The Creditors' Meeting in Favor of Having the Assignees Removed.

Resolutions Passed as Suggestions to the Court in Dealing With the Case.

The meeting of creditors called by the assignees of Green, Worlock & Co. in the Board of Trade rooms yesterday afternoon, was of a pretty lively nature, and part of the time was not exactly harmonious as far as the differences of opinion of some of the speakers was concerned. The tedious and necessary precautions taken to preclude the entrance to the meeting of any but creditors or their representatives occupied nearly an hour, so that it was 4 o'clock before the gathering came to order.

Mr. J. Stuart Yates stated the object of the assignees in calling the meeting—to see whether the majority of the creditors approved of the action of the meeting of 27th April, authorizing Mr. Wm. Smyth to take legal proceedings for replacing trustees Heisterman and Coltart by Hon. Robert Beaven.

Mr. Henry Waller being chosen chairman, Mr. Coltart was given a hearing to enable him to make an explanation. He stated that at the first meeting called by the assignees an almost unanimous decision of confidence in the course of the assignees had been expressed, and though prepared at that first meeting to hand in his resignation, he had believed the creditors desired it, he had considered the expression of the creditors sufficient to justify him in retaining his position.

Mr. Alex. Wilson objected to this mode of proceeding. He claimed that the meeting was simply a move to forestall the action of the court.

Mr. Yates explained that, on the contrary, the meeting was held procedurally with the consent of the court, which has been consulted by the solicitors on both sides. The meeting was really to see if the 114 creditors who expressed a wish at the meeting of the 27th April to change the assignees, were a majority or not of the whole number.

Mr. Wilson—Does Mr. Smyth know of his solicitor going to the judge? If not, the case had been adjourned for the purpose of the assignees preparing affidavits, and this was the way they were going about it.

The appointment of a secretary was suggested at this point, and Mr. G. H. Brown was selected to fill the position. Mr. Smyth, in reply to Mr. Wilson's question, said he had had no knowledge of his solicitor taking the steps stated by Mr. Yates.

Mr. Thornton Fell remarked that it was not customary for a solicitor to run around after his clients to tell him every step he took in his interests. Mr. Coltart's remarks about his resignation had no doubt been misunderstood, for no matter how the meeting treated it the matter would have to go to court for settlement, and Mr. Coltart could not resign without an order of court. No trustee, once appointed, could resign without the court.

Mr. Brown—How if he were there illegally? Mr. Fell—Ask Mr. Wilson. (Laughter.)

Mr. Yates explained that this was simply an advisory meeting, to get the voice of the creditors.

After some time spent in discussing what business should first be taken up, the secretary read the notice calling the meeting, after which:

Mr. Noah Shakespeare moved, seconded by Levi W. Myers, that "Whereas the unsecured creditors are the only ones whose interests will be affected by any future mismanagement on the part of the trustees, therefore be it resolved that upon any motion having for its object the continuance of the present trustees, or their office the votes of the unsecured creditors only be recorded."

Mr. Yates suggested that the better way would be that votes of the secured creditors be kept separate from those of the unsecured and presented to the court in that way.

Mr. Shakespeare, however, objected to secured creditors voting at all.

Mr. Fell, in response to Mr. Shakespeare's motion, would like to see Mr. Coltart's "future mismanagement" clearly defined. No matter who the trustees might be in future the words were a reflection on them and suggested an insult to Mr. Beaven should be appointed, as they implied there would be "future mismanagement."

Mr. A. Wilson—Never mind Mr. Beaven; mind yourself.

Some sharp words followed between Mr. Fell and Mr. Wilson, the former objecting to persons coming there "grunting and growling and with unseemly opposition trying to turn a meeting into a bear garden."

Things smoothed over after a while, and Mr. Shakespeare's motion being put was carried on a show of hands by a large majority.

What was the next proceeding, drew forth further discussion.

Mr. Shakespeare held that the trustees having called the meeting, should bring in a resolution of some sort. The feeling of the creditors had already been shown, but the trustees had treated the employers almost with contempt in their disregard of the creditors' wishes. There was too much expense in winding up the estate.

