The Liabilities of Samson, Kennedy & Co. Still Unknown.

CREDITORS MAY ASSEMBLE TO-DAY

The Junior Member of the Firm Refuses to Discuss the Nature or Extent of the Embarrassment-The Failure Regarded on the Street as Complete and Serious to the Country Trade-Mr. Mayor Kennedy 111 at His Home.

The failure of Messrs. Samson, Kenedy & Co., wholesale drygoods merchants of this city, was the sole topic of conversation among the large dealers of the city yesterday. At first it was believed that the embarrassment was not serious, and that but little time would suffice to place the firm on a footing where its business could continue, but as the day wore on and the facts connected with the suspenpension of payment by the firm became nore generally known, it came to be regarded as a fact that the winding up of the business which has grown up with Toronto during the past decade would be deemed necessary. when the firm's creditors have had

when the firm's creditors have had an opportunity to figure on the statements, and the codition of the remaining stock, now being prepared by the clerks at the warehouse, under the supervision of Mr. Fred Kennedy, junior member of the firm.

The extent of the liabilities of Samson, Kennedy & Co. is, naturally, difficult to determine. Even the heads of the firm are not in a position to make any positive statement on the matter, and, as Mr. Fred Kennedy remarked to a World representative last night, it would not be possible to discuss the situation with any degree of correctness until after a meeting of the creditors, which may occur to-day; in the meantime, the gentleman added, that all statements touching upon the firm's financial standing are fabrications and the tales of street newsmongers.

What Business Men Say. In conversation with a gentleman well posted in the wholesale trade of In conversation with a gentleman well posted in the wholesale trade of the city, the statement was made to a World reporter that the affairs of Samson, Kennedy & Co. were likely to turn out worse than at first anticipated. The firm carried the paper of a very large number of country merchants, and many small failures are expected as a result of this susjension. The total liabilities of the house are likely to be above rather than below half a million dollars.
