
ADD DAILY TO FORCES

## British government holdings of wheat would be sufficient for all British requirements to the end of the season had depressing effect today on the wheat narket here. Prices closed unsettled at 1/8 to 1% net lower, with March 1.50%

Imarket here. Prices closed unsettled at 1½ to 1½ net lower, with March 1.50% and May 1.41¼ to 1.41½. Corn lost 1½ to 1%, and oats ½ to ½c. In provisions the outcome was unchanged to 15c down. Bears in wheat were prompt to take advantage of the outlook that there would he very little further buying for Great Britain in this country until the new crop became ready to move. Favor-able crop reports tended also to weaken the market, the general tenor of advices being that likelihood of any disaster from the green bug pest was about over. During the first half of the day, before such news was a factor, prices had an upward slant owing largely to hope that export business would de-velop, especially with Greece. In addi-tion, gossip was circulated that a good part of the available supply of durum wheat at the head of the lakes had been purchased for export. After midday, however, the disposition to sell was gen-eral, with early buyers among the readiest to unload. Despite curtailment of receipts, corn and oats gave way to the influence of wheat weakness. Provisions were dull and inclined to lag, pending return to more stable wage conditions in the packing houses.
