

VIII. For every hundred of boards of ten or twelve feet long taken up and carried within the limits mentioned in the first article, there shall be paid two shillings and six pence, and so in proportion for any greater distance.

IX. For every hundred of plank of ten or twelve feet long taken up and carried within the limits of the first article, there shall be paid for the carriage thereof three shillings and nine pence, and so in proportion for any greater distance.

X. For every load consisting as mentioned in the first article, taken up on the King's Wharf, or between that and Mr. Lymburner's Wharf, and carried to the Upper-town, as far as the Jesuits College or Recollets, or any other place equally distant, there shall be paid one shilling, and for carrying the same to any greater distance within the gates, there shall be paid four pence over and above the said shilling.

XI. For every puncheon of melasses, taken up within the limits mentioned in the preceding article, and carried to the Upper-town, as far as the Recollets or Jesuits College, or any other place equally distant, there shall be paid two shillings, and for carrying the same to any greater distance within the gates, there shall be paid six pence over and above the two shillings.

XII. For every cord of wood taken up in the Lower-town and carried to the Upper-town, as far as the Recollets or Jesuits College, or any other place equally distant, there shall be paid two shillings and nine pence, and for carrying it further provided it be within the gates of the city, there shall be paid six pence over and above the said two shillings and nine pence.

XIII. For every cord of wood taken from the Beach near to the Intendant's Palace, or between that and Mr. Drummond's Distil-house, and carried to the Upper-town, as far as the Jesuits College, or any other place equally distant, there shall be paid for the carriage
