### U. N. B.-INDIAN GAME IS OFF

Misunderstanding is Responsible for the Trouble.

The football match advertised between the Algonquins and U. N. B., on the Shamrock grounds today, has been declared off as the result of a misunderstanding of the arrangements for the game.

The U. N. B. team arrived in the city yesterday on the steamer Prince Rupert from Digby and went through to Fredericton last night.

On Wednesday the manager of the Algonquins talked to the manager of the U. N. B. team by telephone at Windsor, and on account of the wire not working right it was necessary for the two managers to transmit their messages through the operator at Windsor, and some misunderstanding has occurred.

The U. N. B. manager felt that he had made himself understood that the game would take place while the Algonquin manager understood it otherwise.

A good number of tickets have been sold and the money for these will be refunded if the tickets will be made good for a game next Saturday, when either a double header will be played—the two local teams playing college teams—or a match game between them will take place.

Whatever arrangements are made the Algonquins say the purchasers will be treated in the fairest possible manner.

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### ENDORSES THE P. E. I. TUNNEL

Moncton Board of Trade Is Unanimous In Its Favor After Hearing Delegates.

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 8.—Father Burke, Captain Read, M. P. P., and J. E. B. McCready, of P. E. Island, addressed a board of trade tonight on the tunnel project between the mainland and P. E. Island. The island speakers strongly urged the scheme and asked the co-operation of Moncton as being particularly interested, and the question was discussed for two hours, speakers of the local board of trade heartily supporting the tunnel.

Besides the island delegation, President Welch, Secretary Welch, Vice-President E. C. Cole, F. W. Sumner, Mayor White, A. E. Killam, Paul Lee, of the board of trade, spoke in advocacy of the project, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"That the Moncton Board of Trade expresses its appreciation of the act of the gentlemen from P. E. Island in coming to Moncton and addressing this board upon a subject of so great interest and such vital importance to the mainland."

"That we do express our hearty sympathy with and promise our energetic support to the project of construction of a tunnel between the island and mainland."

"This was moved by D. L. Welch and seconded by F. W. Sumner."

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### PEOPLE OF NOTE



Frederick Maynes Newell, who was made chief hydrographer of the United States geological survey department in 1888, is an important factor in the branch of the government service and is very familiar with the ideas on land reclamation now being used in Washington. He was born in Bradford, Penn., on March 5th, 1862, and was educated in Needham, Mass. He graduated at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology at Boston as a mining engineer in 1885. Mr. Newell married Miss Edith Josephine Mackintosh on April 3, 1890. He was engaged in mining operations in Colorado and was employed as a general mining expert in various states. Mr. Newell is well known as a writer on engineering subjects for the technical journals.

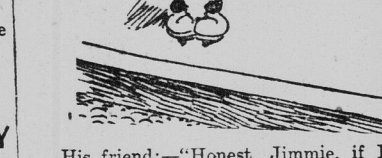
"Jim, you sell kerosene, don't you?" "I do," says he. "It's Rockefeller's kerosene, hasn't it?" "She be."

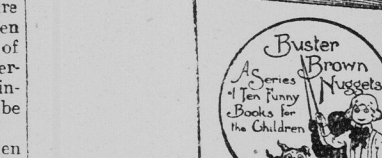

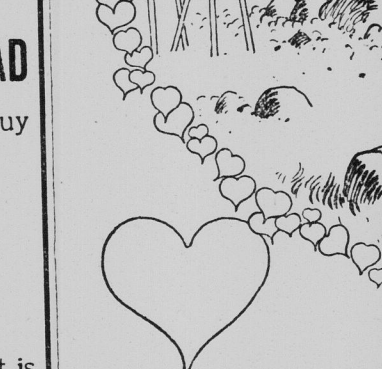

November 9, 1889—Eight years ago today Admiral George Dewey and Mrs. Mildred Hazen were married in Washington. Find another Cupid.

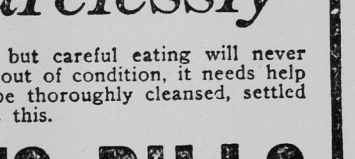
ANSWER TO YESTERDAY'S PUZZLE.
