Refolved, N.C.D. 1. That they are entitled to life, liberty, and property; and they have never ceded to any fovereign power whatever, a right to difpole of either without their confent.

Refolued, N. C. D. 2. That our anceftors, who first fettled these colonics, were at the time of their emigration from the mother country, entitled to all the rights, liberties, and immunities of free and natural born subjects, within the realm of England.

Refolved, N. C. D. 3. That by fuch emigration they by no means forfeited, furrendered, or loft any of those rights, but that they were, and their descendants now are, entitled to the exercise and enjoyment of all fuch of them, as their local and other circumftances enable them to exercise and enjoy.

Refolved, 4. That the foundation of Englifh liberty and of all free government, is a right in the people to participate in their legiflative council : and as the Englifh colonifts are not represented, and from their local and other circumftances cannot properly be represented in the British parliament, they are entitled to a free and exclusive power of legiflation in their feveral provincial Legislatures, where their right of representation can alone be preserved, in all cases of taxation and internal polity, subject only to the negative of their fovereign,