Hon. Levi W. Myers had a resolution that he would fill the bill exactly, and cover the whole ground. He moved, seconded by John Kinman, "That this meeting approve of the resolution passed at the meeting of creditors held on April 27, 1894, authorizing Mr. Wm. Smyth to apply to the court for the removal of Messrs Heisterman and Coltart and the appointment of Hon. R. Beaven in their stead."

Mr. Wilson maintained that the \$32,000 to Mrs. Green's credit should not be voted upon.

Mr. Hayward held differently. The vote could be kept separate.

The voting was then taken by ballot on the value of the amounts due to creditors as fixed by the statute. The results were: For, 433; against, 204; majority for resolution, 229.

Besides there were secured creditors' votes against the resolution as follows: B. C. Corporation, 13; Wells Fargo, 21. There were also 35 votes against the resolution representing the \$32,000 to which Mr. Wilson objected.

Mr. Shakespeare said that as it was desirable to close up the affairs of the bank as economically as possible, he would move, seconded by Mr. A. Wilson, that in the opinion of this meeting, 3 per cent. is ample compensation for the assignees; this amount

to cover all clerical expenses as well. This was simply a repetition of a resolution carried at a preceding meeting.

The Chairman, while he saw no harm in receiving the resolution, held it did not come under the purpose of the meeting. The motion was carried.

Mr. Shakespeare had another resolution to offer. He believed Mr. Fell was solicitor for both bank and assignees. One man could not serve two masters, and though he would not say a word against Mr. Fell as an honest upright man, it was not fair for him to hold both offices.

The Chairman—"You will get him all the cheaper at that if he works for both sides at one price." (Laughter.)

Mr. Shakespeare moved, seconded by Mr. Charles Hayward, to a point of order, asked if the motion was in order. This being a meeting called for a specific purpose, he held that that business alone should be considered.

The Chairman agreed to this, but there was nothing to keep them from passing resolutions till midnight and then presenting them to court.

Mr. Fell remarked that he did not mind whether the resolution passed or not. It was simply a matter of record, and he would like to see it in the papers. (No, no.) He had no desire to publish him. He had no longer to represent the assignees any more than they wished his services, and it was only a matter of decency to leave it in the hands of the assignees. As to his being solicitor for the bank, that was absurd—the bank did not exist.

Another passage of words between Mr. Fell and Mr. A. Wilson followed. In the midst of which the motion was put and carried, and the meeting adjourned.

THE CITY.

The steamer Quadra returned from Vancouver yesterday afternoon and left immediately for Cape Mudge with the coxswain in which the deceased lightkeeper will be borne to his last resting place. It is not yet known whether the interment will be at the Cape or in Ross Bay cemetery.

A petition for the organization of a Presbyterian church in the James Bay district, with Rev. P. McF. Macleod as pastor, is now in circulation among those interested, and as it will not meet with any opposition, it is expected that organization will be perfected early in June, at the same time that the Presbyterian meets for the induction of Rev. W. L. Clay into the charge of St. Andrew's church.

The Westminster News is a new daily four-page morning paper that made its first appearance at the Royal City on Thursday. Judging from the neat, well-arranged appearance of its first number, its well-written editorials and newsy local columns, the News will soon be a favorite in Westminster city and district. The News supports the present provincial administration, believing it to be acting in the true interests of the country.

The schoolroom at Cedar Hill was crowded last evening on the occasion of the lecture and entertainment under the auspices of the Presbyterian church. Miss Cameron gave a very graphic description of the trip through the Midway Plaisance and the word pictures of the scenes witnessed there being especially good. Mr. Fleming expounded the lantern very successfully, the views shown especially illustrated and supplemented the lecture. At the conclusion of the lecture an excellent musical programme was rendered, varied by a poem on the great exhibition, by Mr. James Deane, who gained his inspiration on the grounds during his six months' visit last summer. A vote of thanks was given to the lecturer and to those who contributed to the programme.

