

**WILL NOT AMEND N. B. LIQUOR ACT MORE THIS YEAR**

Premier Baxter Makes Reply To Delegation of Druggists

ASK NO REGISTERED ONES BE VENDORS

Alliance Not Against Right To Appeal In Prohibition Cases

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 21.—A request by a delegation representing the New Brunswick druggists that liquor vendors be not granted to registered druggists was made to the Provincial Government this morning, and in reply Premier Baxter said that there would be no further amendments to the Prohibition Act this year. Consideration was promised for next year.

**RIGHT OF APPEAL**

The New Brunswick Temperance Alliance will not object to passage of a bill to amend the Prohibition Act, which Premier Baxter introduced in the Legislature yesterday, under which the right of appeal to the Supreme Court is extended to all cases under the act. Rev. Thomas Marshall, secretary of the Temperance Alliance, said this morning.

Such a bill had been forecast by Premier Baxter some time ago, and in introducing it, the Premier said that he had always considered the denial of the right of appeal to the Supreme Court for other than licensed vendors and those sent to jail, who were the only ones given the right to appeal under the act before.

**ONE DEAD, 2 MISSING IN FOREST FIRES**

New Jersey Blaze Overtakes Three Men Riding in Truck

WHITING, N. J., April 21.—Harry Orelly, aged 68, of Forked River, last night, was reported buried in death when a forest fire overtook the truck in which he was riding between Double Trouble and Pinewald.

Two unidentified companions were also reported lost in the blaze which spread over an area of 125,000 acres in a thirty mile stretch between Toma River and Barreget.

The men abandoned the truck on the road and tried to fight their way through the blazing scrub pine and oaks. A strong gale from the north-west carried the fire faster than Orelly and his companions could travel.

**NEWCASTLE, April 21**—Result of the civic election: Mayor John Russell was re-elected by acclamation. For alderman—M. D. Anderson, 198; Dr. J. A. M. Bell, 178; H. N. Ritchie, 157; B. F. Somers, 139; Tracy Gould, 110. Messrs. Anderson, Bell, Ritchie and Somers were the successful candidates, and these, four, with Aldermen Stables, Creighton, Sargent and Smallwood, with Mayor Russell, will constitute the town's government for the ensuing year.

**Widow After Share In Millionaire's Estate**

**NEW YORK, April 21**—It was intimated before Surrogate Wingate in Brooklyn that Mrs. Katie Wolf Hart, formerly a maidservant, had refused \$150,000 to consent to an annulment of her marriage to the late James Hervey Hart, a retired jeweler, who was a millionaire.

She is contesting Hart's will, made ten days after their marriage in June, 1918, in which Hart cut her off, leaving most of his wealth to three daughters with whom he lived at 97 Columbia Heights, Brooklyn. Mrs. Hart was eighteen years old when she was married and he was eighty-six. He tried to get an annulment after the marriage.

The hearing was for the examination before trial of Charles Coleman Miller, attorney for Hart. He was asked:

Is it not a fact that Hart and his wife met in your office and that Mrs. Hart was offered as much as \$150,000 to consent to an annulment of the marriage? He replied, "I don't remember."

**Runs Away Rather Than Teach School Two Years**

**NEW YORK, April 21**—The prospect of having to teach school two years following her graduation from the Newark Normal School proved too much for Beatrice Rosenbaum, seventeen years old. She took her sheet music and \$100 from a savings account and ran away from home six months before she was due to get her diploma. Police have been asked to look for her.

She had been living for some time with her aunt, Miss Mae Rosenbaum, in Newark, for whom she left a note saying not to worry about her graduation, because she hadn't passed anything. "After graduating one is compelled to teach two years," she wrote. "Heaven forbid two years of that. I couldn't live through it."

Northumberland Straits and Gut of Canse not passable. Sydney Harbor closed to boats. Louisbourg clear of ice.

**ASK DIVIDEND PAID**

**Farmers' Co-operative Dairy Co. Request Presented to N. B. Government**

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 21.—President Hanford Dupuy, of Nashua, N. H., and a delegation of officers and directors of the Farmers' Co-operative Dairy Company, who operate a dairy business in Fredericton under a co-operative arrangement in which a large number of farmers of York and Sunbury counties are interested, appeared before the provincial government today and urged that the government renew for another year payment of six per cent. dividend on the paid-up stock of the organization.

The guarantee has been in effect for several years, and last year to make good the guarantee cost the provincial treasury \$857, the earnings having fallen short of the required amount by that sum.

A delegation representing the Fredericton Improvement Association also appeared and asked for an increased grant. Consideration was promised.
