

Dernburg Professes Elation Over Situation



Notice to Women Voters

Every female person is qualified to vote in the present election who being a British subject, twenty-one years of age, and a resident of New Brunswick since February 24th, 1917, is the wife, widow, mother, sister or daughter of any person, male or female, living or dead, who is serving or has served without Canada in any of the Military Forces, or within or without Canada in any of the Naval Forces, of Canada or of Great Britain in the present war, if the name of such female person is duly entered on the voters' list in the electoral district in which she is bona fide resident or domiciled.

Every woman qualified by relationship to become a voter should communicate with the enumerator in charge of the list in her particular ward on which her name should appear.