A TRIAL for legal separation came up before Mr. Justice Crease yesterday, the petitioner being Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Mendorf, wife of the respondent Jacob Mendorf, of the 134 Mile House, on the Cariboo road. The couple had been married in 1874, and according to the petitioner, her husband had, after the first few years, systematically abused her, not content with brutally beating and kicking her frequently, wrongfully accused her of immorality. The evidence of the son and daughter corroborated the wife's testimony, which disclosed horrible treatment on the part of her husband. His Lordship granted the petition for judicial separation, with costs, to be paid by the husband. Mr. S. Perry Mills appeared for the petitioner, and Mr. H. Dallas Helmecken for the respondent. Today Mrs. Mendorf's petition for alimony will be heard.

THE history of "Prospecting for Gold in Cariboo" was told by Mr. George Ferguson in his lecture delivered at Pioneer hall last evening, and proved of unusual interest to those who were lucky enough to be present. Mr. Ferguson having been a resident of Cariboo for the last thirty-nine years has been in a position to intelligently follow the course of its mining development, and naturally may be considered an authority on that portion of the Province. He traced the work of the hardy pioneer prospectors of the past and spoke of what he thought should be done in the future to build up the mining industry in Cariboo. He holds that north of Barkerville and towards the Fraser River there is a hundred miles' length of country which if thoroughly prospected would produce some of the richest mines ever yet discovered in the Province, and would result in immense benefits not only to the Province but to the Dominion at large by adding enormously to the wealth of Canada.

CAPTAIN DONALD UNQUHART, whose death was announced in a recent issue, was buried yesterday afternoon from his late residence on Menzies street, the occasion being taken advantage of by his numerous friends to testify both by their presence and their floral tributes the high estimation in which the deceased was held by them. The flowers were the choicest that it was possible to procure, and their number and variety is worthy of special remark. Among the most noteworthy features of these tributes were from Mrs. and the Misses Dunsmuir, Lady Munro, Mr. James Dunsmuir, Capt. and Mrs. Irving, Mr. and Mrs. Munro, Mr. and Mrs. John Graham, Mr. F. York, Mr. Horns, Mrs. Rudge, Mrs. Medema, Mrs. Murray, the Misses Murfrees and Miss F. Jackson. The hour of the funeral was 2:30, when a most appropriate and tender service was conducted by Rev. P. McF. Macleod, who also performed the ceremonies at the grave. The pallbearers were Captains Lewis, Grant and Hackett, and Messrs. E. B. Marvin, John Graham and James Burns.

ON A SEA OF ICE.

The Terrible Experience of Captain Larsen and His Shipwrecked Crew.

Return of the "Borealis"—The "Rose-Hill's" Plans—Sealers Coming Home.

The steamer Bertha arrived at Nanaimo from Kodiak, Alaska, yesterday afternoon, bringing very little freight or Northern news, but a number of most interesting passengers in the persons of Captain Larsen and his crew, lost from the San Francisco sailing schooner Undanited on the 7th of March last. The Undanited, it will be remembered, was wrecked in a sea of ice, sixty-seven miles from shore, and about twenty miles outside the mouth of the Copper river. The vessel was quickly ground to powder by the thousands of ice floes which had compassed her destruction, and the shipwrecked crew were forced to spend a full month all but three days on the float-ice, on which they drifted hither and thither until picked up by a passing coaster on the 4th of April, five days after which they were landed at Kodiak. They are now on their way home to San Francisco, where they will spend the next few months in resting their bodies, and regaining if possible their health, which has been greatly shattered by the long exposure and terrible experiences on the ice.

THE "BOREALIS" ARRIVES.

The second of the fleet to return home from the Coast sealing grounds, after having been ordered to do so by H.M.S. Hyacinth, is the Borealis, in command of Capt. George Myers, which sailed into port last evening. On the 8th inst., at 2 o'clock in the morning, the schooner was overtaken by the man-of-war, and after some inquiries had been made as to her intentions was given orders to proceed to Victoria. Unlike the Triumph, the Borealis' guns, spears and log were not molested by the warship. In the morning of his arrival Capt. Myers stated that he had secured 300 seals, the result of the craft, for besides laying out about \$2,000 here in getting the vessel ready for the expedition and the amount of money required for the payment of the wages and other incidental expenditures, he had guaranteed to his hunters \$1,800, while no one of them made over \$36 during the season. He expects, however, to be able to get some remuneration for this outfit in the fall, as he will then take the same hunters in to Behring sea, when the schooner, with others of the fleet, leaves here in July.

