RECEIVE BOMBS
THROUGH MAIL

Infernal Machines in Some Cases Marked for the Cabinet Ministers.

Washington, April 30.—Postoffice inspectors at New York City reported today the discovery there of seventeen infernal machines put into the mail addressed to prominent officials, including cabinet officers.

Every agency of the national and municipal governments was at work to-night trying to track the "Reds" responsible for the terrorist bomb plot which has startled the country.

The seventeen bombs were found, literally by chance. Apparently they were identical with six others which went through the mails safely and were delivered to the persons to whom they were addressed. How many others have been mailed no one can tell.

From all the information available to-night it was apparent the makers of the bombs hoped to exterminate everyone who has been prominently involved in the prosecution of members of the Industrial Workers of the World.

BOMBS MAILED TO 'FRISCO.

San Francisco, April 30.—Two bombs were delivered by mail to the district attorney's office of San Francisco Saturday morning. One was addressed to

Charles M. Pickett, district attorney,

and another to Edward Cunha, assistant district attorney. They were mailed from New York.

REVOLT IN ALBANIA AGAINST ITALIANS RAPIDLY SPREADING

SALONIKI, April 30.—The revolt in Albania against the Italian troops of occupation is spreading wider and wider, according to advices to the Greek newspaper Hellas. The commander of the rebels is said to have a force of 4,000 men.

Several hundred Albanians, it is added, have sent a message to the peace conference denouncing Italian acts in Albania and affirming confidence in Essad Pasha.

PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD

FAVORS LANGUAGE
TEST BEFORE VOTING

Woodstock Session Bars
Aliens From Ballot For
Five Years.

WOODSTOCK, April 30.—At the concluding session of the Presbyterian Synod of Hamilton and London today the alien question came up for discussion, the result of which was the passing of a resolution to be forwarded to the general assembly asking that body to memorialize the Dominion Government to restrict all aliens coming into the country from voting until they could both read and speak the English language. It was the opinion of the meeting that aliens should at least live five years in the country before being allowed to use the franchise. At present, it was pointed out, aliens did not vote intelligently. As a rule they lived in settlements, spoke and wrote their own language, and simply voted as they were instructed.

Dr. McDonald of Toronto was appointed by the synod as its representative to the American General Assembly, which meets at St. Louis this summer. On the invitation of Rev. C. S. Oke of Brantford the 1920 meeting of the synod will be held in Brantford.

RUTHENIANS OF MANITOBA MAY OPEN REBELLION

Mr. Richardson, M.P., Receives Word Uprising Is Planned For This Month.

WARNING TO PARLIAMENT

Mennonites of West Are Objected To—Those of Western Ontario Good People.

OTTAWA, April 30.—Hon. J. A. Calder's immigration bill was the one subject of debate in the Commons today. The most interesting development arose out of a statement by R. L. Richardson, M.P., that there was a serious situation amongst the Ruthenians in the province of Manitoba. Richardson, who has been in the province for some time, said the information had been given him by D. A. Ross, M.P.P.

With the House in committee on Calder's immigration bill, Donald Richardson, M.P., said that the Mennonites of Western Canada needed financial grants, but it neither required nor wished for persons who would not become good citizens.

Mr. Richardson took the ground that the new citizens of Canada must learn English if they were to become good Canadians. The Mennonites' property rights were vested in a single individual. One reason why these people had come to Canada from South Dakota was that the United States authorities wished to divide their property rights among the various individuals. The Mennonites also refused to recognize certain of the laws of the country to the south.

Mr. Richardson of Springfield, declared that the Ruthenians had been seduced by politicians on both sides. In Manitoba the Ruthenians were organized into clubs and herded. They were supplied with whiskey and beer. Their votes were bought. Members from their own class were given offices and used as political bosses. Mr. Richardson did not think any greater crime had been perpetrated than against the foreign population. The present Government in Manitoba, however, was pursuing an excellent policy. Mr. Richardson said, in regard to the Ruthenians:

Uprising This Month?

He stated that he had received disturbing reports from his own and other constituents and an uprising was expected. There was a large Ruthenian population in his riding, and of course they were not given the vote at the last election. He said he had a letter from D. A. Ross, a member of the Manitoba Legislature, which stated that great danger existed. Mr. Ross

had also asked him by telephone while he was in Winnipeg, to warn the Government at Ottawa. He had made a tour of the constituency and they were talking of rising on some date in May. Richardson said, "Mr. Ross, he said, had told him about Bishop Budka, who, he said, was behind the trouble. Mr. Richardson said he had no personal knowledge of the doings of Bishop Budka, but Mr. Ross had assured him that he was a very dangerous man."

He had heard that the returned soldiers were going to deal with Bishop Budka, and he felt assured that if they did so they would do it in a summary manner. He thought Bishop Budka should be called upon to show why he should not be deported.

