CAPT. NEWTON'S CAREER. Capt. D. O. C. Newton of the Princess Patricia Light Infantry, killed in France, was a son of George Onslow Newton and Lady Alice Newton. He served with the Middlesex Regiment in the South African War. He was educated at Eton and the Royal Military College. He was A.D.C. to the Earl of Dundonald in 1962-04, when the latter commanded the Canadian militia, and later to Earl Grey during the latter's term as governor-general. He entered business in Montreal in 1910 as the representative of the Canadian Agency, Limited, and was a director of a number of companies. He did not join the Princess Pats until one week before they sailed. A later report says he was killed in action.

LONDON, Jan. 11 —Lord Dundonald tonight confirmed the news officially reported today of the death of his nephew, Captain Denzil Onslow Cochrane Newton, of the Princess Patricla's Light Infantry, The war office notification to the family, which was received on Saturday evening, merely mentioned the fact that he had been killed in action, but gave no details as to place or date, altho it is understood these will be forthcoming in a day or two.

Asked if Captain Newton was serving with the Princess Pats at the time of his death, his lordship said he assumed that was, as the officer had been with mem during the whole of their training in England, and went to the front with them just before Christmas.





WOULD CONSULT EMPIRE ON PEACE PROPOSALS

Sir Richard Jebb Suggests Calling of Imperial Conference

LONDON, Jan. 11.—(C.A.P.)—Sir Richard Jebb in The Morning Post advances a novel argument in favor of imperial conference this summer. "It should assemble this year," he says, "in order that the British Government as doyen of the Britannic group may meet the governments of France and Russis with proposals of peace which have received the sanction of the empire as a whole. We are bound to make peace in common with France and Russis, but a prior obligation bids us arrange terms with the dominions first. When peace is concluded in favor of the allies it will be time ed in favor of the allies it will be time enough to take up, the question of empire reconstruction."
