

BREAKWATER SAND "SANDS" TRACKS OF BOARD OF CONTROL

Causes Real Fireworks at Meeting Today.

CHARGE CITY ENGINEER

Aldermen Hostile to Official and Say So Unhesitatingly.

"There is a deputa-tion to see you, gentlemen!" Bang! Bang! Bang! The fireworks started to fly.

Ald. O. G. Keene and Ald. W. A. Wilson were "the deputa-tion." They called on the board of control today, and their mission was said for the London West breakwater. They were decidedly peeved at City Engineer H. A. Brazier. Ald. Keene was the stormy petrel, however. Fighting Bill Wilson was a peace-maker compared to him, but that does not mean that Ald. Bill was taking anything lying down.

We are going to have a show-down with the engineer, said Ald. Keene's declaration when he announced the deputa-tion of the city and the city engineer. No felicitations. It was a surprise bombardment launched in full force.

The utilities commission is moving a large quantity of sand from the Federal Square site. Ald. Keene and Ald. Wilson are much taken with fixing the West London breakwater.

They wanted this sand dumped there. They spoke to General Manager E. V. Buchanan, and he approved. They spoke to the engineer and he approved, but did nothing. He said it was a mis-understanding.

Show Down With Engineer. Said Ald. Keene: "We are going to have a show down with the engineer. He is not going to sit here and take the people's money and defy everyone, and try to get the money, and then send the sand to the breakwater. What is the matter? Does he sit in his office all day and do nothing?"

Engineer Brazier said that Ald. Wilson told him that he had arranged for the sand to go to the breakwater.

Ald. Keene said that he had spoken to Manager Buchanan and the latter replied that he was willing to send the sand to the breakwater. "What is the matter with the engineer?" demanded the aldermen. "Is he more at the other end of the line?"

Ald. Wilson interjected that it was the engineer's duty to see where the sand went.

Engineer Brazier said that it was a misunderstanding.

Scores Methods of Business. Ald. Keene retorted there were too many of those mis-understandings. He then turned to the mayor.

"These methods of doing business make me sick and tired," said Ald. Keene. "You promised me, your worship, that after the estimates were passed, that you were going to look into the methods of the different departments. I asked you to. Things are going wrong all the time. We are losing money away. I don't know whether you have done anything from this time you might have let me know."

Controller J. W. Saunders remarked that the sand would run off the breakwater into the river.

It was the signal for Ald. Wilson, while friend of the controller. He said that \$400 had been appropriated for the work. Two loads of earth had been put on the job. "My God," he cried, "why can't we get something done. I am not an enemy of the engineer, but I fight the old idea if he does anything wrong. Then Controller Saunders will come along and take his part. He makes me sick talking."

Controller Saunders replied that other men had been in the same position.

Will Get a Fight. Ald. Keene interrupted Controller Saunders stating that he had a fight for him to bluff all the time, but he was present for a show down.

"You have got to stand around here for anything you want. The engineer bucks me on everything I want because I opposed him a couple of times. If he wants fight he will get it," was the alderman's threat.

The sand will be diverted to the breakwater.

SPIRITUAL UNION, NOT CHURCH UNION, WORLD'S GREAT NEED

Baptist Pastor, at Closing Session, Discusses Problems.

Resolutions expressing the hearty thanks of the association to Rev. Dr. Gordon for his splendid addresses, and to the members of Wortley Road Baptist Church for their hospitality, were unanimously passed at last night's session of the annual meeting of the Middlesex and Lambton Baptist Association.

As the annual convention of Ontario and Quebec has been postponed, the churches were urged in another resolution to set aside the usual convention week in July.

The closing address by Rev. Dr. Gordon on "The Fourfold Christian Relation and Obligation," was considered possibly the best of the series of expositions which he delivered during the convention.

That the church is going mad on church union was one of the speaker's assertions. "The great need is for spiritual union, and this is what Christ meant when he prayed that they may be one."

I have no use for the co-operation of the church in which the staves have to be bound together by iron bands driven home until they nearly break with the strain.

Should Co-operate. The Baptist denomination should remain in harmony with the other Christian forces for the carrying on of God's work, and no more time should be wasted cavilling about church union.

Rev. R. McKay, Sarnia, preached the annual sermon. Rev. J. R. McKay, B.A., Sarnia, at the afternoon session, and was readily adopted.

There has been a net gain in the membership of the churches in the association of 69 during the last year. The membership is now 4,055. The total sum of \$54,727.08 was raised for all purposes, an increase of \$454.22 over last year. Property to the value of \$212.75 is held by the churches of the association. One new parsonage was built last year. A substantial increase had been given eight ministers of the association.

Delegates Satisfied. Considering war conditions and other things, the report was very creditable, the delegates thought.

Objection was taken by Rev. R. McKay to the method some of the churches used in raising money. It was suggested that the local treasurers should as far as possible be present at the association meetings.

One delegate suggested that the forms on which the reports are made were not easily understood. The discussion gave promise of being interesting when Rev. A. C. Bingham suggested that the association had matters of more importance than the church union.

Rev. James H. Boyd in an address set forth the evils attendant on the practice of dancing, card-playing and theatre attendance.

Rev. Dr. J. A. Gordon of Guelph gave an expository, if not a stirring, address on the influence of the Home on the spiritual life of the community.

"Spiritual Influence in the Community," by Rev. C. W. King, Arkona, was also very instructive.

