West Huron Witnesses Saw Few Signs of Corruption

Pritchett's Testimony Not Borne Out By Crown Witnesses From Goderich—Gundry's Evidence to Go Before Attorney-General.

[From Our Own Reporter.]
Toronto, Nov. 14.—The investigation into the London election conspiracy case was at the close of this afternoon's session adjourned until Wednesday next. Mr. Eric Armour, assistant crown counsel, stated that owing to the fact that two London witnesses were ill, it was impossible to bring the hearing of evidence to a close today. He asked that an adjournment be made until Wednesday next, when he promised to conclude. He mentioned one of the witnesses wanted as Harry Hanahan.
Mr. Curry objected. He wanted the case concluded at once. It was not fair, he argued, to have the defendants brought back day after day and week after week, while their expenses and counsel fees were running up.
"Day after day the prosecution has adduced a lot of irrelevant evidence, which has nothing to do with the defendants," Mr. Curry said. "Why should they be compelled to come here and listen to it?"
Mr. Armour remarked that the prosecution had got through the hearing of evidence very expeditiously, but Mr. Curry said he didn't think so.
"If it hadn't been for the interruptions of my learned friend we would have got along better," Mr. Armour declared.
"If the prosecution had asked its questions in a legal manner there would have been no interruptions," Mr. Curry replied.
The magistrate then adjourned the case until Wednesday next.
When court resumed this afternoon Mr. DuVernet announced he had placed the evidence of Wm. H. Gundry before the Attorney-General, and that he will take whatever action is decided upon by the head of the department of justice.
Charles A. Humble, of Goderich, was the first witness called this afternoon. He was a deputy returning officer in the West Huron election. He said that he was at Yule and Reid, the Conservatives' scrutineers, alleged that he had placed the counterfoils of ballots in his pocket when he acted as deputy. A man in a hotel at Goderich before the election had attempted to drill him in the art of ballot-stitching, but the witness told the man he was (Continued on Page Nine.)

TIGER ATTACKED GOES TO BOTTOM

TRAINER IN CAGE OFF SARNIA PORT

Goldie Inflicts Injury on Joyat, of the Bostock Animal Show.

Monsieur Joyat, one of the trainers with Bostock's animal show, now exhibiting at the Grand Opera House, was attacked by the royal Bengal tiger, Goldie yesterday afternoon, and received a cut on the forehead about five inches long. Joyat's escape from more serious injury is due alone to his great nerve and ability to handle wild animals.

Ever since the show arrived in London Goldie has been acting badly. When Joyat attempted to put her through her work, she would bite the top off a stool, and on several occasions she has made attempts to strike the trainer with her giant forepaws. She weighs probably 400 pounds.

Yesterday afternoon Joyat determined to teach the tiger that tearing the stool to pieces with her teeth is not a part of the exhibition.

After the regular performance he had Goldie placed in the arena, and the training began.

The tiger was in a particularly ugly mood, and appeared to be resenting the extra work imposed upon it. Joyat kept steadily at his task, however, and every time the tiger attempted to break the stool he would use the spear on the animal and knock its game.

Suddenly the big brute sprang forward at its trainer. Joyat side-stepped, but he was not quick enough to entirely avoid the tiger. One paw struck him on the head, and the claws tore the flesh for about five inches. Joyat was stunned, and the tiger lashed its sides with its tail and prepared for another spring. Joyat had his revolver, however, and he fired a blank cartridge in the animal's face as it came toward him, and it backed away.

Narrow Escape.
By this time several of the assistants were on hand with spears, and the tiger was kept at bay until Joyat left the cage. A doctor dressed the wound, and the trainer declared he was able to put on his act as usual. He appeared last night in the arena. He is a Frenchman and cannot speak a word of English.

This morning one of Madame Morelli's pet terriers walked into the arena, where four of the lions were being allowed to exercise themselves. The dog was fifteen feet from the nearest lion, and the big brute was crouching for a spring at the terrier, when Morelli's husband rushed in with a spear and saved the little animal's life. Madame was greatly excited. Her screams brought her husband to the scene, and after she recovered her pet she whipped and kissed it by turns.

The New Leopard.
Madame Morelli has changed the name of her new leopard from Buffalo to Pasha. The animal is rapidly learning its tricks, and last night it worked through like a veteran. Nellie, Madame's pet leopard, abhors the new-comer, however, and never loses an opportunity to attempt to tear it to pieces. There have been several fights between the animals in full view of the public since the show opened in London.

