IT PLEASES

Government's Policy in Regard Concealed in a Forest With to Fashoda.

Comes as a Most Agreeable Relief, With No Whisper of Dissent.

London, Oct. 11 .- The comments in public and in the newspapers show that the Marquis of Salisbury's determined stand on the question of the occupation of Fashoda has come as a most agreeable relief, and as disposing of all the stories of a possible compromise. No whisper of dissent is heard anywhere. Both friends and opponents of the premier are rejoicing at the fact that, in publishing the blue book on the Fashoda question, he had BURNED HIS BRIDGES BEHIND

While it is recognized that the situation by this publication has become more difficult for France, there is almost an entire absence of disposition anywhere to believe that France proposes to press her claims to the point of danger. This confidence was de-monstrated by the tone of the London Stock Exchange after a momentary scare, and such comment as comes from Paris also tends to abate alarm.

SIMPLY A COMMERCIAL CLASH A prominent member of the French embassy in London expressed the following views on the situation: "The advance of the French and British on the Upper Nile ought not to be regarded as the meeting of opposing policies which necessarily exclude one another, but as the clash of commercial interests, which should be carefully defined, and embodied in a permanent agreement. War, which has not been provoked by the question of Egypt, will certainly not break out over the Upper Nile question. The issue at Fashoda will be settled in a friendly manner to the general satisfaction, but an agreement will be much more easily reached when the newspapers of the two countries cease exciting public opinion.

WAR CLOUDS VANISHING. London, Oct. 11 .- The morning papers all renew their comments upon the Fashoda situation; but on neither side of the channel is any idea given expressing the fear that it is likely to lead to war. The worst that can happen is the resignation of M. De Lisse, the French foreign minister, or perhaps the whole ministry; but were it not for the delicate internal situation in France, arising out of the Dreyfus affair and the strike, the Fashoda question would involve no danger whatever. The general attitude of responsible journals in Paris is to wait for the arrival of the text of the blue book dispatches before committing themselves to a decided opinion. The view of official circles is that there will be no difficulty if a way can be found to give French commerce ac-cess to the Nile. The first impression The Liberal candidates are Hon. John in Paris was that M. Delisse was to blame for weakness in giving the French case away. An English Company Secures Another Slice of South Africa.

all hostile to him. A Cape Town telegram says: Lewanika, King of Barotseland, has ceded his country to the Chartered Company, and the document has been forwarded to England for ratification. Barotseland is situated on the Zambesi, north of the 16th parallel of south latitude. It is described as a fine cattle-raising country, but without mineral wealth. The ruler, Lewanika, is described as courteous and hospitable, as are all the natives.

Arrangements for Its Publication in England and America.

Admissions Made by "Dr." Nancy-Extraordinary Story of Forgery and Fraud:

London, Oct. 11.-It is announced that the family of Prince Bismarck has arranged for the publication in England and the United States of the Prince's autobiography, which he dictated some years ago.

The first installment of the work will appear in America in Harper's Magazine for November.

DIRTY AND DANGEROUS. So notorious a resort of ruffians has Canningtown become that nearly every tradesman in the closely packed district has a police whistle, and many keep a revolver. The place is spoken of as the dirtiest and most dangerous district in London. At any time of day or night Victoria Dock road is the resort of individuals who do not stop at any violence, in order to attain their end. Robberies in broad daylight and garroting are common occurrences. Tradesmen have suffered from the attacks of gangs who enter stores, and if articles demanded are not given up either assault them or break their windows. Complaint is made that the police are not adequate to cope with the reign of terror which prevails.

FORGERY AND FRAUD. The trial of Herbert Davies, 25, in the Bow Street Police Court, has revealed an extraordinary story of forgery and fraud. Davies is alleged to have duped Colonel Shipway, of Grove House, Chiswick, by pretending to trace for him an important pedigree and coat of arms through ancient parish registers, wills, tombs and church effigies, over a few centuries, and to have defrauded the confiding colonel out of \$3,415. The prisoner is accused of forging entries in the parish registers of Mangotsfield, Gloucestershire, to have had an inscription engraved on the hasp of the chest which contained the parish documents, to have exhumed old coffins and engraved the name of "Shipway upon them, and generally to have carved "Shipway" inscriptions all over the parish church. He is charged, moreover, with stealing old wills, obliterating them, forging false Shipway wills upon the parchment, and then reinstating among the records. The work being done, all these things were reported to the colonel as genuine relics, proving the antiquity of the Shipway fam-

TERRIBLE TRAGEDY

Burglars Murder an Old Priest and His Assistant.

Paris. Oct. 11.-A terrible tragedy has taken place at St. Patrice, near Chinon. Akron, Ohio, Oct. 11.-Clara Enstrom, the 13-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Enstrom, 128 Livingstone street, died last night in horrible agony. The doctors pronounced her case one of well-developed hydrophobia. Aug. 23 last the girl was attacked by a large cat, which bit her on the leg between the knee and hip, a doctor dress. ed the wound, and it was learned later that the cat had been bitten by a dog supposed to be mad. On last Thursday evening the first symptoms of the malady presented itself. grew rapidly worse, and the last few hours of the unfortunate little girl's sufferings were pitiful in the extreme.
