

YOUNG GIRL KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Ruby Flood, Age 16, Crushed
To Death When Car Over-
turns in Ditch.

Woodstock, Oct. 11.—Ruby L. Flood, sixteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Flood, Delater street, is dead, and Kent Stevens, son of Dr. J. M. Stevens, this city, is suffering from shock as the result of an automobile crash which occurred on the Norwich road, four miles south of Woodstock, last night, when the car in which they were riding overturned into a ditch. Stevens, who was driving, was pinned under the car, and Miss Flood was crushed to death instantaneously.

It is believed Stevens is suffering from internal injuries. He states that while he was driving south, and at a sharp turn in the road he was blinded by the headlights of the first of the approaching cars. Under the impression that the approaching car was about to crash into him head on, Stevens turned his car sharply to the left, with the result that it over-turned in the ditch. An inquest will be held on Tuesday by Coroner Dr. MacKay.

LIBERALS HOLD RALLY AT CHATHAM

Rutherford Addresses Enthusi-
astic Gatherin — Drayton
Speaks To Conservatives.

Chatham, Oct. 11.—The chilled condition of the city armories Saturday night was in keeping with the reception accorded Sir Henry Drayton, former minister of finance, and A. D. Chaplin, the candidate of the Conservative party in Kent.

The chief speaker discussed the sugar-beet question at some length, but failed to disclose anything which the growers of beets did not know. He devoted some time to painting a picture of alleged gloomy conditions in Canada, his funeral utterances, perhaps, adding to the gloom of the meeting, which was advertised as a Conservative rally.

He closed with a claim that the present election contest is not a party fight, making a plea to the patriotism of the electors to see that there is a change of government. "Is it not the least you can do for your country and for yourselves?" he said.
