A NEW GREAT LAKE?

The lowering of the levels of the Great Lakes, through the illegal stealing of water by the city of Chicago, has reached a critical stage. It is not possible, however, on humanitarian grounds, to compel an immediate cessation of the water diversion to the Mississippi which is responsible for all the trouble. Is there any other way out of the difficulty? According to Mr. C. Lorne Campbell, a Toronto railway construction engineer, there is. His scheme is so vast as to appear almost fantastic to first acquaintance, but so many big and seemingly impossible things are undertaken and brought to successful completion in these days that it is not wise to judge hastily. If the plan really would accomplish all that is claimed for it by its author, it is certainly worth serious investigation.

What Mr. Campbell proposes to do, put briefly is to create a sixth great lake by the damming of the Albany and Ogoki rivers, drain this new lake (which would be two and a half times as large as Lake Ontario), by means of a canal to Lake Nipigon, into Lake Superior and so supply a large additional flow of water to the Great Lakes system—almost twice as much as that diverted from Lake Michigan by the city of Chicago.

The land to be flooded for the new lake consists for the most part of forest, rock and muskeg. The timber to be cut down could be profitably disposed of by floating down to mills built to deal with it. The scheme would give employment to at least 20,000 men for from six to eight years, while Ontario would benefit not only by the raising of the water levels but by additional electric energy so secured. The value of this alone is estimated by Mr. Campbell at \$10,000,000 annually, without any extra capital cost. Valuable mineral

\$500,000 LOOT FOUND

Two Los Angeles Suspects Tell of Mail Robbery.

Los Angeles, Oct. 19.—Two of the six suspects arrested in connection with the holdup of a registered mail truck here last Thursday have made confessions, and \$500,000 worth of jewels and securities, nearly all of the loot, have been recovered.

Those under arrest are Charles Wagner, Robert Cargo, a mechanic; Harry Thomas, alleged leader of the gang; Frank Testona, George "Jack" Davidson and Sam Sandberg, alias Soapie.

Tescenia led the officers to the hiding place south of Los Angeles, where they recovered \$9,000 in cash, \$140,000 in negotiable bonds, \$500,000 in "cuckoo" checks and forty costly platinum watches. One man remains to be caught. Sandberg is at liberty on \$5,000 bail from Leavenworth, Kan., under an indictment charging him with transporting a stolen car. He was arrested at Kansas City.
