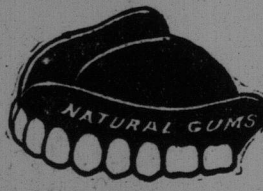

IN FAVOR OF COMMISSION

Debate at Every Day Club Last Evening Was Very Interesting One.

The debate in the Every Day Club hall last evening was on the subject of Commission versus City Council in St. John. That a commission of five would be better than the present system was maintained by Messrs. Belding, Humbert, McLaughlin and Colman and the negro by Messrs. Writtrich, Tait, Titus and Cohoe. The judges, Messrs. J. A. Likely, William Macdonald and R. B. Porter, decided that the affirmative had the best of the argument.

Mr. Likely, being called upon, expressed his own views in favor of a commission. He suggested that fifty of the largest taxpayers might be selected to nominate ten or a dozen suitable men, and from these the people would be free to select four or five commissioners. Under such a system, he felt, good men could be secured.

Rev. R. Matthews also spoke in an interesting way, in support of a commission, and especially condemning the system of street construction in St. John.

The debaters in favor of a commission contended that it would result in the choice of better men and the performance of better service, and would in the end be cheaper than the present system. A large number of men were interested listeners.

Councillor Freeze, of Cardwell, was one of those who heard the debate, and expressed himself well pleased with the Every Day Club, Gordie Allen sang a couple of solos.

The subject of the debate next Thursday evening will be the effect of labor saving machinery upon the interests of the laboring man.

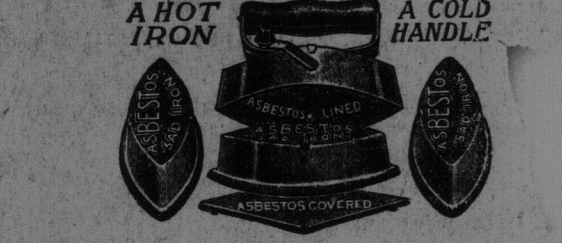
