Information: Even Ralph Smith had voted round and had voted against him then. Now, however, he found him proposing the same policy.

Mr. Borden said he was disposed to give every possible consideration to the claims of workmen, but if the question went to a special committee, it must not be shelved. Employers and employees must both be heard and the bill brought back before the end of the session.

Mr. King replied that if any member introduced any measure which would make possible an eight-hour day he would support it.

Mr. Meighen remarked that the extreme capriciousness of his "ifs" was a feature of his addresses. The minister was already vying with the minister of public works as the "jollier" of this generation. He asked Mr. King to state definitely if he was prepared to adopt the eight-hour day labor in government work.

Committee Named.
The bill was then given a second reading, and on motion of Mr. Verville the following committee were appointed to take evidence: Messrs. Macdonnell, King, A. C. Macdonnell, W. D. Stables, Marshall, Ralph Smith, Prosser and Verville.

Mr. King said he had no instructions to give the committee.

Amid cries of "Question" the speaker rose, the committee was declared appointed and the house passed on to the consideration of Mr. Macdonnell's bill to amend the Elections Act.

The chief provisions of Mr. Macdonnell's bill were the abolition of the \$200 deposit and a holiday upon the day of general election.

Mr. Aylesworth moved the six months' hold, holding that the deposit prevented frivolous candidature, and that such a public holiday might lead to disorders.

OBSERVATORY, TORONTO, Dec. 9.—(9 p.m.)—The cold has continued through the western provinces, and has been particularly severe in Manitoba where minima of 34 and 35 below zero have been recorded. CASHIER COMMITS SUICIDE

Was Two Thousand Dollars Short in His Accounts.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Dec. 9.—(Special).—Henry F. Heenan, forty-four years of age, and employed as cashier in the Dominion Fire Insurance Company's office here, drank carbolic acid in the afternoon and died after being admitted to the hospital. Heenan was two thousand dollars short in his accounts and a warrant had been issued for his arrest. Sooner than face criminal prosecution, he committed suicide. He leaves a widow and six children and was especially prominent in musical circles, being director of the city cornet band and of several local orchestras.

HEART AS EVIDENCE

Doctor Explains Course Bullet Took by Exhibiting Exposed Organ.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Dec. 9.—(Special).—By exhibiting a dead man's heart in a glass case, a physician to-day gave evidence of the course of the bullet which caused the death of Peter Scurry, colored man, who last week was murdered by his mistress, Julie Lewis. The witness claimed that the shooting was accidental and that Scurry ran 50 yards after he was shot. The physician testified that the tearing of the heart by the bullet would cause immediate death.

PICTURES OF MURDER

Moving Reproductions of Prince Ito's Assassination to Be Used as Evidence.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 9.—(Special).—The steamship Kagamari, from Oriental ports this morning, brings word that a moving picture reproduction of the scene at the Harbin Railway Station, when Prince Ito was fatally assassinated by a Korean assassin's trial, this being probably the first time that the cinematograph has been employed as a factor in criminal law.