Announcer Driscoll, who is with the Bostock show, is a well-known actor of the legitimate stage, and was for twelve years with Tom Keene. Attired in evening dress, he announces and explains each act to the audience. Mr. Driscoll is a man of commanding presence, and with a voice which carries clearly to every part of the house. It is said he is one of the most successful announcers in America today.

FIGHT WITH RAIDERS

Cape Colony Police Kill One and Wound Another.

London, Nov. 15.—The Cape Colony police encountered Ferreira and his band of Boer raiders yesterday, killing one of the raiders and wounding another. Ferreira is still in the Upington district, but is moving eastward.

SAME OLD STUNT

Terrorists Attack Station and Carry Off Large Sum of Money.

Warsaw, Nov. 15.—A small band of terrorists attacked the Vistula railroad depot at Suchednow this morning, killed a gendarme, blew up the safe, got a considerable sum of money, and then marched off in military order. Cossacks are pursuing them.

CANADIAN CLUB MEETING

Municipal Ownership to Be Discussed Tomorrow Evening.

Citizens should not forget the second of the series of public meetings under the auspices of the Canadian Club of London, to be held in the city hall tomorrow (Friday) night, at 8 o'clock, when Mr. J. P. Jaffray, of Galt, will give an address on the subject of municipal ownership. This question is one of live interest to municipalities in all parts of the Dominion. Mr. Jaffray has for some years made a special study of this important question, and his practical grasp of the great issues involved should attract to the city hall every citizen of London who is in sympathy with this movement. After Mr. Jaffray's address the meeting will be thrown open to the public for discussion and criticism of the subject. Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the municipal power commission, will occupy the chair.

E. HAMILTON BY-ELECTION

Contest for a Successor to Mr. Carscallen Will Take Place Dec. 4.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—The writ for East Hamilton by-election for the Ontario Legislature will be issued tomorrow, fixing Tuesday, Nov. 25, as the official nomination day, and Tuesday, Dec. 4, as polling day.
The vacancy was caused by the death of Mr. Henry Carscallen, K.C., who had represented the constituency for a number of years. His majority at the last general election was 538.
So far there are two candidates in the field, Mr. J. J. Scott, K.C., having been formally selected by the Conservatives, and Mr. Allan Studholme by the Labor party, which is very strong in Hamilton.

Messrs Hays and McGuigan Looking Over the Grading Operations.

General Manager Hays and Manager McGuigan of the Grand Trunk Railway were in the city for a short time this morning. Subsequently they left for Hyde Park, intending to inspect the works in progress there on the new grade.
At noon Mayor Judd stated that neither official had been seen by him. Consequently, there was nothing doing, so far as the opening of negotiations is concerned.
It is stated, however, that a move in this direction will be made by the company very shortly.

BURNING BOAT BEACHES

The James Swift Likely a Total Loss in the St. Clair River.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 15.—Fire broke out in the after-end of the Canadian steamer James Swift in the St. Clair River last night, and it is believed that the boat is a total loss. The crew made heroic efforts to check the flames, but were finally forced to beach the blazing ship on the American shore and escape in the yawlboat. The Swift is on the beach near Rongo light. No. 5. She was bound for a Georgian Bay port light, where she was to load timber. The boat was owned by D. Noonan, Kingston, Ont. She was built in 1893, and was 107 feet long and 23 feet beam.

GALLOWS FOR BOMB-THROWER

Moscow, Nov. 15.—The man, who on Nov. 12 threw a bomb at General Rheinbot, the local prefect of police, and who was in return shot, but not killed, by the general, was tried by court-martial yesterday, and sentenced to death by hanging.

FINAL CHAPTERS OF INVESTIGATION

The London Election Inquiry to Close Next Wednesday.

WHERE WILL CASE GO TO TRIAL?

Prosecution Likely to Fight for Trial At Toronto—Defense to Attack Irrelevant Evidence.

Toronto, Nov. 15.—Wednesday next the hearing of evidence in the election conspiracy charge will come to an end, and then a battle-royal between the prosecution and the defense will be fought in regard to where the case shall be sent for trial—London or Toronto.

