## CRUSHED UNDER AUTO.

Frightful Accident Near Brunswick—Avoiding Child Cyclist.

BRUNSWICK, June 5.—A fatal automobile accident took place near here to-day. Lieut.-Commander Assmann and First Lieut. Johannes Fritzsche were killed and First Lieut. Elmanhorst and the chauffeur, a man named Eioke, were severely injured. The automobile was a high power machine. As it was entering a small village the chauffeur endeavored to

avoid running over a girl cyclist and to do so he suddenly put on the full brake power. The machine, instead of slackening down, is said to have turned practically a double somersault. It fell upon the occupants and crushed them.

## IMPROVING WELLAND CANAL.

Lock Gates Being Equipped With Motors to Hury Operations.

ST. CATHARINES, June 5.—(Special.)—The lock gates on the Welland Canal are now being equipped with five horse power motors, by which they can be opened in 30 seconds and closed in the same time. Previously it required eight minutes to open and close the gates, so that the new arrangements will make a saving of three hours in the passage of a steamer from Port Colborne.

## Crushing the Insurrection.

SEOUL, June 5.—The active movement to suppress the insurrection is now general throughout Korea. Japanese troops have been distributed in all disaffected provinces, and an aggressive campaign has been inaugurated with a view of quickly capturing the various semi-organized bands of insurgents and suppressing the insurrectionary element.

## COVERED 2 FEET DEEP WITH AGREEMENTS NOW

Says Blackstock, K.C., Arguing That the Railway Tracks Can't Be Raised From the Level.

Another day was spent before the Dominion Railway Commission in argument upon the jurisdiction of that board to order the construction of a viaduct.

H. L. Drayton, K.C., took up the problem on behalf of the board of trade. The arguments used by the railway counsel, he said, were not new, but were old tunes that had often been played before, altho on this occasion a full orchestra was repeating them. It was argued that because the railways were on the ground, under certain acts validating agreements, and these agreements dealt with the question of public safety under conditions which were practically those of a country village, the board had no power to deal with the question of public safety under the present conditions. Under the same argument the board would have no power to order protection by means of watchmen or by gates. All that would remain would be the right of the railway to run their trains just as they pleased along the Esplanade. Any mistake of the past did not bind the board, he argued. Mistakes by the city should not be allowed to stand in the way of the rights of the public.

My learned friend," began Mr. Blackstock, "having a fine time hunting these corporation tigers through the tangle jungle of municipal imbecility."

It was a monstrous proposition, said Mr. Blackstock, taking up the argument for the C.P.R., that the board should be asked to run a plover thru and to turn aside all the agreements which had been validated by acts of parliament. The whole area, he said, was covered two feet deep with agreements. The board, he contended, might raise or lower the level of the Esplanade, but there was nothing in the act giving it power to take the same liberties with the level of the railway tracks. The board had exhausted its whole power in ordering the construction of the Yonge-street bridge. Each other cross would have to be taken up separately and those streets to the east all ended at the C.P.R. right of way and was, therefore, no crossing.

Hamilton Cassels appeared for certain property owners along the right of way who are opposed to the viaduct and argued that the board had not the right to interfere with the local already built.

Mr. Fullerton, on behalf of the city, spent the afternoon in replying to the arguments brought forward by the Shapley force to the C.P.R. The first agreement of 1853 had been broken by the city, but the next year the legislature had practically taken the city by the throat and given it two years to carry out the agreement. The objects of the agreements were not to cover up the business, but simply to assist in carrying out its provisions. These agreements had not been broken, the railways coming to the board to ask for a new station site, for power to expropriate more property and to jurisdiction of the board be wiped out when the city applied to have the station along the waterfront altered.

Chairman Macbee referred to the station agreement of 1905 and asked if Mr. Fullerton, for the city, would be willing to have that site, which he said it was fair, be asked, when the city had entered into that agreement, to withdraw?

No money of importance had been paid under the agreement, replied Mr. Fullerton. The railways had come to the board asking for that site and all the city had done was to consent to the proposition made by the railways. The argument will be resumed this morning at 10 o'clock.

## UNIVERSITY CONVOCATION.

Arrangements for Accommodation of Alumni and the Public.

The convocation exercises of Toronto University will take place next week. Alumni of the university who desire tickets to convocation may secure them by application to the registrar up to Wednesday next. The seats, which will be free of charge, will be open to the public after 2.30 on Friday next.

The graduating classes of all faculties will assemble in Convocation Hall at 3 p.m. on Wednesday, when the president will deliver an address. The seats on the main floor will be reserved for students; the galleries will be open to the public.

Commencement exercises will take place on Friday at 2.30 p.m. in Convocation Hall. Candidates for degrees will assemble at 1.15 in the west hall to be marshalled to the procession to the hall. There will be a garden party in the quadrangle of the university immediately after the close of the commencement exercises. Admission will be by ticket.

It is the intention of the university to invite the members of the graduating classes to dinner on Friday. Seats will be reserved for those who announce to the registrar their intention to be present and who apply for the ticket of admission on or before June 9.
