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LONG SHOTS AND GOOD RACES MARK ROCKPORT CARD

Que Zinn Is in Spectacular Finish After Bad Breaks in 2:15—Is Booked For Grand Circuit.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 31.—Shrill shrieks of glee punctuated the staccato of pounding hoofs at Rockport this afternoon, for with very few exceptions, each heat turned in a longshot, and the public was happy for the part-mutuels were turning out a golden stream to those who like to find the sleepers.

Good races were the rule. The classes were well filled, and heats hotly contested. Iva Zinn, favorite, to win the 2:15 pace, pulled off another startling performance, when after breaking twice in the final heat, she came up from last and won out in the stretch by barely more than a head. Her performance was even more astounding than that of a few days ago, when she came in third after having broken badly.

Clevelanders will see no more of this sleek bay performer until next year, for this morning she will be taken to the Bennett stables at North Randall, there to wait for the ice races in Canada.

Chances are she will be taken direct to the Grand Circuit next spring. Undoubtedly she has a future.

East Sheet paid the best price of the day, when she won the second heat of the 2:15 trot. Those who backed her to win received \$57.50 for their \$2 tickets, while a second place holder got back \$22.80 for his pastebard.

Britton Finch, which placed second in the second heat, handed back \$14.20 for a \$2 ticket, and Lena Moko, third, paid off at the rate of \$19.80 for \$2.

SHAG'S TRICK TACTICS ARE UPHELD BY QUEEN'S PROF.

MONTREAL, Oct. 31.—Owing to the numerous criticisms written regarding the trick plays used by McGill rugby team, Coach Shaughnessy wrote to Professor Malcolm of the University of Toronto, who referred the game between Queen's and McGill on October 18, for an opinion. In his reply, the Professor states that in his long experience as an official in the Inter-Collegiate Rugby Union, that he has never observed over more sportsmanlike or gentlemanly aggregation of players than those of the McGill team.

In speaking of the trick plays, and alleged offside interference, Mr. Malcolm goes on to state that all the plays conform with the interpretation placed on the interference rule at a special meeting of the board of referees of the Inter-Collegiate Rugby Union, held in the autumn. He gives Shaughnessy credit for taking advantage of opportunities offered, but in no way finds fault with any of the plays used in opening holes in the line of scrimmage for the purpose of bucking.
