R PRESERVES .- Scald the apto every pound of apples and a pound of sugar. Put the apples and sugar over the fire, and cook slowly till the first is tender.

DELICIOUS BISCUIT.-Half cup butter, put into three tea-cups of new milk and let it scald, and add a cup of yeast or a yeast-cake, sponge over night and in the morning put in half teaspoonful soda. Mix soft and let them rise.

A ONE-EGG bread pudding is sometimes greatly to be desired. Beat one egg with one tablespoonful of flour, three of brown sugar, one pint of milk, a little salt; place some very thin slices of buttered bread in a pudding dish, then pour the custard already made over this, and bake for half an hour. Fruit may be added, and spices to suit the taste.

FRENCH mustard is thus made in America:—Four tablespoonfuls of mustard, one tablespoonful of sugar, one teaspoonful of cinnamon, one-half teaspoonful each of cloves, black pepper, and of flour, with vinegar enough to cover these; mix all well, and let it come to a boil; when cold add a little salad oil, say one or two tablespoonfuls; this cines smoothness in the whole gives smoothness to the whole.

Now that boneless herring can be purchased at almost any grocery, the only objection to making herring salad is removed. The herring should soak in cold water for two or three hours, cut them up in small pieces, and add boiled potatoes in the proportion your taste indicates; hard-boiled eggs cut in small bits and the ordinary salad-dressing should be added just before serving. This is a good dish for a picnic.

BREAD cake fried may be a novelty to some cooks. To two cups and a half of bread dough, allow one cup and a half of sugar, two eggs, a quarter of a cup of melted butter, half a teaspoonful of salt, and a little nutneg.
