LOCAL OPTION LIQUOR CONTROL ASKE

Abolish Mental Expert Testimony On Behalf of Prisoners

BOARD OF 3 DOCTORS ON SANITY

Eliminate Alienists Being Retained By Both the Crown and Defense.

SUGGESTION CONSIDERED BY PUBLIC HEALTH DEAN

New Method of Procedure For Not Only Alleged Murderers, But All Mentally Delinquent.

The appointment of three doctors to determine the sanity of prisoners whose mentality is questioned is the suggestion advanced by the Ottawa police magistrate in a letter received by Dr. H. W. Hill, dean of the faculty of public health of the University of Western Ontario. The doctors among whom would be the jail physicians, would act as impartial judges as to the prisoner's mentality, according to the suggestion. The letter has been forwarded by Dr. Hill to the comittee of mental hygiene of the Ontario Medical Association. Nothing since has been heard of it.

The suggestion, which is based on the experience of the Ottawa ma .strate, meets with the approval of Dr. Hill. Asked for his opinion in con-nection with this system at murder trials where a plea of insanity has been entered on behalf of the accused, Dr.

"I believe that the prisoner should be examined by physicians not hired by either crown or defense and who would act as advisers to the judge in all cases. Their appointment should be based on skill and ability alone and not on any other qualification. "But this letter that I have received from the Ottawa magistrate is not intended for allegedly insane murderers alone," Dr. Hill continued. "The sugcases of mental delinquincy coming before the courts from trivial offenders to those charged with serious crimes.