It was stated today that information has reached the Liberal counsel that a supreme effort is to be made by the prosecution to have the case tried in Toronto.
Mr. DuVernet is credited with the statement that ample evidence has been adduced to prove that at least a number of the defendants were implicated in a conspiracy to work elections in several constituencies, and that the headquarters of the conspiracy was in Toronto.

The counsel for the defense claim, however, that the prosecution has only the evidence of J. G. Pritchett, of London, to prove its contention, and that beyond this man's statement there has been nothing adduced to show that there was any conspiracy or a Toronto end to the alleged workings of the conspiracy.
It is the opinion of a well-known lawyer that Magistrate Denison will commit the case for trial in Toronto, after the argument of counsel next week.

The defense intends to make a dead-end at least 75 per cent of the evidence heard and committed to paper, as it is claimed it is irrelevant and has no bearing on the charges of conspiracy made against Messrs. Reid, O'Gorman, Wiley, Mulvey and others.

Mr. Curry for the defense has given notice that he will move to have all evidence which does not directly connect the defendants with the charges made, struck out before it is submitted for the grand jury at the assizes.
Mr. DuVernet and Mr. Curry frequently quarrelled yesterday, until finally Mr. DuVernet left the examination of the witnesses to his assistant, Mr. Armour. Mr. DuVernet cannot stand the constant tripping-up tactics of the Liberal counsel, and he plainly shows his irritation by frequent appeals to the magistrate to suppress his opponent.

PEACE IN SIGHT

Dominion Coal and Steel Companies Likely to Settle Differences.

Montreal, Nov. 14.—Directors of the Dominion Steel Company held two meetings today, with Senator Forget presiding. They made efforts to effect a settlement of the difficulty by offering the coal company a greater price for coal than they had been paying.
President James Ross, of the coal company backed by Mr. James Reid Wilson, remained firm in his attitude, but made a counter proposition to the steel company on the price of coal. The two propositions will be considered by the steel company's board tomorrow. At a late hour tonight no details of the propositions could be learned, but the general feeling was that a settlement would be reached tomorrow.

EARTHQUAKE AT JAMAICA

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 15.—An exceedingly sharp earthquake was felt south and north of this island at 11 o'clock Tuesday night. It was followed immediately by a second shock, which was the heaviest experienced in many years.

"CERTAINLY BOND WAS CHANGED" SAY THE WARREN COMPANY MEN

And Declare That the City Authorities Were Well Aware of It.

The Warren Paving Company is hot on the trail of the bond-lampering story, and two officials of the company are in the city armed to the teeth with documentary evidence to show that the city was well aware that the second sheet of the bond was changed by the paving people.

This morning Mr. W. J. Evans, treasurer, and Mr. John Fialabee, agent, of the company, and both of Toronto, were callers at the city hall, and they were seen by The Advertiser.

"Certainly the bond was changed," said Mr. Evans to the reporter. "We refused to accept the terms laid down by the city solicitor of London in his draft of the agreement, and we so informed the city."

"After the matter had dragged along from the 1st until the 17th of August, 1905, we had our solicitor, Mr. Lobb, draw up the sheet referred to by Mr. Meredith, and executed it properly and forwarded it to the city."

"If Mr. Meredith was not aware that the bond had been changed and accepted by the city, then he should have

known it. We have correspondence to show that the city was aware we would not accept the bond presented by Mr. Meredith, for the very good reason that we thought it was unfair to us, and no guarantee company would execute such a bond. We would not have accepted the city's terms under any condition, because by them we were bound to stand good for accidents on Richmond street which might result through the ripping up of the pavement by the water commissioners or anyone else.

"We inserted the words, 'after reasonable notice,' on the advice of our solicitor, because if we hadn't in order to keep up with the terms of the agreement it would have been necessary for us to pay a man to patrol the pavement and watch for holes."

"All we asked was that we be given reasonable notice by the city engineer of any repairs which he deemed necessary."

The Warren representatives are very angry with Mr. Meredith, and allege that if he didn't know the bond was changed he should, as city solicitor, have been well aware of it, and should have passed upon the document before it was accepted by the city.

Mr. Evans produced a mass of correspondence to show that the city was a party to the change.

HORSE PLUNGED OVER RIVER BANK

Unusual Stunt of a Runaway—Swam Stream, Taking the Wagon With It.

