## ECGLESIASTICAL NOTES

A Brenop's Rasponsibilimpes.-The Bishop of Manohester in returning thanki for an address and notioing a remaris that at Manches. ter he was the right man in the right place ${ }_{j}$ expressed the feay that it was inspired by the confidence of affection rather than the ontcome of judgment and disorimination. No man conld be said to be equal to suoh work. To have to gaide the fortanee of the Chinch of England among a population of $2,500,000$, to bear the cares, anxieties, and burdens of his office, and to have the oversight of 600 or 700 clergymen, passed binman atrength. He conld only do his best. A colonial bishop wai onoo remongtrgted with for giving himself so.
 "You will wear "yourself out," he was told. "What is the "duty of a Bishop?" Was asked. "It is to ordain, to conifm, and to, keep the clergy in order." That was the old-fashioned idea of a Bishop, but ever sinee that magnificent specimen of an energetic prelate, the late Bishop Wilberforce, tanght thom how a Bishop might work, and thierefore ought to work, the conception of the Episcopal offlice, and, its duties had undergone a wonderfuil change.

The New Enalibe Chibio at Cannes,-TThe Church of St. George, ereicted at Cannes as a memorial to the late Duke of Albany, from the designs of Mr. Blomfield, "was reoently consocrated by the Bishop of Gibraltar, in presence of the Prince of Wales, Prince Goorge of Wales and many distinguished Einglish visitors now staying at Oannes': The charch; built of stone from the neighborhood of Grasse, consists of four bays and a north and soath aisle, the footpaces of the aisles being laid in mosaic. On the north side are an organ chapel and vestry, and on the south eide the memorial chapel, on the decoration of which the skill of the arohitect has been lavished: The roof of the jave is of pitch pine, and the altdr siteps are of white Carrara marble: There are triple lancet windows above the altar, which are filled with memorial offeringe, the gift of two Rnglish ladies. The piscina and sedilia are of ancient design. A soreen of i iroñ, painted black and gold, separates the chancel from the memorial chapel, in whioh theire. is ra socond altar, and the chapel is to bol afed poly for early commanion and weekday servioe. Two memorial windows and a mosiaio reredon wero oxechtod of beantifal design.

Indu - The consecration of All Sainta' Church, Allahabad, destined to be the Cathe dral of the fature Diocese of the Northwest Provinces, took place on January 12th. The Bishop of Calcutta performed the ceremony of oonseoration, as well as preached at the cole bration of the Holy Commanion which followod. The eervice hold at 8 a.m., and at 11 o'olock the Metropolitan delivered his Charge in the newly conseorated ohuroh. His Lordship spoke very hopefally of the proposed new bishoprio of Allahabad.

Sixte BrbHop of New Yobr.-Bighop Henry C. Potior-now sixth Bighop of New Yorkwas welcomed to his diocese on Monday, Fiobruary 21, by many of the clergy of the city at Grace Chapel, At the Holy Comminion he made a short address, allading in feeling tarms to the death of tire late Bishop and of several of the clergy, during his short absence, and spank ing with much interest of the worls of the Chureh of England which had come under his observation, especially the grand missionary work undertaken by graunates of Oxford among the poor of London, in the "0xford House."

Bishop Paret on Funzral Refobm- - Biehop Paret in a late number of the diocesan paper, the Maryland Churchman referred to Faneral Reform, ina manner most excollent and greatly needed. He too truly says that the bereaved go for help and advice in their affiction neither to pastor nor friends, but-to the undertaker I and he orders all things after his own pleasure, making the show and shatio of an average fan: oral "something jnexpressly sad," "not a Christian burial, but an undertaker's advertisement." Among the particulars in which reform is needod are specified:-

1. Consulting the partor instead of the undertaker as to details of sorvico.
2. Aboliahing faueral cermons,
3. Making all leave taking of the dead private, ss far as possible; no opening of the coffin and "viewing the corpse", as part of the ceremony.
4. Avoiding all unnecessary costand display.
5. No Sunday funerals.
6. Reform in the wearing of mourning.

Clxhioal Chanais.-Among enquivies mado by the committee appointed by the Diocese of Connectiont to investigate the matter of clerieal ohanges was the following, addressed to parish wardens and clerks: "So far as you know, what has been the principal caise of the several changes. which have occarred in the rectorship of your parish ?" A Good Sugaramon.-Bishop Worthington, of Nebraska, in a late number of the diocesan paper the Ohurch Guaidian suggeste that, it would be an advisable plan for every clergy man in the diocese during lent, at some time most oonvenient, (but not as a substitute for the devotional service or exhortation) to instruct, the people in regard to the Book of Common Prayer; its history and rubrios, and and aloo to speak plainly of decent custom which the Churoh expects ns to observe. The poople desire information. They are coistanity asking questions in regard to these thinge, and it is the duty of the olergy to takiè time to give instruction on theese subjects. A fow mómentí before the daily service might 'be' used for this parpoge, How many of our clergy have ever taught their people what to ask in prayer when they firet come into God's House? A faithfol pastor will seet to know whether those bom' mitted to his care are familliar with sititabie derotions which they oan use whon they enter or retive from the siacred plase.
Bianop Wobthimaton Aadin Sociezbisi:Every parish or mission in the diocese, no matter how small, ghould have a Suindaj-achool or ganisatiop ; and if there are but a small number of ohildren to be instructed' they should have the care and attention of the Rector or mis sionary. There is a neglect in some quarters.
