CHARGED WITH FORGERIES.

Nine Foreigners Committed for Trial in London, England.

London, Dec. 10.—Jacob Stern, who was arrested in New York in January last and eight other foreigners, charged with bank note forgeries, were committed for trial this afternoon.

The forgeries have occupied the London police for several months, and when first discovered created considerable excitement in commercial circles. They aggregated \$50,000, but the criminals had laid their plans for an extended campaign against the bank, which doubtless would have been carried out had not their schemes been frustrated by the arrest of Stern, who attempted to float some of the forged notes for money for returning to the business. The prisoners are all Germans and Russians.

Visited Technical School.

The joint deputation from the Manufacturers' Association and the Board of Trade who visited the Toronto Technical School last evening upon invitation of Principal Pakenham, were delighted with what they were shown of the educational work being accomplished in that institution. After being shown thru the different departments, the visitors, who numbered some seventy-five, gathered in the domestic science room and were there treated to refreshments, which were made by the members of the class. They afterwards adjourned to the lecture room, where a number of impromptu speeches were made. J. D. Allen, president of the School Board, presided. A. E. Ames spoke on behalf of the Board of Trade, and W. P. Gundy and W. P. Ellis on behalf of the Manufacturers' Association. Both assuring those present that the respective bodies they represented would do all they could to have the city take an active part in the support of the school. W. A. Cockburn of Brantford was also heard in an encouraging address, as were Ald. Hubbard and Ald. Curry.

STEWART'S SENSIBLE SUGGESTION. To Have City Coal Available in Small Quantities at Verbal or Minor Dealers.

If the Mayor had any doubts that there is dissatisfaction with the Welsh coal it was dispelled at the meeting of the Board of Control Wednesday afternoon, when a lady handed with a sample of the coal, which she placed before him, and urged that owing to the fact that she had self-selectors, the coal was of no use to her, because the stick would not burn. The lady asked him to take the coal back, but he was politely referred to the street commissioner, who is becoming experienced in the handling of complaints.

The Mayor had a cablegram from the Hotel Colborne, Wales, asking an offer for 4000 tons of coal. No offer will be made by the city just at present. The cable handed on the board just about the time the lady was with her protest and her Welsh coal, and thus it is that the encouragement it might otherwise have received.

An idea prevails that in order to follow out the directions issued by the City Engineer, the coal needs about as much attention as a sick baby in order to make it give any satisfaction. Those who have followed the directions, however, have received their reward.

Choice Coal at \$9. Owing to the dissatisfaction of the Welsh coal it is delivered at present that the street commissioner recommended that the coal be screened, which was done. The screenings could be used by the city. The coal was sold at \$9 per ton, but Mr. McMurich dissented. The screenings would be sold at \$4.85 a ton. The coal as it came here remains at \$9.

A Sensible Suggestion. Ald. A. Stewart addressed the board on the coal question and pointed out that the cost the city over a dollar a ton for delivery. The coal was brought to Toronto especially for the benefit of poor people, but the really poor people were not getting any of it. There were over 1000 homes in Toronto where there was not a bit of coal or a stick of coal in the house because of the difficulties of delivery. These people could not afford to buy the coal in large quantities, nor could they use the coal in small quantities, for two or three miles from the municipal wharves. There are small coal and wood dealers scattered all over the city at the same rate the city is now selling it. Ald. Stewart was sure of that, for he is in touch with the business. These dealers, he suggested, should be given the coal, on an agreement that they would sell it in any quantity at the rate of \$8 a ton. By this means the city would be getting rid of its coal, and the coal would be placed within the reach of the poor people who could buy it in little lots and take it away from the yards.

Not Much to It for Dealers. The suggestion was kindly received by the Mayor, but Controller McMurich doubted the wisdom of it. He did not think the people could not go to the city yard, where they could get any quantity.

In reply, Ald. Stewart pointed out again that the city was selling the coal at \$7.50 at the yard, and that if it were sold at \$8 a ton, it would be a better deal, as it would be a fair way, the houses which would receive the coal, many people would fully repay any little difference there might be.

The board adopted the suggestion, and sent it to the Street Commissioner Jones.