A horse belonging to a dairyman named Player performed a very unusual stunt this morning on Clarence street south.

While the driver was delivering milk to a customer near the corner of Clarence and Grey streets, the horse became frightened and ran away. It headed south to the bank of the river, where spectators expected to see it come to a sudden stop. They were very much surprised to see the animal take a plunge over the bank and into the river, a distance of fifteen feet below. The milk wagon, which contained a number of cans, went with the horse. The great weight of these, however, did not appear to interfere with the animal, which managed to swim across the stream to the south bank. There it encountered a large log, which prevented it ascending the bank, and there is a possibility that it would have been drowned had not a number of men hurried to its rescue and dragged it out of the stream.

Neither the horse nor the wagon was injured in the slightest.

Of course, the contents of the cans was lost, but the dairyman did not object to that, seeing that the horse and wagon were as good as ever.

CASTRO REPORTED DEAD

Government Conceals Demise to Prevent Losing Power.

Fort-de-France, Martinique, Nov. 14.—The Dutch cruiser Kortenaar arrived here yesterday from Willemstad, Curaçao, and reported today that at the time of her departure from Curaçao, it was rumored there persistently, and generally believed, that President Castro of Venezuela was dead, but that his death was being concealed by the Venezuelan Government to maintain itself in power.

The cruiser has received orders to hasten her preparations to put to sea again, and to leave Fort-de-France for La Guayra, if the report is confirmed. The French cruisers Julian de la Graviere and Duguay Trouin are off this port.

A DELUGE HITS THE FAR WEST

Torrential Rains and Floods in Oregon and Washington.

LIVES LOST; GREAT DAMAGE DONE

Portland in the Grip of the Worst Storm in its History—Railroads Completely Tied Up.

Tacoma, Nov. 15.—A flood area of 300 square miles is the result today of heavy rains and melting snow, which for 48 hours have rushed from the slopes of the Cascade Mountains, causing nearly all the streams in the northwest to stream over low lands. Several persons are reported drowned.

Seattle and scores of towns have been for the last 36 hours cut off from outside communication. Bridges have been swept away, railroad tracks washed out, telegraph and telephone wires torn down. As far as can be learned half a dozen lives have been lost.

Marooned on House Tops.

When darkness fell last night, watchers from the highlands saw nothing except an expanse of water, with here and there the tops of submerged houses, on some of which were bound persons could be seen signaling for help. Some attempted rescues were made, but the mad rush of swollen waters, carrying trees, snags, lumber, and even houses, forced the rescuers back. The Northern Pacific bridge across Stuck River went out yesterday, and soon after came a suspension railroad traffic between Tacoma and Seattle, the tracks being under water in many places. The Northern Pacific is able to maintain its service to Portland.

Advices received at the office of the Northern Pacific say that the water in Green River Canyon is 30 feet higher than during the floods of 1903, when the railroad was tied up for two weeks.

What has occurred east of Auburn, and west of the slope of the Cascades, can only be conjectured. That great damage has been done to property and lives is evident, but signaling wires between Hot Springs and Auburn are down.

Every railroad in the northwest is tied up, and though a few trains are being run, no attempt is made at a schedule. The tracks have been washed away in many places on the different roads.

At midnight rain was still falling heavily in this city.

Washington Hard Hit.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 15.—Never since the white man came has the State of Washington suffered from such a storm as raged here last night and today.

The storm, wind and rain which for the past week have wrought havoc with coastwise shipping, swept inland, and is venting an unheard-of fury upon the whole state, especially the Puget Sound country, and extends even to the northern part of Oregon and the Panhandle of Idaho.

Railroads out of Tacoma and Seattle are demoralized, train service to Portland only from the latter city being maintained. The creeks and rivers and brooks in the Cascades are roaring torrents.

On Puget Sound, the towns of Snohomish, Sumner and Auburn are under water. In Central Washington the raging in the Natchez and Yakima valleys.

The Clearwater is out of its banks, and has done immense damage.

Although nothing has been heard from Walla Walla, it is only fair to presume that with floods east of west of there, the rivers in that part of the state are still on a rampage. At Portland, a heavy wind is blowing, accompanied by a torrential rain. No damage has been done, further than to put out electric lights and street cars out of commission.

The railways across the state are prostrated, and no news has been received here from Eastern Oregon. At a late hour last night reports were very discouraging.
