

LIBERALS GAIN NIPissing LOSE IN PRINCE EDWARD

Official Counts Bring Changes
in Several Ridings—
Ferguson Defeated.

CABINET GATHERS

Prime Minister Likely To Make
Decision To Carry On
Government.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.—Post-mortems and speculations continued to comprise the political menu of the capital today. No bulletins were issued to the public on the condition of the delicate problem of government. It was a day of consultations so far as the prime minister and other members of the government were concerned. No formal meeting of the cabinet was held. Mr. Mackenzie King and his colleagues conferred among themselves and with prominent supporters of the government.

Some hope is entertained that the situation may be more settled within the next 24 hours.

To See Governor-General.

The prime minister is expected to have a further interview with the governor-general within the standing of the parties is known definitely, following which he will issue a statement as to his intentions. As the cabinet is to meet tomorrow it is hoped that the premier will be in a position to make a definite announcement afterwards.

There is no reason to believe the government does not intend to carry on and to meet parliament at an early session. The problem before the prime minister as to whether he should take that course or resign and let Mr. Meighen try his hand is a delicate one, and is the more difficult for lack of precedent. Mr. King is required to make a decision in a question such as never before has confronted a prime minister of Canada. The first factor in the situation, and one that is making Mr. King's political opponents more anxious that the head of the government, with all his worries, is that the Conservatives have not enough strength to control parliament. Since he could reasonably hope to control it, Mr. King's friends and followers are advising him that he should accept the task.

Being Carefully Considered.

The reconstruction of the government in the situation resulting from last Thursday's election presents questions which are being canvassed carefully by the premier in advance of a final decision as to whether he is to remain or offer his resignation to the governor-general. He has five portfolios for which to find occupants who can be reasonably sure of election. W. D. Evans, Mr. King's friend and follower, is advising him that he should accept the task.

LIBERALS GAIN.

North Bay, Nov. 3.—The official count here today of the federal election vote in Nipissing places the constituency in the Liberal column, with a majority of 53. The vote stood: E. A. Lapierre, Liberal, 9,132; John Ferguson, Conservative, 9,079. The unofficial count had given Mr. Ferguson a majority of eleven.

SINCLAIR DEFEATED.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 3.—The election of John Messervy, Conservative, over Hon. John E. Sinclair, minister without portfolio, is now generally considered, as the result of a complete checking-up of the figures furnished by the deputy returning officers, although the issue will not finally be decided before declaration day. The rechecked figures for the three candidates in line for the junior seat in Queens, as accepted by the Charlottetown Patriot (Liberal), give Messervy, Conservative, the victory by 24 votes. They are: Messervy, Cons., 7,424; Sinclair, Lib., 7,400; McKinnon, Cons., 7,398.

developments today, Bonaventure, Quebec, goes into the doubtful column of the general election results of Thursday, and it may not be known until declaration day whether Hon. Charles Maclellan, previously reported elected with a substantial majority, or Theodore Paquet, the Conservative candidate, has been returned.

Outgoing polls have substantially changed the returns, and with the rejection of 53 ballots previously counted, and with further figures coming in, a slight majority previously credited to Hon. Mr. Maclellan has been fluctuating from 40 down to 20. Mr. Paquet declares that in the event that his opponent is elected with a majority of less than 100, he will ask for a recount.

CASA LOMA WILL BE SOLD FOR \$450,000

American Firm Secures Option
on Home of Sir Henry
Pellatt.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—With the granting of an option on Casa Loma, the former home of Sir Henry Pellatt, to an American firm, the Fuller Construction firm, comes the news that this building, for many years past one of the outstanding landmarks of this part of Canada, will shortly be made over into a combined dance hall and apartment house.

The sale price named in the option, \$450,000, represents only about one-quarter of what it cost to construct the building originally. The proposed sale will include the house proper, with a floor space of 38,069 feet, the stables, which will be converted into garages for the tenants of the apartment and the land on which the house and stables were built. This is 5.56 acres in extent. It is estimated that the fifty suites which will be available in the reconstructed building will bring a revenue of \$200,000 annually.

The original amount spent by Sir Henry Pellatt in erecting this structure was \$1,500,000, while the land cost him about \$100,000 additional.

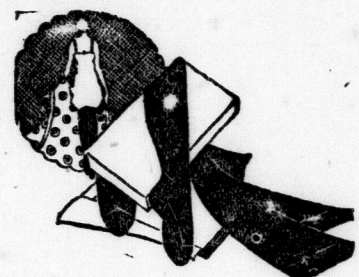

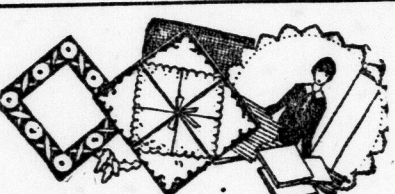
