Failures are on the increase. Lines of industry that are unprecedentedly busy figure prominently in the list. Yesterday a knit goods man told of the failure of one of the mills in which he is interested. Orders, he said, were never on a larger scale, but when contracts were booked raw material, wages and every item of expense were on a lower scale, and now the mill cannot deliver goods at the stipulated price. This is by no means an isolated instance. Cotton mills are sold up from six to twelve months ahead, and there is vague talk of a "corner' in certain kinds" as eathnowieuged that its estimated in cotton at this time last year was very wide of the mark—just as independent authorities had all along guessed. This year's estimate puts the acreage at 32,060,000 acres, against 28,586, 000 last year; the corrected total is 32,049, 000 acres. The average condition' on May 25th is given at 70.5, which compares with 84.6 last year and 77.2 in 1905. The Cotton Exchange had looked for an even lower average and the result was that the staple declined fully 1-4c. immediately after the publication of the report, and stocks showed buoyancy. MAY BREAK UP THE CHURCH

Clergymen in Lynn do not agree on the question whether women should wear their hats in church.

At weddings, in the evening especially, one finds the ladies of the congregation almost always without hats, and sometimes in the summer young girls also appear in church without hats.
