of the United Kingdom are very much greater than their exports, but they have other means of drawing in revenue. They are lenders to the whole world and they have in all parts of the earth, and returns from the money which is loaned. I think

we as a people cannot say we are, so far at all events, in that position.

With regard to the details of our trade with the various countries. I will read the following statement:

I can only say that with regard to this that the figures show that our trade with all the principal nations of the world and the world in general, the United Kingdom and the British Empire, show an increase in trade with the single exception of France, which shows a slight falling off. In looking up the returns more particularly I found that the falling off was not in our imports from France, but it was in our exports to France.

A reference was made by His Royal Highness to the matter of immigration. I am pleased to state that a gentleman from the West, largely engaged in agricultural pursuits, owning a large farm and being a very large grain owner, informed me that the agricultural labour which they had recently received from the other side was labour of the very best quality that they had ever had in the western country. I

think that the Immigration Department is entitled to a great deal of credit on account of the fact that they have entirely abandoned all efforts to induce immigration from those parts of southern Europe whose inhabitants, when they come over here, make themselves so notorious as handlers of the stiletto and the dagger. The Immigration Department has entirely abandoned all efforts and all attempt to obtain immigrants from Southern Europe. As hon. gentlemen are aware, France does not allow any emigration propaganda in that republic. It is against the law. They do not approve of the emigration of their people, and therefor no efforts can be made by our Immigration Department to bring any one here by a propaganda in France. The efforts of the Immigration Department, therefore, are expended in the United States, in the United Kingdom, and in the north-
