ONTARIO-SURPLUS OF PUBLIC AND HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS

Mr. G. H. Aiken (Parry Sound-Muskoka): I have a supplementary question, Mr. Speaker, concerning the surplus of school teachers this year, particularly in the province of Ontario. Is the minister's department setting up any special program for the employment of these teachers in the federal service or any interprovincial field to take care of the surplus of public and high school teachers?

Hon. Allan J. MacEachen (Minister of Manpower and Immigration): Mr. Speaker, I am not aware of the actual facts that my hon. friend mentions. I do know that last year Canada brought into the country about 8,000 people in the teaching profession from various countries. We do not believe that Canada itself will be able until 1972 to supply the demand for university teachers in this country. With regard to secondary school teachers, this is a question I would have to look into further.

Mr. Aiken: Mr. Speaker, I know I am not permitted to give information, but perhaps the time on various subjects, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Deputy Speaker: Order, please. The the minister would look into the fact that there has been an obvious surplus in Ontario of several thousand teachers.

REQUEST FOR ANNOUNCEMENT FOLLOWING MEETING WITH PROVINCIAL LEADERS

Mr. H. W. Danforth (Kent-Essex): Mr. Speaker, I would like to direct my question to the Prime Minister. It has been intimated that the right hon, gentleman is holding a series of private meetings with provincial government and agricultural leaders. Will there be no announcement in the house regarding the government's solutions to the economic problems in western and eastern agriculture until these meetings have been concluded and an assessment made of the information obtained?

Right Hon. P. E. Trudeau (Prime Minister): Mr. Speaker, it is not my intention to make any announcement. Any such announcements are made by the Minister of Agriculture.

Mr. Danforth: A supplementary question, Mr. Speaker. I ask the right hon. gentleman whether we can expect no announcement in the house until these meetings have been concluded.

Mr. Trudeau: We make announcements all