Dr. Michael Clark said he did not agree with the policy of the Immigration bill. The Government had taken extraordinary steps to prevent unemployment, and he would not give the Government the policy of relief measures for the present population and increase of the world's population. A more fruitful line of Government activity would be to see what was wrong with the method of taxation and the trade policy. If Canada were governed properly she would not need to seek the world for relief measures. Dr. Clark favored closing the borders of Canada against three years, except to carefully-selected citizens of allied countries.

Government Should Act Now.

Major Andrews of Winnipeg emphasized the strength of the feeling in Western Canada against admission of the Ruthenians, and Major Redman of Calgary urged that the Government should pass an order-in-council now excluding Ruthenians, Mennonites and Doukhobors.

Dr. Whidden of Brandon said there must be provision made for the education of immigrants coming into Canada, so as to fit them for Canadian citizenship. Letting down the bars and admitting all classes of immigrants was not the way to build a nation. Such action would result in Canada becoming a group of states.

Mr. Richardson told the committee that he wished to emphasize the fact that he was absolutely opposed to the entry of Mennonites, Doukhobors and Ruthenians to Canada.

Defends the Mennonites.

Dr. Michael Clark declared that the Government should realize that every immigrant landed in Canada was its ward, entitled to an education in Canadian citizenship. Dr. Steel strongly defended the Mennonites located in Western Canada. He said these people were good farmers, industrious workers, and lived moral lives. They were not pro-Germans in their sympathies. During the war, and contributed largely to Red Cross and war funds. They were, however, absolutely opposed to fighting.

James Douglas of Strathcona also spoke in support of the Mennonites. Those of Northern Alberta, with whom he was familiar, lived very similar to Canadians. He thought that Mennonites should not all be classed as bad citizens because some of them proved unsatisfactory.

W. D. Ester of North Waterloo agreed with Dr. Steel as to the Mennonites of Western Ontario. He had a colony of them in his own constituency, and he thought they were in the best class of Canadian citizens. The majority of them in Western Ontario had not come from an enemy nation, but had emigrated to Canada from Pennsylvania.

Dr. Edwards of Frontenac was of opinion that the Government should take immediate action to prevent the entry of Ruthenians into Canada. Just before the House rose, Mr. Mackie of Edmonton, read a telegram which he had received from Lieut. R. Keymer, dated from Winnipeg. The deputy speaker ruled that Mr. Mackie could not read the telegram except as a matter of privilege, but D. D. McKenzie suggested that he could do so by general consent. Mr. Mackie was proceeding to read the telegram, but he heard someone object. He thought it was Mr. Richardson, and said so, but the member for Springfield explained that he had no objection.

Mr. A. L. Davidson, Annapolis, was the objector, and Mr. Mackie, therefore, was unable to give the House the contents of the telegram.

Backbone of Unionists.

Mr. Mackie subsequently gave the Canadian Press the telegram, which was as follows: "The Ukrainians are the only solid backbone behind Union Government in Canada. I have known them since 1914. Conspiracy to get him out of Canada by a bunch of scoundrels. You know me for years, and you may depend on my word. You know what I have accomplished for the British flag amongst Ukrainians in Canada, and you may tell the Government that they can rely upon Ukrainian element notwithstanding what an organized cannard may invent. Ukrainians all over Canada calm and supporting all the measures of Union Government. Letting down the bars and admitting all classes of immigrants will shake their confidence in the Dominion Government. Tell straight to the House that Ross is lying."

CITY SWAMPED IN PAMPHLETS OF BOLSHEVISTS

Brantford Flooded in Night—Urge Russian Program—Arrests Expected.

BRANTFORD, April 30.—Brantford was flooded here in the early hours of the morning with another batch of communist literature issued by a "Central Executive Committee." The pamphlets were headed "May Day," and called for the entire Russian program being inaugurated in this country. The police believe that boys were secured to make the house-to-house distribution, and expect to make arrests of the principals.

MILLION UNEMPLOYED IN THE BRITISH ISLES

LONDON, Tuesday, April 29.—In defending the Government's policy of donations to the unemployed, Sir Robert Stevenson Horne, the minister of labor, in the House of Commons today said it was unnecessary to take a gloomy view of the unemployment question.

Since the armistice, he said, four million persons have been demobilized from the army and naval forces and from civilian employment, and one million remain unemployed.

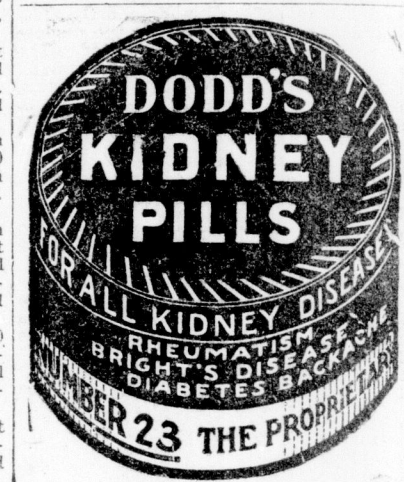
