A great deal of useful information is now ready for the public at the bureau, No. 13 West Adelaide street. Bulletins are published outlining the polling sub-divisions and the polling place of each sub-division together with the list of questions and bylaws that will be submitted at the elections on New Year's Day. Conditions under which a citizen may vote are also part of the printed matter ready for circulation amongst that portion of the public who may ask for it.

One of the commonest questions asked by visitors to the bureau is "I want to know if I'm listed properly. Last year I was a tenant, now I've moved and I now have my own Or it may be that the information given is reversed, the onetime owner being now a tenant. again in no few instances the necessary change has not been made. The bureau have received word from the city hall that it will be considered good citizenship on the part of anyone who will give information—espe-cially in writing—of errors or omissions on the voters' list.




# WITNESSES DO NOT APPEAR AT INQUEST