THE "ROSEHILL." The schooner Rosehill reached Nanaimo yesterday on her way to Alaska. Many things point to the fact that the Rosehill is owned by the Pacific coast steamship company instead of the unknown Alaska steamship company. J. B. Patterson, her master, has for years been in the service of the P.C.S.S. company and was acting for them up to the time the Rosehill was first brought out. Joseph Astredo, who has for years been freight clerk for the same company, on the City of Topeka, received a telegram recently from Goodall & Perkins to report at once in San Francisco. He did so and was immediately made master of the Rosehill. All these things point to the ownership of the Rosehill by Goodall & Perkins, the owners of the Pacific coast steamship company's boats.

THE result of the two evening performances of the Mikado, given last month by the Victoria Amateur Opera Company, shows a balance of \$39.55, which is to be devoted to the expenses of the Theatre. The company's expenses were: costumes, \$100; orchestra, \$58; printing and advertising, \$58.60; books and libretto, \$36.80; royalty, \$57; rooms for practice, \$30.50; pianist for practice, \$31.50; professional services, \$50; and other, \$140.50; total, \$815.45. Receipts for first night, \$513.50; for second night, \$391.50; total receipts, \$905; balance over expenditure, \$89.55.

DESPITE the rather bad weather the firemen's team were out again yesterday evening practicing for the coming contests on the 26th. Finding that they had been overlooked by the Sports and Games committee, so far as prizes were concerned, the firemen resolved to see what they could do for themselves. W. Tulloch, J. Braden and Chief Desay resolved themselves into a committee for the purpose of raising funds and preparing a programme of firemen's sports, as being most feasible. Some \$250 has been already contributed, and the committee is yet a little to come. The programme will come off on Saturday the 26th, beginning at 10 a.m. with a wet test in which four teams of twelve men each will work against time. First prize, \$100; second prize, \$25.

At one o'clock in the afternoon a hub and hube race will be run. In this four teams of twelve men from Victoria, Nanaimo, Vancouver and Port Angeles have been entered, and Anacortes and New Whatcom have each promised to send a team. The prizes are, 1st, \$100; 2nd, \$25. On Monday evening a wet test practice will be held at the corner of Yates and Blanchard. The official course will be on Yates street, from the Victoria steam laundry to the corner of Douglas street. The winners of the city will be provided medals for the winners in the various contests. In order to secure the attendance of the Nanaimo team, the Victoria firemen will go up to that town on Wednesday evening, and on Thursday will compete for the \$275 offered in prizes by the committee. They will return on Friday with the Nanaimo team, which at present holds the championship of the Northwest.

Neither bird had finished laying its usual complement, and it is not an uncommon thing for the wild goose to build in trees, but to share its nest with the fish hawk is like the wolf and the lamb lying down together.

THIS Tacoma smelting and refining works will soon begin to receive ore under the arrangement made recently by General Freight Agent Wm. Brown, of the C.P.R. Under this new schedule Sloan ore will be shipped to the smelters at Everett, St. Francisco and Tacoma at very favorable rates. Latest reports state that some 3,000 tons of high grade ore are now on the dump awaiting shipment via Three Forks and the Nakusp & Stokan. The ore will be carried on the Columbia river to Revelstoke and thence to the Sound.

J. H. GILL, who was arrested in Vancouver and brought to this city on a charge of fraudulently conveying to his wife certain land situated in North Vancouver, was charged with that offence before Mr. Farquhar Macrae, stipendiary magistrate, yesterday morning. He was remanded to Vancouver, where he was taken last night, for trial. He claims he is innocent. This case arose out of a civil case which came before Mr. Justice Crease on Thursday, when John Thomas and Gill and his wife were charged with the conveyance of the land in question. Gill did not defend, and Thomas has since sworn out the warrant on which Gill is now under arrest.

