When I contemplate the spirit of the nation, and reflect on the actions of individuals, for these last five months, I cannot entertain a doubt of our success in these particulars. When I look back upon the conduct of our Ministers, for these last five years, every thing appears so dark and uncertain, that it is difficult to say to what side we should turn for relief.
