NO BILL FOUND AGAINST THE SARDINE MEN

Charged With Operating a Trust But After Hearing 25 Witnesses the Jury Throw the Case Out

Bangor, June 11—The June term of the United States district court is over and the grand jury failed to find any indictment in the sardine packing case, which commanded its attention for the greater part of the time.

The grand jury examined more than twenty-five witnesses from the lower St. Croix river, chiefly sardine packers, and the charges preferred by the independent packers against the combine, that the latter was working in violation of the Sherman law, and this ending of the case, after the examination of a large number of witnesses came as a surprise to many, while perhaps the majority of those interested expected that no indictment would be found.

JUVENILE COURT HELD THIS MORNING

Boys Deny Damaging Christy McDade's Wagon—A Queen Square Report

A juvenile session was held in the police court before Judge Ritchie this morning, opening at 8.30 o'clock. The following young lads were before the court and pleaded not guilty to a charge of damaging a wagon owned by Christy McDade in Marsh road: Harold Nottell, George and Harry Mitchell, Leo Jones, Stanley Madge, Roy Peacock and James Gassey.

Some of the boys admitted having been in the shipyard where the offence is alleged to have taken place, on Sunday last, but denied having destroyed the wagon.

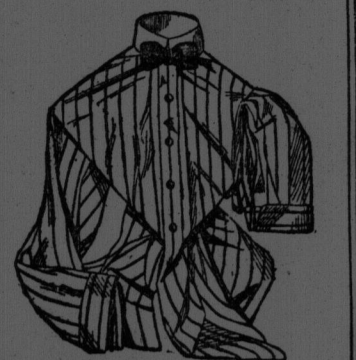