AN early and uninvited visitor yesterday morning to a bachelor residence on Blenheim street walked off with Mr. George Morphy's watch and a small amount of money. Mr. Morphy and several other gentlemen gave the watch and money to the police, who are now working up the case. The watch was clearly worked up by Sgt. Levin and Officer Palmer, with the result that in a few hours James Haley was arrested on suspicion, and though the watch was not discovered an odd coin found in his pocket was identified as being part of the property stolen—Haley's shoes also fit the tracks made by the burglar. He was brought before the police magistrate and remanded till Monday, when a bottle of morphine was in Haley's possession when arrested.

ROBERT MATHESON, a son of Sir Arthur Matheson, a rich English baronet, was on Friday in London granted a divorce from his wife, Jane Clark, who is connected with a prominent Canadian family. The husband is absolutely deaf and almost dumb, the result of a sunstroke received while a child. According to the dispatches the marriage of the couple was in 1882 and several years later the husband and wife of a British Columbia newspaper. The wife's health failing she returned to England and on her way fell in with a young Englishman and a Frenchman who were co-respondents in a cable, but there seems evidently to be some mistake as the couple never over editing a newspaper in this Province, as close in the same leading gentlemen connected with the profession for years back fail to discover any one answering to the name or description given of Mr. Matheson having held such a position.

WHAT may be considered as the opening gun in the bombardment which the crooks are preparing for the honest people of Victoria during the holidays was fired yesterday afternoon. Between 2 and 3 o'clock two "ladies" entered the store of G. H. Maynard on Douglas street, worked the weary old safe, found nothing to suit them and started to pass out. Young Mr. Maynard was alone in the store at the time so that no close watch was kept on the "travelling couple," but as they passed out a bulky look about the clock of one attracted his attention. This when drawn aside revealed an armful of sundries which had been deflected from their proper owner. These were gently but firmly returned to their proper resting place, but the fair ones did not leave in haste, the proper official could be found. One of the pair is described as stout built, rather tall and about 40 years of age, the other, smaller and younger, was not especially noticed. Merchants will do well to keep an eye open for this class just now.

ALTHOUGH the Methodist Conference, in session at Vancouver last week, appointed Rev. R. R. Maitland to succeed Rev. Joseph Hall in the pastorate of the Centennial Methodist church, it is not yet decided by any means that there is to be a change. The congregation are not at all in wishing for a new pastor, the official board standing eleven to eleven, and the final decision will not be reached until Tuesday, when the subject will be brought before the special appeal committee, composed of the President of the Conference, Rev. Thomas Hall, of Solomons Church, and the Financial Secretary, Rev. R. R. Maitland. What the decision of the committee will be, of course remains to be disclosed; the probability is, however, that the decision of the stationing committee will be reversed. The congregation of St. James Bay church will only have forty-eight, when he goes to the Conventual Industrial school, and is succeeded by Rev. R. Williams. Rev. George H. Morden removes to Nelson, Rev. James Turner being the new pastor of the congregation at Victoria West. Rev. James Tait also comes to Victoria to take charge of the work among the Indians of the city and district.

SPORTS AND PASTIMES.

The "Bays" Defeat the V. A. C.'s and Will Accordingly Meet the Seattles.

Celebration Yachting Arrangements—The Cricket Club's First Victory of the Season.

The James Bay and Victoria Athletic club baseball teams, after numerous postponements due to nasty weather, met yesterday afternoon in the first ball game of the season, at Beacon Hill. Notwithstanding a high wind and a continuous drizzle, Captains Borthwick and Lenfesty ordered their men on the field on the understanding that the victorious team should play the visiting players from the Sound on the 24th. The known rivalry between the pines had attracted a large crowd of spectators, who watched the game to the finish, although the vast majority were minus umbrellas and machete-knives. The Athletic team counted on sure victory, relying upon the terrific speed of Lenfesty. In the first innings, however, Lenfesty, usually so reliable, was very erratic, giving countless bases on balls, until the Bays had crossed home thirteen times.
