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CORNELIUS SHIELDS DIES

AFTER ONE DAY'S ILLNESS

Only a Few Hours Before His Death

Did Condition Begin to

Look Serious.

Sault Ste. Marie, Oct. 28.—(Special).—

Cornelius Shields, general manager

Lake Superior Corporation, died early

this morning at his home here. The

cause of his demise is described by the

attending physicians as oedema, or

swelling of the lungs, caused by the

accumulation of serum matter in the

cellular tissue, accompanied by heart

failure. The deceased had been ill only

one day and it was but a few hours

before his death that his illness, which

commenced with tonsillitis, began to

look serious. That was last evening

and three local medical men, Drs. Mc-

Lean, McCaig and McLaugh, were in

attendance. Their efforts were, how-

ever, unavailing, and death supervened

about 2 o'clock a.m.

Mr. Shields leaves a widow, four

sons and three daughters. Mrs. Shields

and the two younger sons were alone

at home. A brother, Daniel Shields,

resides at Michipicott. The funeral

arrangements will be delayed until he

and the other members of the family

arrive. The body will likely be taken

to Lacrosse, Wis., on Monday for burial

beside the remains of his father.

Mr. Shields was 49 years of age and

was born in Albany, N.Y. He began

his career as waterboy with a railroad

construction gang, then became a tele-

grapher and afterwards joined J. J. Hill's

railroad enterprises, with which he

was associated for several years.

At a later date he managed the Virgin-

ia Coke and Coal Company for a

couple of years and went from there to

Sydney, C.B., to manage the plants of

the Dominion Coal and Iron Company.

In April, 1903, he came to the Soo and

faced the problem of reorganizing the

Lake Superior Companies, which were

then in financial difficulties. In this

he was successful after several months'

labor and also succeeded in placing the

plants here on a profitable working

basis. In the hour of the realization of

his hopes Mr. Shields has been taken

away, and his death has cast great

gloom over the town.

Charles D. Warren, the president of

the Lake Superior Corporation, heard the

news in New York yesterday. Mr. War-

ren is now in Toronto last night. N. W.

Rovell, K.C., the other Toronto di-

rector, was in Kingston yesterday morn-

ing. He is expected to arrive here to-

day by private telegram from Mr. Wynn,

general auditor to the corporation.

Shields, however, gave no particular

reasons for his death. He was a particu-

larly energetic and successful manager

of the company's affairs. He was a

man of great energy and initiative.
