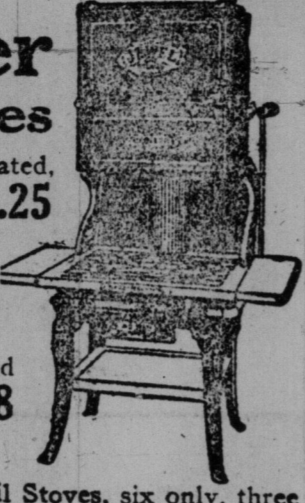

Dozen Cases Daily of Cholera in Italy

Dread Disease Appears in Several Districts—Death Rate Averaged One in Four.

ROME, July 8.—The government insists that the general condition of health throughout the country is most excellent, notwithstanding the appearance of cholera in several regions. This, the government maintains, is not Asiatic cholera, and therefore the cases were not announced by the authorities. In the belief that the situation might be exaggerated abroad and cause unjustified apprehension at home. During the first fortnight of June, several of the cases occurred in Venice, having been imported, it is claimed, from Trieste. The cases were energetically combated, and soon disappeared. Almost simultaneously, Naples and the surrounding provinces were attacked. There were a dozen cases daily, and the death rate averaged about one in four. The epidemic in Naples also was circumscribed. At Palermo conditions were graver. The cases numbered over 20 a day, but the death rate here also averaged one in four.

Outside of these there were a few cases in smaller places imported, it is claimed, from Naples or Palermo.

OBJECT TO BYLAW

Milk Dealers of City Say Ordinance Cannot Be Enforced.

The milk bylaw proposed by Dr. Hastings is regarded very unfavorably by the majority of milk dealers in the city, many of whom candidly admit that they believe it cannot be enforced. Some of the larger firms, such as the Dairy, Prices, etc., state that they do not regard with any concern the new bylaw. These companies claim that the standard by which their milk business has been conducted is as high as that required by the bylaw.

Other milk dealers in the city maintain, however, that the new bylaw, if it is ever passed at all by the council, can never be enforced.

The objectionable clause, especially objectionable to the milk dealers, is the clause which reads: "Any case of contagious disease of a person employed about or in connection with a dairy, or in any family

receiving milk, must be reported at once to the medical health officer."

The milk dealers of the city interpret this to mean that they will have to ascertain daily whether there is contagious disease in any house which they are supplying with milk, and that they will have to be fully qualified medical inspectors to do so.

"Some of the remarks of the people would be very complimentary," said Mr. Dunlop of the Dunlop Dairy on Wilton-avenue. "If we were to rouse them out of bed at 4 o'clock in the morning to enquire if they have any cases of contagious disease in the house, I hesitate to say that the information given would be correct."

The milk producers are also arranging for a conference with the milk dealers regarding the advisability of increasing the price of milk, owing to the warm weather and the indifference of the farmers in supplying milk under so extremely rigid conditions of inspection.

Hotelmen Pay Up Well.

Only three days remain for the hotel men to pay the five per cent. tax on their bar receipts for June. The past few days of intense heat have probably been the cause of very little money from this source coming into the provincial treasury, but returns were arriving yesterday thick and fast.

The government officials state that there is not much trouble now in hunting up delinquents. Everybody pays up, and on schedule time. The estimated receipts for June will be approximately the same as the previous month, the amount received for May being upwards of \$18,000.

Strikers' Families In Pathetic Parade

Two Thousand Women and Children Beg for Charity on the Streets of Manchester.

LONDON, July 8.—While there has been a gradual improvement in the outlook for cessation of the shipping strike, there were no fresh developments this morning except a provision-

al settlement, subject to the approval of the strikers, between the dockers and the employers on the Manchester Ship Canal.

The conference that has been in progress for several days at Manchester between the board of trade and the representatives of the strikers, has not yet resulted in an agreement.

Two thousand strikers' wives, with children clinging to their skirts, paraded thru Manchester and Salford yesterday, making a collection from the charitable public. They presented a pathetic spectacle.

In Glasgow harbor, for the first time

in three weeks, work was in full swing yesterday.

CITY WON'T CUT RATES

No Attempt to Be Made to Underquote Toronto Electric Light.

The new rates of the Toronto Electric Light Company for direct commercial power, are in some regards lower than those of the civic electrical department. There will, however, be no further cut in rates at the city hall at present.

Managing Engineer Aitken expresses himself as entirely satisfied with the situation.

"It is a convincing illustration of the benefits hydro-electric power is conferring on our citizens," said Mr. Aitken to "The World." "Hydro-electric rates have forced on the company a reduction about averaging 33 1-3 per cent. on power and lighting. That means that the citizens of Toronto have been saved close on half a million dollars. If the civic electrical department is patronized as it should be we will be in a position to make further reductions in our rates. More revenue means cheaper light and power."

The Toronto Electric Light Company's rate for direct current commercial lighting is eight cents per kilowatt hour for the first 30 hours of the month, and 3 cents per kilowatt hour over that amount. The city's rate is 10 cents per kilowatt hour for the first 30 hours of the month and 4 cents per kilowatt hour for all over 30 kilowatts.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK IN HUNGARY.

BUDAPEST, Hungary, July 8.—Two earthquake shocks were felt early this morning in the Town of Keokemet, 30 miles distant from this city. A panic followed, the inhabitants rushing out into the streets and assembling in the squares. Hundreds of chimneys were overturned and the town hall and other buildings more or less damaged.
