CABINET GATHERS

Prime Minister Likely To Make Decision To Carry On Government.

> BY E. C. BUCHANAN. Special to The Advertiser by Staff Correspondent.

Ottawa, Nov. 3.-Post-mortems and speculations continued to comprise the political menu of the capital today. No bulletins were issued to the public on the condition of the delicate problem of government. It was a day of consultations so far as the prime minister and other members of the government were concerned. No formal meeting of the cabinet was held. Mr. Mackenzie King and his colleagues conferred among themselves and with prominent supporters

of the government.
Some hope is entertained that the situation may be more settled within the next 24 hours. To See Governor-General.

The prime minister is expected to have a further interview with the governor-general when the standing of the parties is known definitely, following which he will issue a statement as to his intentions. As the cab-inet is to meet tomorrow it is hoped that the premier will be in a position to make a definite announcement af-

There is no reason to believe the government does not intend to carry on and to meet parliament at an early session. The problem before the prime minister as to whether he should take that course or resign and let Mr. Meighen try his hand is a delicate one, and is the more difficult for lack of precedent, Mr. King is required to make a decision in a question such as never before has confronted a prime minister of Canada. The first factor in the situation, and one that is making Mr. King's political op-ponents more anxious that the head of the government, with all his wor-ries, is that the Conservatives have not enough strength to control par-liament. Since he could reasonably hope to control it, Mr. King's friends and followers are advising him that he should accept the task.

Being Carefully Considered.

The reconstruction of the government in the situation resulting from last Thursday's election presents questions which are being canvassed carefully by the premier in advance of a final decision as to whether he is to remain or offer his resignation to the governor-general. He has five portfolios for which to find occupants who can be reasonably sure of elec-tion. W. D. Euler and James Mal-colm are still mentioned as likely

choices of the prime minister.

As for Mr. King himself, he will have no trouble in finding a seat.

Already he has a wide choice at his disposal. It is believed that he will decide to remain in his own provence.

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
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
