugal types total 15 per cent and piston types 10 per cent.

A. Deviney & Sons are recommended to get the coal contract for the fire department, supplying 80 tons of egg coal at \$12.35 a ton.</