BAIL GRANTED TO OFFICER CHARGED WITH M.S.A. BRIBERY

Charles H. Marsh, a former dominion police officer, appeared before Judge Talbot Macbeth at the courthouse today, and after pleading "not guilty" to a charge of attempted bribery, under the military service act, was bailed to appear for trial at the general sessions of the peace in December next. Bail was furnished to the extent of \$400.

Marsh received a preliminary hearing in police court on Thursday and was committed to the county jail. Marsh attempted to bribe High Constable Peters of Chatham in an effort to secure immunity from military service for two Dover Township residents.

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BOARD OF CONTROL REGRETS PROPOSAL TO INCREASE PAY OF ALL WORKS EMPLOYEES

Votes Down Recommendation to Grant Garbagemen Their \$3.00 Per Day—War m Discussion On the Question Today.

The board of control today kicked the garbage system high in the air, and with it the fond hopes of some 40 other municipal workers that they would get a 10 per cent increase. When the controllers refused to accept the recommendation of the board of works that the garbage collectors and other laborers of the works department be granted a 10 per cent increase. They killed the report of the committee and will recommend to the council on Monday night that no action be taken.

Controller C. H. Merryfield presented a motion that the garbage collectors be granted a 10 per cent increase. It was granted, he said, he would move that all the firemen, policemen and the clerks of the engineer's office all be granted a 10 per cent increase.

"Men get in the council and vote any way, and sacrifice everything to the five votes," declared the controller.

Controller Merryfield replied that the council had better be careful. He said he paid the 15 cents a day demanded by the men, and not had the horses eating their heads off in the streets.

Controller Saunders said that it was not right to have the aldermen running around interfering with departmental matters.

ONE WILLIAMS SAYS "YOU CAN," OTHER ONE SAYS "YOU CANNOT"

Chief of Police and Toronto N amesake of Food Board Hold Different Views On Amendments to Cafe Meal Restrictions Which Permit Serving of Prescribed Meats Under Certain Conditions.

The latest order of the Canada food board changes the hours of the evening meal from 6 o'clock to 9 in the evening to 5:30 o'clock to 8:30 o'clock in the evening. This alteration of one-half hour was made at the request of hundreds of cafe men throughout the Dominion.

Another important change permits the serving at any time of the day of pork tenderloins and spareribs as cut by packers. These could only be served formerly at specified times on certain days.

Beef stews composed of chunks, brisquets, and leftovers and cheap cuts of meat, may be served any day at the midday meal. This is decidedly to the advantage of the proprietors of public eating places, who have been forced to serve beef cuts spilt that they were unable to serve on certain days.

The above information was given to the proprietors of the local cafe yesterday, and advised the proprietors of the new regulations which he claimed to have received.

Prosecute, Says Chief. Chief W. T. Williams, interviewed today concerning the information given out by N. W. Williams, and stated that as soon as the police department he would enforce the law only as he knew it, not as his Toronto namesake advised.

"Any proprietor of any cafe in this city who changes his hours for meals, or serves beef or pork tenderloins, or any other meat, as specified in the regulations, as I have it," said Chief Williams today.

"Who is this man, Williams? What right has he to come here and change the order of things in London restaurant?" asked Chief Williams.

"You can give the cafe men full warning that if they change their rules, they will be prosecuted. When I get notice of any change in the food-order I will let the police know, and they will enforce the law of which I have a copy goes here in London."

Several of the cafe proprietors called on Chief Williams today and asked if they could accept the instructions of the other Williams. The chief informed them all, in no uncertain language, that they altered their rules until they advised them to do so, they would be summoned to court and prosecuted.

What Orders Mean. N. W. Williams, assistant secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association Provincial Board, has been in the city a few days, explaining to the cafe proprietors the new order which permits them greater latitude in the serving of certain meats.

In this order: (a) "Public Eating Place" shall include hotel, restaurant, catered club or club-room, private family keeping boarders, boardinghouse, school, dining hall, or any place whatsoever where meals or refreshments are regularly served or sold to others than members of the family or household of the proprietor or caterer.

(b) "Pork" shall mean any part of the carcass of a pig, whether fresh or cured in any form save and except hams, tongues, tails, hearts, livers, kidneys, sweetbreads, suet, tallow, sausages and products made therefrom.

(c) "Beef and Veal" shall mean any part of the carcass whether fresh or cured in any form save and except hams, tongues, tails, hearts, livers, kidneys, sweetbreads, suet, tallow, sausages and products made therefrom.

(d) "Meal" shall mean all the food a person consumes during any one of the periods for serving same as hereinafter limited.

(e) "Morning Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 5:30 a.m. and 10 a.m.

"Midday Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

"Evening Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 5:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m.

The whole of the Canada food board in this order as well as in previous ones is to conserve meat, beef and bacon.

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ASK MANUFACTURERS TO RELEASE MEN FOR MIDDLESEX HARVEST

Special Campaign Will Be Started in London.

CONFERENCE HELD HERE

County Council and the Board of Trade Members Met.

A committee appointed by the county council and a similar committee selected by the London Board of Trade met in conference at the Tecumseh House today to formulate plans to relieve the labor shortage in the harvest.

The question was discussed at length, the representatives from the county council pointing out the importance of the need of more help to replace the men in the county called from the farms into the army. The situation is so serious, stated the county representatives, that help must be forthcoming or many crops will go unharvested.

The members of the board of trade committee expressed a willingness to do everything in their power to solve the problem. A campaign to secure the necessary men will be inaugurated here at once. Large manufacturers and employers of labor will be asked to release every available man for farm work.
